Good dam news

The Kinney County dams underwent an inspection by the Federal Government last year and their general assessment was reported as "Good".

The dams, located just outside the Brackettville City Lim-

its on Highway 674, were built in 1962 under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act by the West Nueces-Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District, City of Brackettville and Kinney County Commissioners Court with assistance of Soil Conser-

vation Service of the US Department of Agriculture, read documents released by Haden Keyser of the Natural Resource Conservation Services (NRCS) on November 9.

The dams of the Upper Las Moras Creek are divided by Highway 674, or the highway

that leads out to the Alamo Village.

The West Dam, or Site 1 has a drainage area of 4,269 acres with a total water storage of 2,334 acre feet. The dam is 40 feet high.

The East Dam, or Site 2 has a drainage area of 1,267 acres

with a total water storage of 721 acre feet. The dam, much smaller than that of the West Dam, is 32 feet high.

Keyser says the West Dam was recently cleared after state

Melancon still winner

With a narrow win over his opponent on Election Day for Kinney County Commissioner Precinct 4, Incumbent Pat Melancon (D), took home a second win after a recount on November 10.

David Tinney, the Republican candidate for Precinct 4 called for recount after the results from November 2, gave the election to Melancon by only five votes.

Tinney garnered 249 votes to Melancon's 254.

The recount was held in the District Courtroom Wednesday morning and errors in the vote count were found, but the race

ended the same way, with Melancon five votes ahead.

Tinney's early vote count was originally 169 votes, but the recount reduced it to 167 votes. Tinney received 80 votes on election day and the recount bumped him up to 81 votes. Tinney's total votes after the recount was reduced to 248 votes.

Melancon received 149 early votes and the recount confirmed the number. On Election Day Melancon's vote also dropped down by one vote to 104 votes, making his new total 253 votes.

All the results are still unofficial until the votes are canvassed by the Commissioners Court.

FCS hires new DO; appoints Farlow

Fort Clark Springs Association board of directors hired Ron Stuard as the new director of operations (DO) at a Special meeting on November 8.

Stuard, of the Irran-Sheffield area, replaces former Director of Operations Felix Cerna who was unexpectedly dismissed on October 20.

In a brief interview with Stuard on November 10, he stated he plans to find out the wants and needs of the membership and the board and work to get them accomplished within the confines of the budget.

Stuard hopes with his background as a businessman and experience gained from serving on economic development and golf course association boards

over the years, he will be able to get his feet underneath himself quickly.

"I would like to make Fort Clark as good a place to live as anywhere," said Stuard.

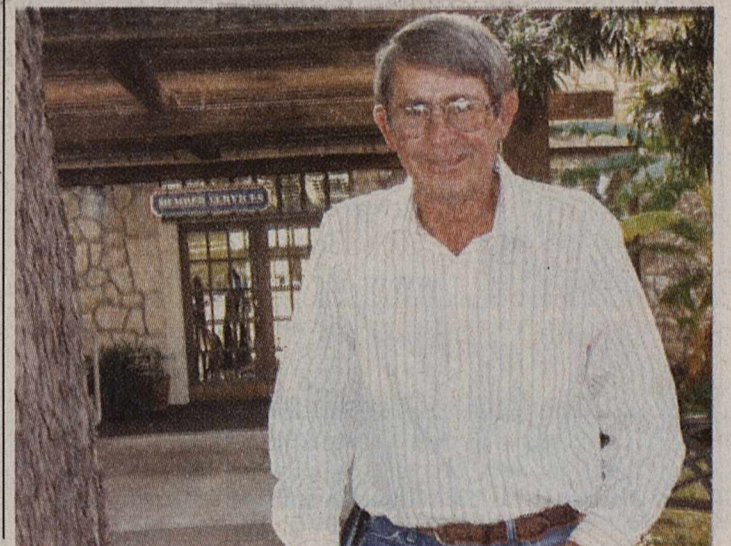
Other action taken at the meeting was the appointment of Larry Farlow as a director. Farlow fills the second slot left open after the resignations of Rick Keyes and Hattie Berleth last month.

Keyes and Berleth were opposed to the firing of Cerna and immediately resigned their positions as directors in protest.

Henry Garcia was selected and sworn in on October 25.

Jack Howard was also chosen to serve, but declined the appointment as he is relocating out of the area, said Fort Clark Springs Association Board President Sam Holloman yesterday.

safety inspectors recommended fences surrounding the dams needed to be mended to prevent cattle from grazing on the embankments which can lead to the erosion damage of the structures. Cutting down the Mesquite trees and treating their roots with a herbicide was also been recommended. Mesquite trees have a deep, single root systems that also can lead to erosion on the sides of the dam.

The NRCS website explains after the Dust Bowl in 1935, the federal government formed an agency in order to help educate land owners on how to:

- Assess the resources on the land, the conservation problems and opportunities.
- Draw on various sciences and disciplines and integrate all their contributions into a plan for the whole property.
- Work closely with land users so that the plans for conservation mesh with their objectives.
- Through implementing conservation on individual properties, contribute to the overall quality of the life in the watershed or region.

Keyser says in the last ten years NRCS has started offering financial assistance as well.

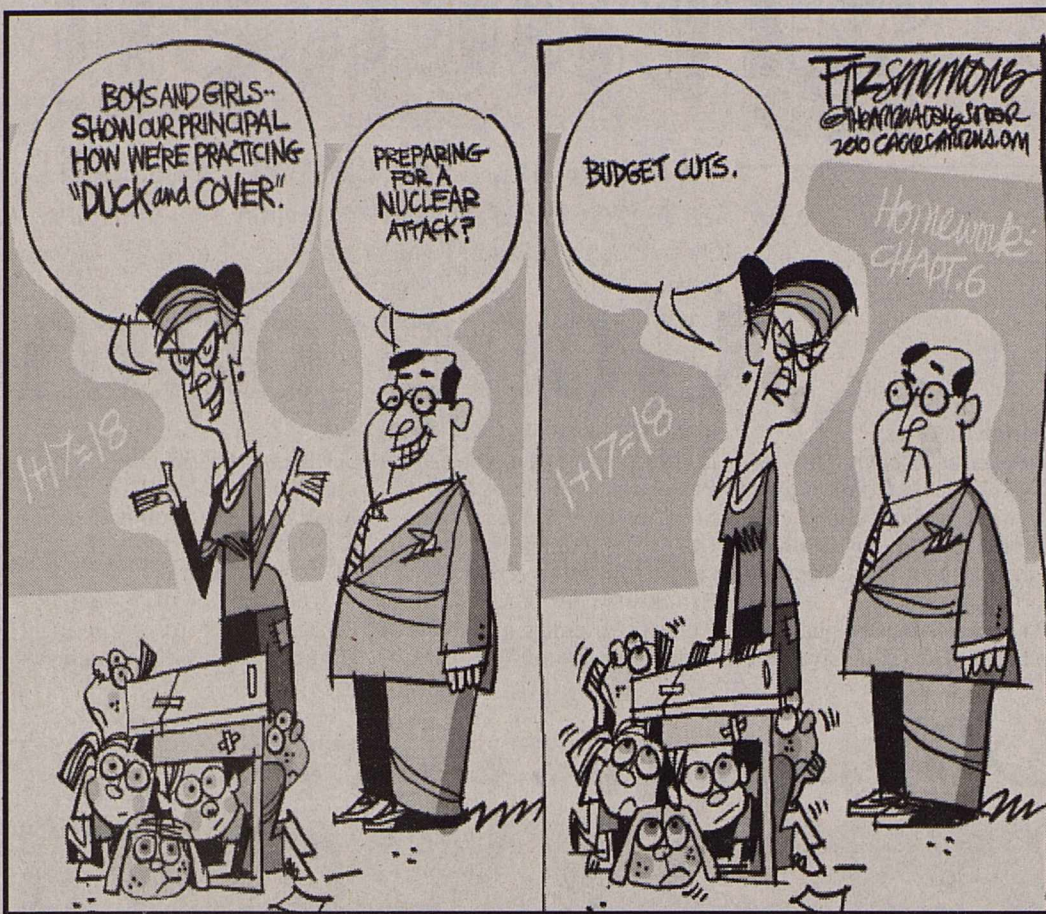
History of flooding in Brackettville: Up until 1960, Brackettville suffered through several damaging floods. The most damaging floods occurred on June 17, 1958. The flood encompassed 966 acres of agricultural land and 35 blocks in the City of Brackettville.

The NRCS records also state the flood of September 1, 1932 was nearly as severe of that of 1958. Other floods of record occurred in 1948, 1949, 1951, 1955 and 1957.

A little history as taken from the Kinney County Soil and Water Conservation office:

- In 1960, 93 percent of the land in Kinney County was used as rangeland and 0.4 percent was used as crop land
- Annual rainfall was 22 inches
- Brackettville had a population of 1,850
- Most common grasses were buffalo, curly mesquite, sideoats grama, plains bristlegrass and plains lovegrass. Most common trees were live oak, elm, pecan, hackberry and mesquite.

Local Soil and Water Conservation Board members are: Bret Trant, Jim Bader, Tully Shahan, Stan Conolly and Zack Davis. Local farmer, Jim McDaniel recently stepped down after 25 years of service on the board.

Use "Open Enrollment" to help meet financial goals

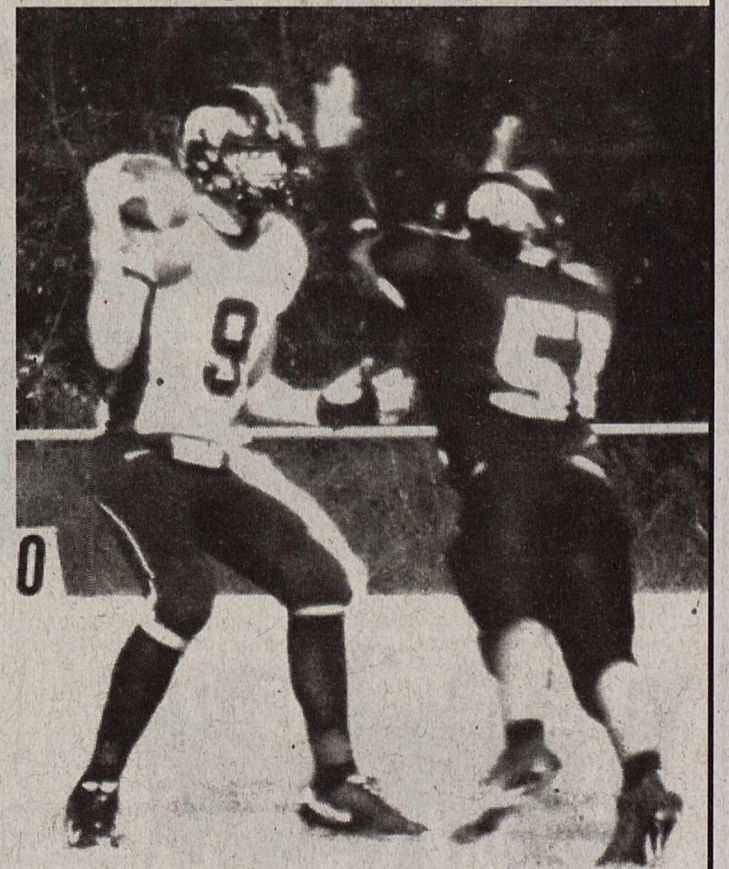

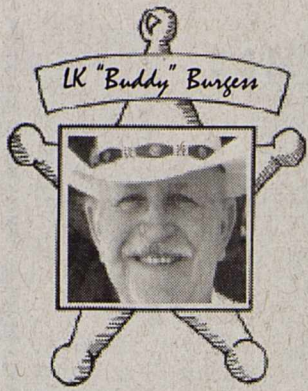

Methodist Guitar Outreach Ministry



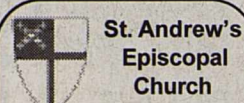
