O.K.! So you paid your poll tax this year and the poll tax law is outlawed before your check for the \$1.75 even gets back through the bank.


That was kind of a revolting development, we thought, but we guess it's worth it to get rid of the discriminating ruling.





Last year, the TEC established an office here one day a week. It was in operation from January until June. The service was started after the bracero program was ended.

In this area, the TEC primarily helps agricultural workers find jobs and farmers find help when they need it. However, the service is not limited to agricultural. It is available to any and every one.

Maybe it's because the service is "new" here, but not enough people use it.

Farmers, being independent as they are, figure, possibly, that they can find help when they need it as quickly as a Texas Employment Commission official can. Maybe that's true, but we doubt it.

Especially can the service be helpful when crews of laborers are needed. The TEC can offer even more help if sufficient notice is given about when a certain amount of hands will be needed.

Dear Fellow Texan:

I have good news from Washington. There will be a Cold War GI Bill in time for our deserving veterans to begin school this summer.

On Monday of this week, the House of Representatives passed S.9, my Cold War GI Bill, by an overwhelming vote of 381 to 0. Since the Senate passed the bill last year, this week's House action insures that there will be a Cold War GI Bill.

Although there are differences in the two bills that were passed, I will make every effort to see that these differences are ironed out so that our Cold War veterans can be in school by June of this year.

Under the provisions of the bill that have been agreed upon, any veteran who has served more than 180 days on active duty since January 31, 1955, will be eligible for readjustment benefits.

Probably it's a question of getting in the habit of going to a central place and asking about labor or a job, which ever the case may be. We'd like to see more people develop it.



SIX YEARS AGO ... February 17, 1960 Baptist met in the school house Sunday. With their building in the process of being moved, First Baptist Church members were forced to conduct services in school auditorium. Weather has delayed work and date for beginning construction on the \$104,687 new structure has been postponed several times.

A driverless tractor, unleashed by five young men in the predawn hours of Sunday morning, ran in circles and plowed up about 10 acres of wheat on the Buck Ellison farm northwest of Bovina. The machine failed to hit any improvements although it was at times within about 150 yards of a farm house. * * * *

A grinding pick-up - station wagon crash one-half mile north of Oklahoma Lane at 6:40 Friday evening sent seven persons to Parmer County Community Hospital at Friona. None of the injured were believed critical. Wendell Tooley, Mrs. Tooley and four children were riding in the station wagon. Fred Kipley of Oklahoma Lane was alone in the pickup. The Tooleys are from Littlefield.

Bovina's Mustangs entered post-season play Tuesday night in defense of their District 2-B crown. The Ponies and Lazbuddie finished their seasons Friday night with the Longhorns in first place and Bovina a game back in the runner-up spot. Lazbuddie edged Bovina's Mustangs in the first game of a best two-out-ofthree playoff, 43-42.

For each day of active duty a veteran will be eligible for one day of educational assistance up to a maximum of 36 months - this is enough for four complete 9 month school terms. If a veteran is single, he will receive \$100 a month for a full-time program of education; if he is married he will receive \$150 a month. This educational assistance will begin on June 1, of this year, which means that over 2 1/2 million veterans who have already completed their military service and have been discharged will be eligible to receive educational assistance at that time. By 1970, over 5 million Cold War veterans will be eligible for this bill, which gives them a new hope in life to catch up with those people who have not spent time in the defense of our Nation.

This bill also provided for guaranteed loans for home and farms, similar to those of the Korean GI Bill.

Although the bill passed by the House of Representatives does not provide for high school training, I have amended the bill to be sure that returning veterans can use the bill to complete high school if they desire. Over 1/3 of the Korean veterans used the bill for high school training.

After seven years of concentrated work on getting a Cold War GI Bill enacted into law, lam extremely elated that we have finally conquered the oppostion to this bill. Although the bill is not as broad as I would like for it to be, I will continue to work on amendments to give larger educational benefits to thrse deserving veterans - over 1/4 of a million in our own State of Texas.



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
