A cowboy on the Statler Ranch, also known as The Frerich, reported seeing a lighting strike that caused a 150-acre brush fire on the evening of July 7, said Kinney County Fire Rescue Chief Tim Ward.

Fire officials responded to the fire on Highway 693, 15 miles south of Brackettville at 8:26 p.m. on Tuesday night.

Chief Ward says he thought they were on their way to a regular brush fire, but were caught off guard when they, "had to go through a flood and a wind storm just to get to a fire.'



The strong winds forced the attack trucks to have to slow almost to a stop and then high water at Elm Creek created another safe passage hazard.

Reports from individuals across the county reported nearly 4.5 inches of rain in some areas, something fire fighters believe was that little extra help from above they needed to have the fire completely doused in just over two hours.

# Fort Clark artist is a lady with a past

Ginger Calk was not fully retired when she and her husband George moved to Fort Clark in November of 2003. The allure of leaving the political atmosphere of Houston drew them to the tranquility of Fort Clark. Like many permanent residents on the Fort they resided in the RV Park until they were able to find a place to live. Once they were firmly established in their new home, Ginger began to pursue other interests.

Ginger's mother was a business woman in Houston who discouraged her at a young age from following her desire to be a commercial artist. So instead, she found herself going to work for the city and became the second woman in Texas to receive her Plumbing Inspectors License. Left to raise two children alone, she worked hard just to make ends meet. Later she went on to take a position as Administrative Manager for

the Flood Control District in 14 years. It was not until two encouragement of Elizabeth decided to indulge her desire to Houston where she retired after and a half years ago, with the Hodges, a local artist, that she

At first it was just sporadically; experimenting with techniques and color. Leaning towards an impressionistic style she painted an oil still life of apples, using layers of color in an effort to bring out the desired undertones. Then, as a beginner, she entered her art work "Red Apples" in the Del Rio Art League Annual Show in May. There were 197 entries in the Art Show with a wonderful representation from

BUT, and this is a huge but, MY CHILDREN ARE OFF LIM-ITS TO YOU. I don't believe kind, honest people have to be told this





How do mutual funds compensate investors?

As you probably know, a mutual fund may contain many different types of investments, such as stocks, bonds and government securities. But as an investor, you need to pay attention not only to what goes into your mutual fund, but also what comes out of it - namely, the three ways in which a fund can compensate you.

Let's take a look at these three avenues:

·Dividends and interest - A mutual fund earns income from dividends on stocks and interest on bonds. The fund pays out nearly all the income it receives over the year, in the form of a distribution, to you and the other fund owners. Usually, you have the choice of taking the distribution check or reinvesting the earnings to purchase more shares. If you don't actually need the income to boost your cash flow, you'll certainly want to consider the reinvestment option, because it's an easy and cost-efficient way of building your share ownership. Keep in mind, though, that whether you take the distribution as a check or reinvest it, you will still owe income tax on the dividends.


You will receive your share of any net profits the fund makes from selling investments. Mutual funds usually make these capital gains distributions annually or semi-annually. You can choose to automatically reinvest these distributions back into your fund, thereby purchasing more shares. Even if you reinvest the proceeds, you'll incur taxes, but as long as the gains are long-term, you'll only have to pay the capital gains rate, which will likely be 15 percent for you.

So, look for quality funds that are appropriate for your situation and risk tolerance. Your search may well be worth the effort.
