

Why doesn't everyone pay the same price for life insurance?

Many factors are considered by the actuaries and underwriters who determine the premiums an individual will pay for life insurance. There are only a very few among us who cannot purchase life insurance at any price. The process begins with actu-

aries. These mysterious creatures pore over reams and reams of data such as mortality tables and other statistics. They develop the definition of a standard risk for each age and gender. They further develop discounts and surcharges to be applied to those of us who are better than standard risks or worse than standard risks. These tables are placed into the hands of underwriters.

The process continues with agents. Agents advise individuals on the types and amounts of life insurance for which they should apply. Agents also assist in the completion of applications and supplemental questionnaires, providing the life insurance companies with as complete a picture as possible of the applicants' eligibility for coverage.


The process ends with underwriters. Underwriters receive and evaluate applications for life insurance. They pry into our medical histories and into our propensity for dangerous activities.

Medical histories are fairly straightforward. We may weigh more or less than the standard amount for our age, height and gender. We may have high blood pressure or high cholesterol levelsitoThese may be new conditions for which treatments are still being formulated, or long-term conditions well under control. We may have experienced a heart attack, stroke, cancer, or other life-shortening condition.



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#### "EUCARISTIA: PARA MUCHOS, PERO NO PARA TODOS. DEL VATICANO UNA NUEVA TRADUCCION DEL MISAL ROMANO"

Adaptada de esta fuente, una revista cátolica italiana, ADISTA: edición española, número 87. 9 diciembre 2006. Páginas 3 y 4.

"33665. ROMA - ADISTA. En uno o dos años más, va a cambiar la versión italiana de la consagración del cáliz en la celebración de la misa: reemplazando el actual para todos, en uso desde hace más de veinte años, con la formula para muchos, que adhiere más al texto latín del Missale Romanum, que dice pro multis. El cambio sucede por voluntad del Papa Benedicto XVI, que comunicó su dirección al Prefecto de la Congregación para el Culto Divino, Card. Francis Arinze, quien a su vez informó a los presidentes de las distintas Conferencias episcopales nacionales en una carta con fecha [de] 17 de octubre de 2006, hecha pública en estos días. La formula Latina presente en el Missale Romanum, único para todas las naciones y en el que se basan las traducciones autorizadas en los idiomas nacionales, es: accipite et bibite ex eo omnes / hic est enim cáliz sanguinis mei / novi et aeterni testamenti / qui pro vobis et pro multis effundetur / in remissionem peccatorum / Hoc facite in meam commemorationem.

"La expression pro multis fue traducida en italiano per tutti, (para todos) y en la mayoría de los otros idiomas de manera análoga: en alemán, für alle, en inglés for all, en español para todos los hombres. En cambio, en francés se recita pour la multitude. "Lo que es seguro es que un literal pro multis no encuentra el favor de muchos obispos y, a pesar de las presiones del Vaticano, era improbable que las Conferencias episcopales decidieran autónomamente enfrentar la cuestión sin una orden explícita, al punto que [el Cardenal] Arinze impone un plazo de uno o dos años para prepararse a introducir la traducción según las indicaciones del Dicasterio.

"Pero, significativamente [por lo menos aquí en nuestro país], los obispos estadounidenses habían considerado también que no era el caso de enfrentar la cuestión, vista la expresada intención del Vaticano a referirse a este punto.

"En la carta [ya mencionada arriba], el card. Arinze explica la opción de una traducción más precisa de la formula pro multis, con el intento de aclarar que la salvación no llega de manera mecánica, sin la voluntad o la participación de cada uno.

"Además, el texto de los Evangelios sinópticos está de acuerdo en hacer una referencia específica a muchos (ver Mt 26:28 y Me 14:24) y, tradicionalmente, et rito romano latín siempre ha recitado pro multis y no pro ómnibus.

"El cardenal añade que para todos, más que una traducción fiel, es una explicación del género más apto a una catequesis y que por lo tanto ya no está más en línea con la Instrucción Liturgiam authenticam que prescribe traducciones más fieles al texto latín.

"La nueva dirección llega tras una consulta, comenzada en Julio de 2005, entre todas las Conferencias episcopales nacionales de acuerdo con la Congregación para la Doctrina de la Fe.

"En esta misma línea, tras las recientes polémicas sobre la dirección del oficiante durante la misa (ver Adista n. 73/06), resulta significativa la calurosa exaltación de la liturgia de rito bizantino - donde el sacerdote está dirigido hacia el Oriente y no hacia el pueblo a la que el papa asistió el 30 de noviembre [de 2006] en la iglesia de San Jorge durante su viaie a Turquía.

"El maestro de ceremonias pontificio, mons. Piero Marini, subraya con énfasis las razones teológicas por las que, en el rito bizantino, todos los fieles miran hacia Oriente, de donde Cristo vendrá en el día de su Gloria: en efecto, el sacetdote interecede ante el Señor para su pueblo; él camina delante del pueblo hacia el encuentro con el Señor." Dangerous activities are less understandable to the average applicant for life insurance. We may wonder why we are being asked about our use of tobacco products such as cigars, snuff and pipe tobacco. Does it really matter that we plan to visit a foreign country? Who knew that powerboat racing or scuba diving was an issue? An affirmative answer regarding the piloting of an aircraft can result in a request for a 2-page questionnaire. Questions about hang gliding and rock climbing seem a bit more logical to most people. Can they really ask if we have ever been indicted for or convicted of a felony?

Every life insurance company's underwriting department has its own personality when it comes to considering all the nuances of our individual risk profiles. When we apply for life insurance, we are measured against their ideas of what a standard risk should be. The vast majority of us will be offered polices rated standard or preferred. Only a few of us will be offered policies rated higher than standard. These are truly the fortunate ones. Although they have become impaired risks, they are still offered coverage. Coverage at any price may still be considered a bargain. After all, fire insurance companies won't offer coverage at all if a fire has already started. Those of us who are not offered a policy at all envy these who are merely charged a higher than standard rate.

It has been easier for me to deliver policies with a higher than standard rate since I heard about the man who wanted to buy some lumber. He called a lumber yard and asked the price of two by fours. The man at the lumber yard replied that the price was \$1.00 each. (This is an old story.) The potential buyer laughed and stated that another lumber yard had offered a price of 75 cents each. The salesman asked, "Why didn't you buy from the other lumber yard?" The buyer replied, "They were out of two by fours." The salesman re-torted, "Oh, why didn't you say so. When we don't have any, ours are only 50 cents each!'
