County election full of surprises Kinney County votes apart from the nation

Three of the four incumbents declared victory in their re-election bids for the Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District and for what had become the most contentious race on this year's local election ticket.

In the water district's short seven year existence, it has managed to divide the county community, as well as long time friends, into two camps: to sell water or not to sell water. With both sides throwing out accusations, the voters were caught in the crossfire and bombarded with bar-b-que invitations, political speeches and media print ads, but in the end, the citizens

voted to keep the majority of the incumbent directors.

Incumbent Director for County At Large Tony Frerich defeated Francie Wylie with 843 votes to 587 votes, respectively. Dr. Kent Lowery turned back challenger Matt Bland for the Director of City of Brackettville at Large position with 840 votes to 583. Incumbent Director for Precinct 4 Dennette Haby Coates defeated Don Hood with 292 votes to 232. Incumbent Ed Dillon is challenging the results of his re-election bid for Director for Fort Clark Springs-MUD at Large against challenger Stan Metcalf. Unofficially, Dillon

received 637 votes while Metcalf received 651 votes. A recount has been requested by the Dillon camp and is scheduled to begin soon.

Democratic candidate Dennis Dodson defeated Republican Doug Davis for County Commissioner Precinct #3 with 208 votes to 72 votes, respectively.

Also elected into office were Democratic candidates: Robert Bob Adams as County Attorney, LK Buddy Burgess as Sheriff, Martha Pena Padron as County Tax Assessor-Collector, Woody Massingill as County Commissioner Precinct 1 and Bobby J. Tatum Guidry as Constable.

None of the candidates were challenged by a Republican adversary.

In the race for the 63rd Judicial District Judge, left open by the retiring Tom Lee, Del Rio attorney Enrique Henry Fernandez defeated Jacques Jack De La Mota, also a Del Rio attorney. Hernandez gathered up a district wide total of 8,020 to De La Mota's 4,638 votes. Kinney County voters however gave Fernandez 725 votes and De La Mota 729.

MUD bond passes; smoother streets on the way

The bond election held by the Fort Clark Municipal Utility District passed easily with a two to one margin on November 4.

Fort Clark Municipal Utility District, better known as Fort Clark MUD is an independent governmental entity that owns the roadways, waterworks and sewer systems at Fort Clark.

The bond measure was divided into two parts, but both propositions had to pass with majority votes before it could move forward.

Proposition 1 passed with 270 in favor of the measure and 112 votes against the measure. Early votes and mail in ballots consisted of 169 votes in favor and 45 against. On election day, 32 in Precinct 1 voted in favor; 20 against, while in Precinct 4, 69 voted in favor; 47 voted against.

Proposition 1 will be for \$350,000 and used, "to paint the elevated water tower and repair two of our older lift stations. We will also use some of the money to purchase equipment so we can properly main-

tain our lift stations," said Fort Clark MUD General Manager Larry Sofaly in a memo October 16.

Proposition 2 passed with 272 in favor of the measure and 113 votes against the measure. Early votes and mail in ballots consisted of 171 votes in favor and 46 against. On election day, 33 in Precinct 1 voted in favor; 18 against, while in Precinct 4, 68 voted in favor; 49 voted against it.

Sofaly also explained in the same memo, "Proposition #2 is for \$2,150,000.00. That money

will be used to repair our streets. The streets that will be repaved with this bond issue are Fort Clark Road, Scales Road and Fairway Circle. That will include Eagle Way also. That the total bond issue will be for \$2,500,000."

The passage of this bond will increase the tax rate approximately 45 cents per every \$100 valuation, making the taxes for a house valued at \$100,000: \$450 per year; a house valued at \$50,000: \$225 per year and a house valued at \$25,000: \$112.50 per year.

LETTER to the Editor

I feel I must respond to Leigh Volcsko's comments in PLOG and the number of concerns which prompted her request to "LIGHT IT UP BROTHERS AND SISTERS."

I believe the accident cited occurred about this time of year three years ago. School district officials at that time responded to the incident by taking actions listed.

1. The Texas State Highway Department was called to have them repaint the crosswalks in front of the school. The district was told the crosswalks had a reflective paint already and were redone as needed. TSHD representatives drove out, examined the painted crosswalks, and determined the four painted crosswalks on Ann Street were still functional.

2. School officials asked the TSHD about flashing lights at the crosswalk. TSHD officials stated that flashing lights would not act as a deterrent in town as there were too many distractions for drivers to take notice of them.

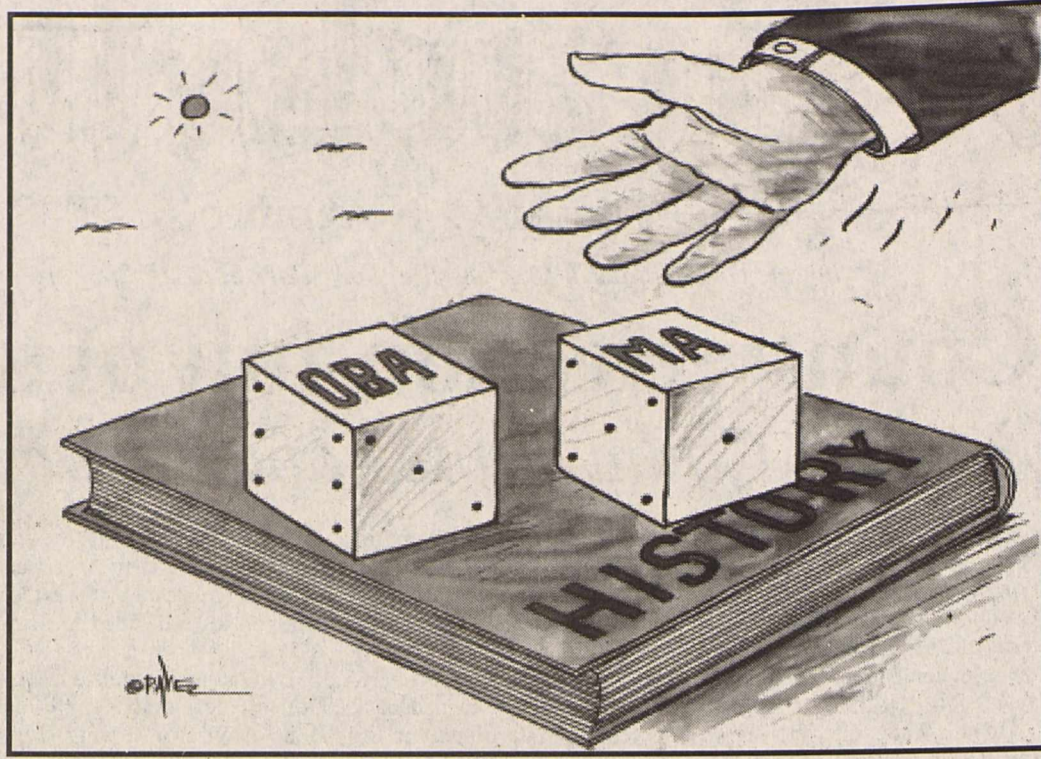
3. School officials also requested that the city pass an ordinance to make the eastern side of Ann Street, in front of the school, a "No Parking Zone". Upon passages of the ordinance, the appropriate signs were ordered and put up from Edward Street to Fulton Street to comply with the city ordinance.

4. Within the past few weeks, City Manager Henry Garcia responded to my request to place a street light at the crosswalk immediately in front of the gym. Mr. Garcia did not question this. Mr. Garcia's cooperation and willingness to address the school district's shared concern for the safety of our community's students resulted in swift action. Thus, a light that is on a longer arm extends over this crosswalk and illuminates the area much better than the area light in question.

5. The school district is presently involved in the process of working to have AEP evaluate the school district's campus area lights and the feasibility of replacing existing mercury vapor lights with more efficient sodium lights. Drivers and community members can help ensure greater safety for pedestrians in front of the school facilities by realizing that many activities go on at different times. Slowing down through the school zones during the times these activities are occurring is also very effective in helping to ensure pedestrian safety. Examples of such activities are upcoming basketball practices and games; voting that occurs using school facilities; library facilities open for student use at night; school board meeting; FCA meetings; and many other activities where school facilities are being used. Pedestrians, whether student or adult, can ensure greater safety by using crosswalks; looking both ways before crossing the street; and not assuming that vehicles are automatically going to stop or slow down for them—even at times when pedestrians have the right of way.

I share your love for our school system—the students, faculty, staff, administrators, and facilities. I can assure you that all of us at Brackett ISD share the desire to keep our students as safe as possible while they take advantage of all that BISD has to offer them.

Transition to retirement: What "First Wave" boomers should know

If you're a "senior" member of the baby boom generation — generally defined as those born between 1946 and 1964 — you've seen a lot in your life: the Cold War, the first moon landing, the birth of the Internet and much more. But in just a few years, you may face something you probably never thought you'd see: your retirement. To make a smooth transition to this stage of your life, you'll need to become familiar with a few key financial topics.

Consider the following:

Retirement plan income — For the past few decades, you may have been building financial resources for retirement through an employer-sponsored plan — such as a 401(k) or a traditional pension — and possibly an IRA. Now, however, it's time to determine just how much retirement income these vehicles will produce. A traditional pension will provide you regular payments based on your years of service and salary, but you have much more flexibility and latitude when it comes to taking withdrawals from a 401(k) or IRA. How much you withdraw directly affects how long your money will last, so you may want to consult with a professional financial advisor to determine the appropriate withdrawal rates for these accounts, based on your projected retirement lifestyle, life expectancy, risk tolerance and other factors.

Health insurance — Well before you retire, consult with your employer's benefits office to learn if you can receive some type of health insurance as a retiree. Many large employers extend health care coverage to retired workers, but as health care costs have risen, some companies have cut back or eliminated this benefit. Generally speaking, you won't be eligible for Medicare until you are 65. If you retire before that age and your former employer doesn't cover you, you'll need to find some health insurance to fill the gap.

Social Security — You can begin collecting Social Security benefits at age 62, but you'll get larger monthly checks if you wait until you reach "normal" retirement age, which, if you are in the first wave of baby boomers, will be about age 66. When should you start taking payments? It depends on a variety of factors, including your health, family history of longevity and other sources of income.

Further employment — If you decide to do some type of work after retirement, whether for financial or personal reasons, you'll need to factor this income into your overall retirement income strategies. For instance, if you're earning a reasonable amount from a post-retirement job, you may want to delay taking money from your 401(k) or traditional IRA (though you'll have to start taking distributions when you reach age 70-1/2). Also, according to the Social Security Administration, if you start collecting Social Security when you're younger than your full retirement age, you will lose \$1 of benefits for every \$2 you earn above a certain annual amount (\$13,560 in 2008). Once you reach full retirement age, you can keep all your benefits, no matter how much you earn.

So, there you have them — just a few of the financial issues you'll need to explore as you lead the baby boom cohort into retirement.

By taking your time and exploring all your options, you can make the transition pleasant — and rewarding.

Transition to Retirement: What "First" Boomers Should Know

As a "senior" member of the baby boom generation — defined as those born between 1946 and 1964 — you have a lot in your life. For the first time, the birth of the Internet and the rise of the Internet are not just a novelty, but you may face some challenges you probably never would see: your retirement income, a smooth transition to the next stage of your life, and how to become familiar with new financial topics.

The following information will provide you with key elements based on your years of service and salary. You have much more latitude when it comes to withdrawing funds from your 401(k) or IRA. How you withdraw directly from your long-term investments may affect your professional future. To determine the best withdrawal rates for your retirement lifestyle, you need to consider factors such as:

• **Health Insurance** — Well before you retire, consult with your employer's benefits office to see what you can receive as a retiree. Many large employers offer health insurance as a retiree benefit, but as health care costs have risen, some employers have cut back on their benefits. Generally, you won't be eligible for health insurance until you are 65, and you may have to pay more for it than you did when you were younger.

• **Security** — You can't rely on Social Security checks for 62, but you'll need to reach "normal" retirement age, which, if you're born after 1960, is about age 66. If you start taking Social Security benefits before you are 66, your benefits will be reduced.

• **Employment** — If you do some type of part-time or seasonal work, or personal services, you may want to factor this into your overall retirement strategy. For instance, if you're earning a significant amount from a part-time job, you may want to consider how that income will affect your Social Security benefits.

• **Retirement Accounts** — If you have a 401(k) or IRA, you may want to explore your options for withdrawing funds. You may want to consider a Roth IRA, which allows you to withdraw funds tax-free.

• **Transition Planning** — As you approach retirement, you should consider how you will spend your time and explore your options, including part-time work, consulting, or other income sources.

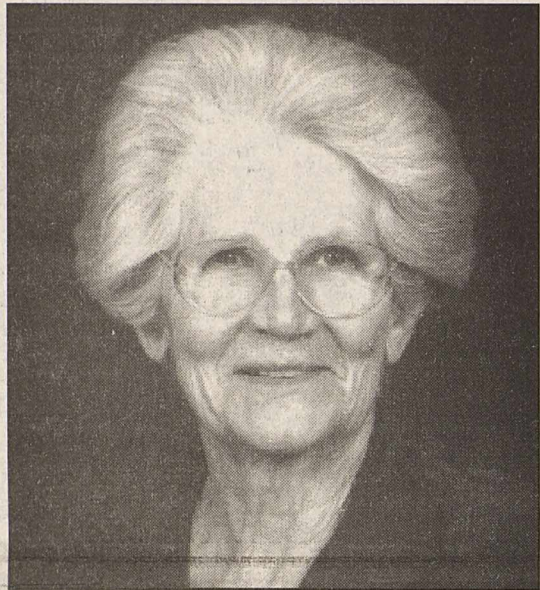
She was preceded in death by her husband on February 22, 1994, her parents, and a son, Michael.

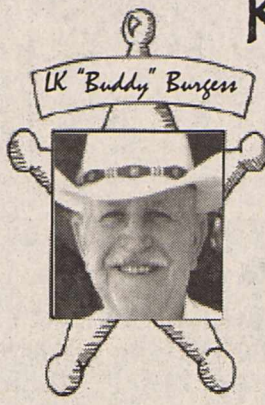

Venison tenderloin, sliced thin Tony Chachery's Fry All Louisiana Hot Sauce Marinade in hot sauce all day (coat meat

well, maybe use whole bottle if needed). Coat meat with Tony Chachery's Fry All. Deep fry 2 or 3 minutes or until golden brown.

Roast Venison

Incumbent Democrat Fred Hernandez of Del Rio handily defeated Martin Underwood of Comstock for 63rd Judicial District - District Attorney with 7,157 votes to 5,178, but sticking to the trend of the evening, Kinney County offered up only 666 votes to Hernandez and 801 votes to his challenger Underwood.

In the state election, Tracy O.

King, running unopposed, retained his seat as State Representative District 80.

Although Barack Obama's sounding victory for President of the United States will be one for the history books, Kinney County residents once again bucked the trend in favor of his opponent John McCain. Obama received 633 Kinney County votes while John McCain re-

ceived 907 votes.

In Kinney County, 1,580 people voted. There were 952, or roughly 60 percent of the total vote, early and mail-in ballots cast.

As of October 23, the tax office reported, there were 2,375 registered voters in Kinney County. Nearly 66 percent of those registered participated in the November 4 Election.
