Kinney County will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of its courthouse on Tuesday, March 22

Section eight, Page ten of the National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet reads, "Although Kinney County was growing, and the railroad connected it to larger cities both east and west, the area retained the feeling of a "weld west" town. An enlisted man station at Fort Clark in 1889 painted Brackettville as a raucous frontier town in an article for the New Your Herald Tribune: "Adjacent to Ft. Clark, across a narrow stream dignified by the name of Las Moras River, was Brackettville, a nondescript frontier town, ten miles from the railroad, County seat of Kinney County and about the worst place on the map. Everything ever pictured in the 'movies' of the wildest kind was there, and lots more. The population was some 500, mostly Mexicans. Saloons were on every corner and plenty in between . Dance halls, brothels - let your imagination run riot and you may approximate what this town was in those hectic days...there were several kinds of dances indulged in that are not seen on stage or ballroom floor. There was cheap liquor,

cards, all kinds of gambling, women and no legal restraint.'

A description of that kind definitely supported the commissioners desire to build a larger courthouse

"Expansion of the army post at Fort Clark led to the subsequent growth of the town. This growth was not all peaceful Brackettville held many time more saloons than churches. The courthouse served a significant role in reversing this situation. The law and lawmen were kept busy keeping the peace. The level of peacekeeping activity made it necessary for the county to expand current quarters or build a new courthouse. The "Brackett News" of 1891, published a request for pros and cons regarding the new courthouse, from taxpayers and others with an interest in their town and county," read Architexas' history of Kinney County.

The courthouse construction was deemed complete on March 22, 1911 by Judge Joe Veltmann and Precinct 1 Commissioner N. Castro, Precinct 2 Commissioner Albert Schwander, Precinct 3 Commissioner R.E. Cannon and Precinct 4 Commissioner J.F. McCormick.

The cost for construction was \$44,500 and another \$1,950 was spent on furnishings, including benches still being used in the courthouse today.

Current Kinney County Judge Tim Ward and commissioners Pat Melancon, Joe Montalvo, Woody Massingill and Dennis Dodson invite the public to join in the Centennial Celebration on Tuesday, March 22, at 2 p.m.

History of the courthouse and the plans for its restoration and preservation will be presented.

## Teens busted with booze; **EMS** finds bag of pot

Five juveniles were busted with booze after a Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) Officer pulled them over in front of the Kinney County EMS Station on March

At around 8:30 in the evening, the DPS officer found the group of teens to be intoxicated or in possession of alcoholic beverages and proceeded to charge the juvenile driver with driving while intoxicated and cited the four passengers with minor in possession offenses. The driver was not processed in Kinney County. The passengers were ticketed and released to the custody of their parents. The vehicle was towed away by Del Rio Towing.

Later the same evening, the Kinney County Sheriff's Department received a call from a county EMS employee requesting a deputy's assistance at the station. The employee was cleaning up the area in front of the EMS station and found a bag of marijuana.

A deputy was dispatched to the scene and took the bag to the Sheriff's Department for processing.

Kinney County Sheriff LK Buddy Burgess said Wednesday, he did not know if the two incidents were related.

I had an entirely different PLOG for this week but I receive such interesting things and I thought this was worth the read.

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

Brackett Boys Teams finished fifth and sixth out of ten teams.




# Earthquake in Japan

Measuring Earthquakes An earthquake is one of the most powerful forces on earth. Scientists use an instrument called a

seismograph to measure earthquakes. Try this activity to get an idea of how a seismograph works.



## Try This

1. On a table place a small toy car on a piece of paper.

2. One person holds a pencil with the lead lightly resting on the paper.

3. The other person moves the paper back and forth very slowly. What kind of line does the pencil make? Does the car move?

4. Move the paper so that the car starts to slide around. What kind of line does the pencil make now?

#### How do earthquakes happen?



When you crack the shell of a hard-boiled egg, you get a lot of separate pieces or plates of shell. The crust of the earth is like the shell of a hard-boiled egg. It is broken up into plates. too. But, unlike the pieces of a

hard-boiled egg, the plates of the earth's crust move.

When these plates move and collide, one of the plates can slide beneath the other.


