Swirly bulbs may be danger to pets; **Can be recycled locally at RGEC**

Compact alternative to regular incandescent bulbs, but can pose a danger to people and their pets if not properly disposed of.

CFLs contain small amounts of mercury and in extreme cases can cause kidney and brain damage, reports msnbc.com, but if properly handled, the benefits from these bulbs can have a significant impact on the environment because they use 75 percent less energy than the incandescent bulb and with that reduce the greenhouse gases that can be emitted into the air.

According to energy star.gov, it is important to dispose of a burned out bulb by taking it to a recycling center like the one located here in Kinney County at Rio Grande Electric Cooperative on east Highway 90 and take the proper precautions during a clean-up situation if a bulb breaks.





Speaking of noise...I was eating with some friends this week and we were sitting at a table and laughing.


I don't think anything we had to say was all that funny, but we were laughing very hard just the same.





Despite having problems later on in life with the media, Mr. Godfrey continued to do commercials, and direct. He was one of the first environmentalists, and only would sponsor products that were "safe" for the en-vironment. He developed emphysema and succumbed to the disease in 1983. The Proposed Rules are intended to amend the Authority's existing rules by adding a new section related to the control of fires on the recharge zone of the Edwards Aquifer. Chapter 713 (Water Quality) Chapter 713, Subchapter F (Hazardous Substances Registration, Storage, and Planning) The Proposed Rules would add to the Authority's rules new § 713.513, related to the control of fires on the recharge zone. The new section would create a requirement for affected entities located on the recharge zone of the Edwards Aquifer to take certain actions designed to help protect the aquifer during firefighting activities. 
