## Perez awarded deed to home after year long battle with appraisal district

Roger Perez re-filed the deed to his house at the Kinney County Courthouse this month after he lost it for non-payment of \$3.74 in tax a year ago.

In June 2008, Perez attempted to enter his home, located at Lot 113, Unit 15 of Fort Clark Springs, and was surprised when his key did not fit the lock on the door.

Perez later found out that his house had been sold at a sheriff's sale six months earlier on November 6, 2007 for the sum of \$1,063.63 to Ned W. Allen of Fort Clark Springs and Floresville for not paying a portion of his taxes assessed by Kinney County Appraisal District (KCAD).

The house was valued at \$30,679.

According to a tax statement dated February 23, 2007 and issued by KCAD, then led by Chief Appraiser William Bill Haenn, the Unit 15 property holder owed \$3.74 in tax from the year 2006 and \$75.87 in tax from the year 2005; a total of \$113.65 with taxes, penalties

and attorney fees.

During the six month period

between the sheriff's sale and Perez' attempt to enter the prop-

erty in June 2008, Perez continued to utilize the property, pay the

utilities and maintain the lawn when he technically did not even own it.

On July 16 and 23, 2008, Perez with his former attorney attempted to reclaim his home under the Texas Property Code Chapter 34, Section 34.21, and presented a certified check to Haenn, however Haenn refused to accept the payment citing Texas Property Code 34.21, Subchapter B. Haenn contended Perez never applied for a "homestead exemption" in Kinney County and the sale of the property was legal and the appraisal district followed due process.

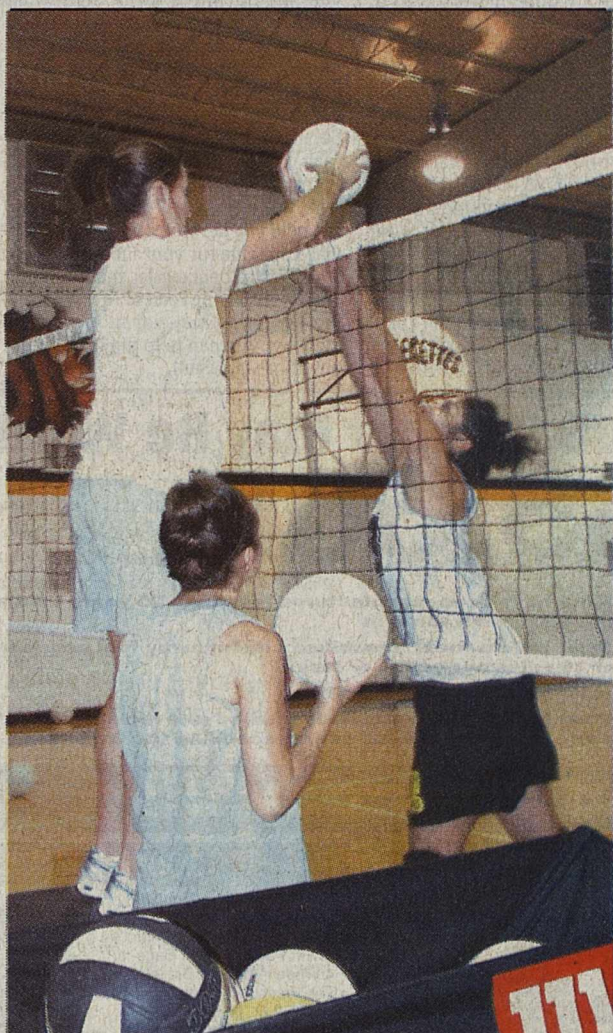
Perez, 78, refused to just walk away and paired with a new attorney, Lorri Michel of Austin, took his battle to the courts and in a confidential settlement between the parties last month, Perez was awarded the deed to his Fort Clark home and has since taken possession of it.

Family members say Perez, with ties to this community dating back to the early years of Fort Clark, is happy to be back in his home.

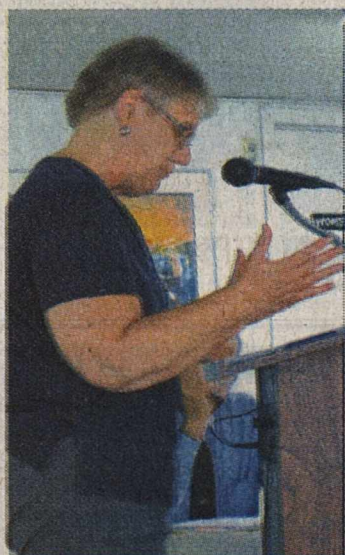

## City council sets hours for mayor Self-help grant inspection pending

At the City Council meeting Tuesday night, Lorena Mello, from the district office of Senator Uresti, announced that once again Senator Uresti is donating 50 backpacks to the Back to School Health Fair being held next week. Senator Uresti will not be able to personally attend the Health Fair due to previous obligations. However, Mello will be doing an outreach program in Brackett to address any concerns that citizens want to bring to the attention of Senator Uresti. Mello will be here the first Wednesday of every month at the library from 8am to 12pm.

Pat Sitzes addressed the council on behalf of CHEER, the Center for Health Evaluation, Education & Resources, a non-profit organization. CHEER has been heavily involved in our community for the past three years by providing services to Brackettville such as mobile mammography, diabetic education classes, the Back To School Health Fair and working with the Lions Club for the community health fair in November.

Last July, Sitzes attended the Bring Health Back to Texas conference in Austin; a program designed to help communities promote health and wellness by creating an environment that would encourage people to get more exercise. Governor Perry created the Governors Physical Fitness Advisory Board (GACPF) in 2001 as a means to keep him advised on matters related to physical fitness, sports,

exercise and health and nutrition education. The legislature directed the Texas Department of State Health Services to make \$400,000 per year in general revenue available for use by the GACPF to provide grants to local mayor's councils for the development and implementation of wellness and fitness programs in communities across the state.

Since 1990 there has been a significant increase in the preponderance of obesity in Texas. From 1991 to 2001 the percent of overweight and obese adults in Texas rose from 46 to 60 percent. Obesity directly affects costs for health care and costs for lost productivity. Obesity can also be linked to an increased risk for certain diseases such as type 2 diabetes, hypertension and a decrease in life expectancy.

Ten communities are selected to receive the grant money each year. A requirement for application is the creation of a Mayors' Physical Fitness Council comprised of key members of the community who can identify local solutions tailored to ad-

## Grass Valley, Hagee Trust file lawsuits against water district

Grass Valley Water and the John C. Hagee Royalty Trust have filed for intervenor status in Toledo P. Boulware v. Kinney County Groundwater Conservation District. A hearing has been set on Sept. 17 at 1:30 p.m. in the 63<sup>rd</sup> Judicial District Court of Kinney County with Judge Enrique Fernandez presiding.

An intervenor is someone who wants to become a party to a lawsuit because he has the same claims against the defendant, or he feels that the decision in the lawsuit might unduly impact him, so he wants to be part of any settlement and/or wants to have an opportunity to present his case to the judge.

According to the lawsuit filed by Grass Valley, "This intervention is essential to protect Grass Valley Water L.P.'s groundwater rights."

A mediated settlement agreement signed between parties in the Boulware lawsuit on July 17, greatly increased the permitted amounts of groundwater that parties to the Boulware lawsuit received compared to the amount granted to them by the district in January 2005. Additionally, the parties agreed to increase the permitted amounts for John Boerschig, Virginia Shahan and Tully Shahan, currently designated by the district as being within the Edwards-BFZ Aquifer. These E-BFZ Aquifer permits were previously not at issue in this case. Before review of the settlement agreement, Grass Valley was not aware that any E-BFZ Aquifer permits were at issue.

Grass Valley is a Texas limited partnership that has leased groundwater rights associated with approximately 22,510 acres of land in Kinney County and has applied for six regular permits from the District to pump 22,510 acre-feet of groundwater per year from the E-BFZ Aquifer in Kinney County.

A permit hearing was conducted regarding Grass Valley's permit applications before an independent hearing examiner on June 9, 2008, and concluded on June 11, 2008. The examiner issued a proposal for decision regarding Grass Valley's permit applications on Feb. 19. The amount of groundwater recommended by

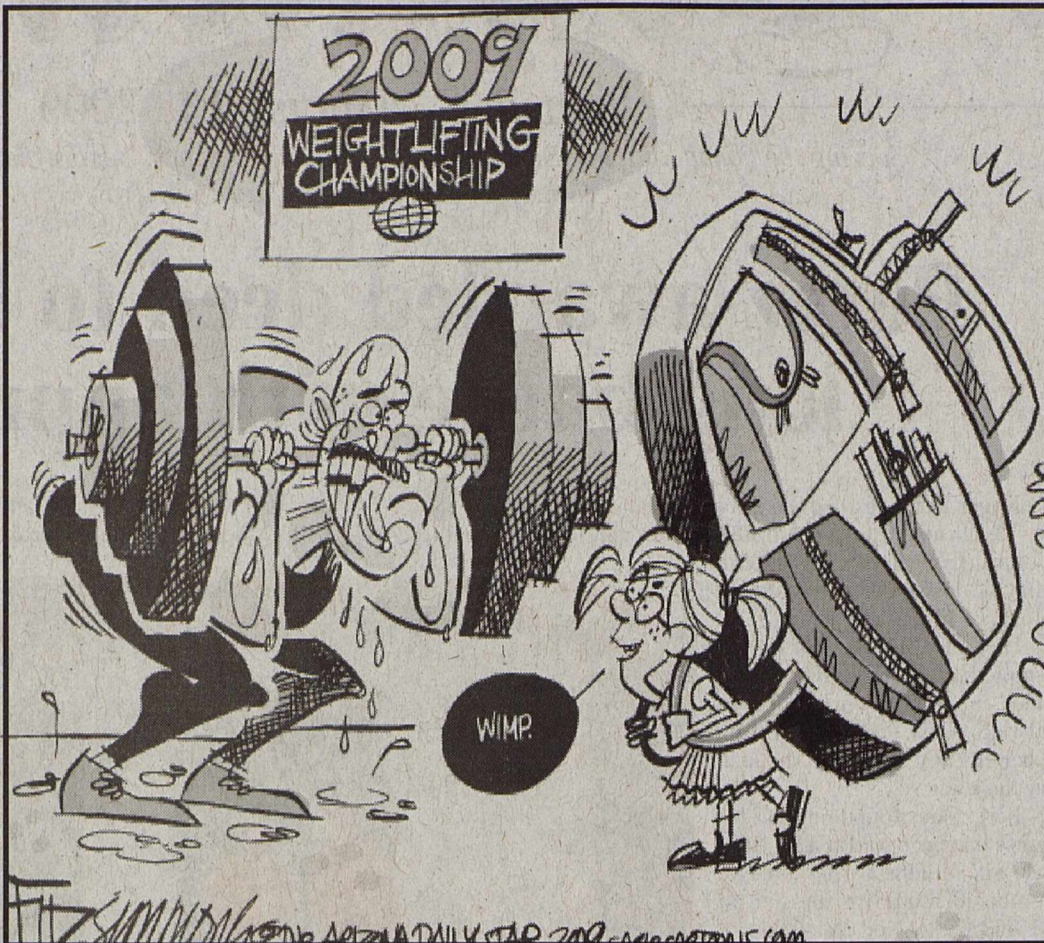

## Review financial strategies after life events

If nothing ever changed in your life, you could probably chart your financial and investment strategies and then forget about them. This chart summarizes the vaccine requirements incorporated in Title 25 Health Services, §§97.61-97.72 of the Texas Administrative Code (TAC).

This chart is not intended as a substitute for consulting the TAC, which has other provisions and details. The Department of State Health Services is granted authority to set immunization requirements by the Education Code, Chapter 38, Health & Safety, Subchapter A, General Provisions.

dress the specific needs of the area. Recipients of the grant money would then work within their areas to encourage community efforts to increase opportunities for physical activity. Examples would be to provide education on good nutrition or set aside a day encouraging employees to walk to work or ride a bike.

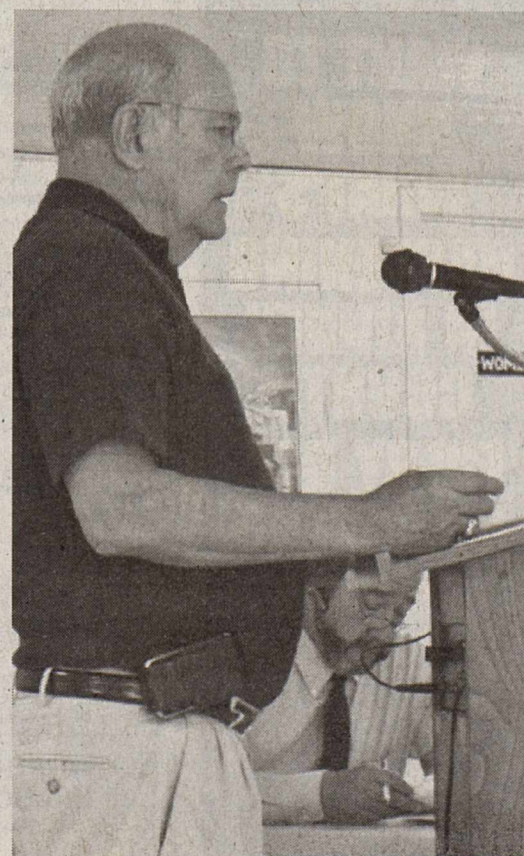
Sizes asked the City Council to consider forming a Mayors' Physical Fitness Council. Information on the grant will be available in September.

Raul Garcia, Garcia & Wright Consulting Engineers, Inc. presented to the City Council their qualifications as engineers to work with the city on engineering projects dealing with water, sewer, streets and drainage; to assist with the required plans and with the preparation of applications to state and federal agencies for grant money. While they would provide these services to the city at no cost, it would be with the understanding that if the city receives the grants Garcia & Wright would be hired as the engineers for the project, taking the project from its inception through completion. Garcia presented several references, including a water project they are currently doing for Carrizo Springs. Carrizo Springs received

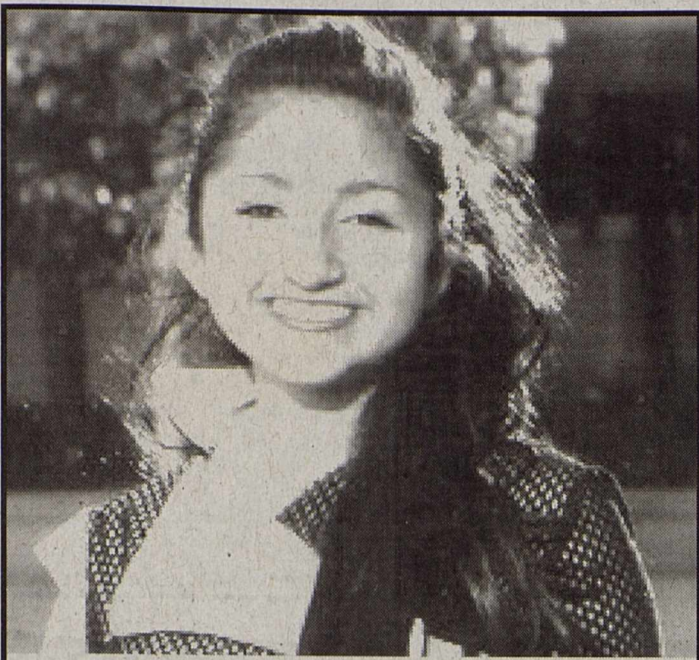
a 100% grant from the Office of Rural Community Affairs (ORCA).  
 City Manager Henry Garcia stated he signed the contract with ORCA on the Planning and Capacity Grant. "We have been awarded a grant of \$21,900 and the purpose of that is to do our planning and capacity; resurveying some of the areas in the city, converting the city maps into digital format and doing some zoning and street improvement studies. This is a two year project. Official funding is September 1."  
 Mayor Feagley has set office hours in order to accommodate the needs of the citizens to address any concerns they may have. He will be in his office at City Hall on Mondays from 8am until 12 noon. In the event he is ill or out of town, Mary Flores, Mayor Pro-Tem will be available. On Tuesday, August 18<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 pm there will be a Town Hall meeting with representatives from ORCA. Brackettville is always contending with water leaks that are a drain on our resources. At the June meeting of the City Council, Mr. Esser, Esser and Company, Planning and Consulting, suggested that Garcia send a letter of interest to ORCA for the Texas Small Towns Environment Program (STEP). Communities may apply for the Texas STEP by invitation from ORCA only. ORCA will not accept an application for STEP Fund assistance until CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) staff and representatives of

the potential applicant have evaluated the self-help process and have determined that self-help is a feasible method for completion of the water or sewer project and that the community is ready and has the capacity to begin and complete a self-help project. As a result of the letter Garcia sent, representatives from ORCA will meet with city officials and citizens of Brackettville to determine if the community is committed to and has the capacity to complete a self-help program using its' own employees and equipment. If the assessment is favorable and the community meets all of the STEP criteria, then an invitation to apply for funds will be extended. Garcia asks that our community leaders and interested citizens attend the Town Hall meeting and show support for our community.

The meeting adjourned at 7:25pm. Present were Mayor Feagley, Alderman Williams and Alderwomen Flores, Buitron, Garza and Mendoza.



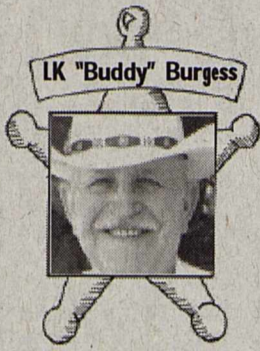
