

I have voted for members on the strength of their resume and have never heard them speak on any subject- other make a proposal. With the excepti! on of on e or two I know them no better now than I did when they were a name on the Ballot Sheet! It is time for a change—lets have a civilised open relationship with our board members---We should know their phone numbers and email addresses and we should once again have the certainty that letters delivered to the Administration Office addressed to the Board are delivered and hopefully get a response if only an acknowledgement
