

# **Bovina Will Cast Vote On Mayor This April**

The Bovina city commission passed a resolution Monday night that will "stagger" the terms of the commissioners. To make way for the new resolution to go into effect, Mayor O. W. Rhinehart turned in his resignation to the commissioners. An election will be held April 3 for a new mayor.

Rhinehart says the resolution was passed after two or three months of discussion.

Four men-Allen Cumpton, J. P. Macon, Jay Sherrill, Jr., and Alvin Glasscock-were appointed by the city commission as candidates for the mayor's post.






