

# Democratic Primary Election Set Saturday

The Democratic primary, one of the most popular elections in this area, is scheduled for Saturday in Parmer County and across the state.

Contested political races on the precinct, county, district and state levels will attract voters to the polls which will be open in Parmer's eight voting precincts from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Polls in Bovina will be in the American Legion Hall. At Oklahoma Lane, Democrats will vote in the Community Center. At Rhea, the election will be in the Parish Hall.

There is one contested race here on the precinct level, Lucille Killough is seeking re-election as Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. 3 (Bovina and Rhea). Opposing her is Harley Sherich, machinery firm employee.

There is also one contested race on the county level, Joyce Haseloff of Farwell is running for county clerk against Mrs. Bonnie Warren, the incumbent.

The most active political work here has been going on in

connection with the party's nominee for the state senator's post in the re-districted 30th Senatorial District. Re-districting has brought about an unlikely race of two incumbents seeking re-election in one election. The districts of Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress and Sen. Jack Hightower of Wichita Falls were combined, making it necessary for them to oppose each other for the office.

A third candidate in the race, who has not campaigned as vigorously in Parmer County as have the two incumbents, is James R. Ray of Hale Center.

On the state level, Governor John Connally is expected to be elected to another term even though he has two opponents, Stanley C. Woods of Harris County and Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Washington County.

In the lieutenant governor's race, the incumbent, Preston Smith of Lubbock County and a popular vote-getter in this area, is opposed by Bill Hollowell of Van Zandt County.

Battling for the right to oppose Republican Senator John

Tower in the November general election are two Democratic candidates, led by Waggoner Carr, present attorney general, who hopes to move up in his political career. Opposing Carr for the nomination is John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Harris County.

Three candidates are running for Carr's vacated AG post. They are Crawford C. Martin of Hill County, Galloway Calhoun of Smith County and Franklin Spears of Bexar County.

Congressman Walter Rogers is unopposed in this primary for his party's nomination. However, he faces Republican opposition in the general election in November.

Also without an opponent in this primary is State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake. Clayton will be nominated for his second term to the state legislature.

The county clerk race is the only contest on the county level. Seeking re-election without opposition to four-year terms in this election are Loyde A. Brewer, county judge; Dorothy Quickel, district clerk; and Mabel Reynolds, county treasurer; C. H. Jefferson, Precinct No. 2 (Bovina and Rhea) county

commissioner, is also unopposed this year in his bid for election to another four-year term.

Also on the ballot are members of the Parmer County Democratic Executive committee. A vacancy exists in the Black precinct and voters will write-in nominations there.

Unopposed are Nelson Welch, county chairman of the party; O. J. Beene, Friona; Dolph Moten, Bovina; Albert Smith, Farwell; Wyle Bullock, Lazbuddie; Wendol Christian, Oklahoma Lane; Raymond Schueler, Rhea; and Otho Whitefield.

Moten says he expects 350 to 400 votes to be cast here with the JP's race being the primary attraction to increase the more-than-usual total.

In the primary two years ago, the vote total was 308. The total in 1962 was a record-setting 439. In 1960, 223 went to the polls in Bovina to vote for their favorite Democrats.

A sample ballot which is the same as will be used in Saturday's election is published in this issue of The Blade by First State Bank of Bovina. It contains a complete list of candidates for all offices.

Things are getting pretty rough for farmers out at Lazbuddie, according to a report from Sam Bradley, who is one of them.

"A farmer friend of mine says he's so far behind that he can't get in to the domino table before 9 o'clock most mornings," said our Lazbuddie informant.

Things aren't quite that far gone over in this part of the county.

After conducting an unofficial survey, we've discovered that Bovina-area farmers who are so inclined can get their domino games underway by 8:30 or by the time they finish their second cup of town coffee, whichever is earlier.

To those who might be offended by the above sentences, we want to say again that our survey was unofficial and there's a possibility that it is not as accurate as it could have been.

J. B. Fowler, the Methodist pastor, seems to be having "trouble" with south-of-town farmers. They're about the worst kind to have trouble with, too.

For instance, the clergyman was out that way one day last week visiting Leon Grissom's feed yards.

Leon, so the story goes, invited the preacher to ride his horse which was saddled nearby.

"Aw, I'm afraid I'd get dirty," Rev. Fowler declined. "Why, that saddle's not dirty," Grissom countered defensively.

"It's not the saddle that I'm concerned about," was the reply which came just before the snickering which ended that conversation.

We don't know which was being knocked -- the behavior of Grissom's horse or the ability of the preacher as a horseman.

The lack of rainfall here is hard to understand considering the great amounts of rain which have been falling downstate. In some areas, floods are endangering the lives of people and this area is lucky to get a thundercloud to pass over on its way to more rainy territory.

With three other fellows, we made a weekend trip to Central Texas. From Muleshoe southeast for 400 or more miles, the moisture was adequate and more rain was falling.

Such wasn't the case, of course, after we came through Muleshoe going west, on the return trip.


J. T. Hammonds says it's just not true that "it has to rain sometime."

"I just don't know that I believe that statement if it's made about this area," Hammonds points out.

Our area did have .8 of an inch of rain some 10 days ago, of course, and that might have been enough to brag about if places all around us and downstate weren't having so much more rain.

If there's any place which has received less rain than Bovina, it's north of here in the Rhea Community area, one weather observer informed us. There's been little rain here this Spring and at that the total is more than has been measured in the north part of the county.

## Bank Deposits Here Increase

Deposits at Bovina's First State Bank continue to increase, the statement of condition as of April 5 indicates.

Total deposits at the call date were \$2,079,276.80. During April of 1965, total deposits were \$1,717,287.96. The April deposits were up slightly from the mark recorded as of December 31, 1965, also. The

total at the end of the year was \$2,055,937.35.

Loans as of last month totaled \$1,137,849.36. This figure is up slightly from a year ago when the total was \$1,276,489.75 and is constant with the December 31 reading of \$1,357,131.12.

The total deposits as of April 5 was one of the highest in history at the time of a call for a bank statement of condition, points out Alfred Moody, cashier. However, this was not a record for total deposits recorded by the bank at times other than call dates.

### Over 100 Entries Expected --

# Appaloosa Show Here Saturday

More than 100 entries are expected in the fourth annual Appaloosa Horse Show which is scheduled here Saturday. The show is sponsored by Bovina Roping Club and will be at the arena west of town.

More than \$300 worth of trophies and ribbons will be presented to the top horses, announces Rouel Barron, Roping Club president.

Judging begins at 10 a.m. and will continue through most of the day, Barron estimates. The halter classes are first on the program. They will be judged before a noon break is taken if time permits.

Performance classes will begin after lunch. Performance classes offered are junior and senior reining, Western pleas-

ure, junior and senior cutting, and junior and senior calf roping. The junior and senior division refer to the ages of the horses.

Entry fee in the halter classes is \$7. The show will forward \$1 for each entry to Texas Appaloosa Horse Club and \$1 to Eastern New Mexico Appaloosa Horse Club.

The entry fee in the performance classes is \$11 each with \$5 of that total to be paid to the top placings on a 40, 30, 20, and 10 per cent breakdown.

Trophies will be awarded to winners in each of the 21 classes. Ribbons will be given to second through sixth places in each class.

A total of 101 entries competed for prizes in the 1965 show. That was the highest total in the three-year history of the event. Roping Club members are hoping that a new record for number of entries can be set this year.

Russell Moore of Plainview will judge the show.

"We're pleased that deposits are as high as they are and we feel that this indicates good economic conditions in our area," Moody said. He said he didn't think any one factor added to the increase in deposits this year over last year.

The bank's official statement of condition appears in an advertisement in this issue of The Blade.

Some two or three weeks ago, we referred in this space to a record of Bovina moisture which had been kept over the past five years. At that time, we weren't sure who had left the report on our desk. Since then, we learned that it was Jack Baker and we want to give proper recognition to him for a job well done.

It takes some effort and a great deal of patience to keep up with the monthly moisture totals here. The five-year report indicated, you'll remember, that April was, or had been, one of the driest months during each of the past five years.

The aforementioned, which fell here last month was, as a matter of fact, the highest total during April in the past six years.

We're proud of Jack for keeping such a record and we are especially glad he shared his figures with us.

Last year was a pretty good one from a moisture standpoint. This wasn't because of the overall total which was only 13.75 but because we had good rains during June and July, the heart of the rowcrop growing season.

Maybe such will be the case again during 1966.



Dear Father, help us always to remember that we are Thy redeemed children and heirs of heaven through Christ. Amen.

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
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

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**On The Farm In Parmer County**

**HERBICIDE RECOMMENDATIONS**

There will be many pre-emergence and post-emergence herbicides applied in the next month in Parmer County on cotton and grain sorghum.

Cotton pre-emergence herbicides recommended are: (1) Caparol 80W is an 80% wettable powder formulation of prometryne. Soil incorporation is not advised. Suggested rates active ingredients per acre of application are 1, 1 1/2 lb/A for coarse, medium and fine textured soils. This is equivalent to 5 and 8 ounces (dry) or

prometryne 80W per acre applied to a 10-inch band. Do not apply to loamy sand or sandy soil.

(2) Karmex DL and Karmex Diuron are liquid and dry formulations of diuron. Karmex DL contains 2.8 pounds of diuron per gallon and Karmex Diuron is an 80% wettable powder. Light incorporation of diuron is beneficial. Rates of Diuron are 0.5, 0.8 and 1.0 lb/A for coarse, medium and fine textured soils. This is equivalent to 7, 9 and 11 ounces per acre of Karmex DL applied to a 10-inch band. Do not use on sandy soil.

(3) Herban is an 80% wettable powder formulation of norea. It can be used pre-emerge or with light soil incorporation. Sorghum can be planted the year of application if cotton fails. Application rates are 1.0, 1.5 and 2.0 lb/A active ingredient on coarse, medium and fine textured soils. Do not use on loamy sand or sandy soils.

(4) Cotoran is an 80% wettable powder. Rates of active ingredients for medium and fine textured soil are 1.5 and 2.0 lb/A. Do not replant in treated bands.

Dacthal and Treflan can be applied pre-emergence after planting but must be incorporated and results are frequently not as good as with pre-plant applications.

Cotton post-emergence herbicides recommended are: (1) Karmex DL and Karmex Diuron are liquid and wettable powder formulations of diuron. These herbicides can be used once cotton is 6 inches tall. In 10-inch bands apply 0.05 to 0.1 pound of diuron and 4 ounces of surf-

actant per acre in 5 gallons of water. This is 0.12 to 0.14 pound of actual Diuron (9 to 18 liquid ounces of Karmex DL or 0.25 to 0.50 pound of Karmex Diuron), 1 pint surfactant and 25 gallons of water per treated acre. Ten acres could be banded with 1.5 to 3 pints of Karmex DL (0.625 to 1.25 pounds of Karmex Diuron) and 2 pints of surfactant mixed in 50 gallons of water. A broadcast application during August after layby usually keeps fields weed-free for the rest of the season. Diuron is most effective against careless weeds.

(2) Caparol 80W is an 80% wettable powder formulation of prometryne. Rate of application is 0.2 to 0.4 lb/A of prometryne with 1/2% surfactant. Prometryne is most effective for careless weeds. Mixing and use instructions are the same as for Karmex Diuron.

(3) Herbicidal oil can be used to control annual grass weeds and Johnson grass seedlings in

small cotton up until the bark cracks on the stem.

(4) DSMA and MSMA are designations for disodium methanearsonate (dry formulations) and monosodium acid methanearsonate (liquid formulation). These herbicides can be used once the cotton is 3 inches tall and must be stopped at flowering. Use each at the rate of 3.3 lb/A in 40 gallons of water containing 1/2 per cent surfactant. Good for control of annual grasses and Johnson grass. Do not spray over the top of cotton.

Let us now review the herbicide recommendations for grain sorghum now. Pre-emergence herbicides are Propazine and Norea.

Propazine 80W is an 80 per cent wettable powder for pre-emergence weed control in sorghum for grain and forage. It can be used broadcast or in a band treatment for season long weed control. Do not apply to loamy sand. Rate recommended for fine sandy loam soil is 1 pound of active ingredient per acre. Up to 2 pounds of active ingredient can be applied per acre on silty clay loam soils where grasses and broadleaf weeds should be controlled. Only corn or sorghum can be planted next summer and wheat may be planted the second fall after application.

Norea is sold as Herban. It has a short residue period and should be used only as a pre-emergence band treatment for control of annual grass and broadleaf weeds. It will not give full season weed control. Rates are same as listed under cotton.

Post-emergence herbicide for sorghum are Atrazine, 2, 4-D and Diuron.

Atrazine at 1 and 2 lb. active ingredients per acre plus surfactant can be used to control careless weeds less than 1 inch tall in emerged sorghum. Attempts to control larger broadleaf weeds and small grasses will probably fail unless it rains within a few days after application.

On silty clay loam and loamy soils, sorghum should be at least 2 inches tall and at least 6 inches tall on fine sandy loam soil. Do not use on loamy sand and sandy soils.

Only sorghum, corn or winter wheat should be planted the year following atrazine application. 2, 4-D is available as amine, oil soluble amine, acid, low volatile ester and high volatile ester formulations. All formulations may be used at 1/2 pound per acre to control small broadleaf weeds once the sorghum is 6 inches tall but before flowering. Hybrids containing wheatland parentage should not be treated with 2,4-D, because serious yield reductions and lodging may occur. Best and most profitable results will be obtained if weeds are treated before they are 6 inches tall.

Because of the possibility of drift and volatility, it is not advisable to use 2,4-D near cotton if other methods of weed control are available.

Diuron can be used in 1966 only in sorghum to be produced for seed unless label clearance is obtained. It should be applied as a directed spray to small broadleaf weeds in 15-inch sorghum. Application of 0.2 to 0.4 pound per treated acre must be made in 20 to 40 gallons of water containing 1/2 per cent surfactant.

Herbicides are usually applied with ground rigs. However, most herbicides can be applied with aerial applications if careful attention is followed. Aerial application of herbicides has not been proved in any Texas Agricultural Experiment Station tests in the Panhandle.

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




Rejino is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben C. Rejino and is a 1962 graduate of Bovina High School.
