Former Judge Ford completes sentence; Avoids jail time

Former Kinney County Justice of the Peace John Ford III completed his probation and will not have to serve any jail time for stealing money when he was a judge, according to court documents.

On July 13, 2010, Ford was booked into the Kinney County Jail, after the State contended he did not comply with the conditions of his deferred adjudication.

As printed in this publication in 2007, Ford, accused of theft by a public servant, made a deal

with the State in the 63rd District court on July 24, 2007, only minutes before the start of his jury trial.

Ford stood before then District Judge Tom Lee, and quietly entered his plea of, "Guilty," to theft by a public servant; only one of the two

charges pending against him.

The former judge was indicted in December, 2005, after clerks, working under his employ, suspected he was stealing money paid to the Justice of the Peace (JP) Court for traffic violations issued by Department of Transportation Troop-

ers and local sheriff deputies.

According to the investigation reports completed by Texas Ranger Sgt. Coy Smith and submitted to the court by District Attorney Fred Hernandez, Ford cashed money orders made pay

Manger led vs. council led form of city govt

Brackettville City Manager Henry Garcia and Police Chief Vito LaGioia have been embroiled in a months-long power struggle that nearly came to blows at a recent budget workshop.

Chief LaGioia was served with two written reprimands at a Regular council meeting on August 9, after he threatened to taze Garcia at a workshop on August 2. LaGioia said he believed Garcia made hostile advances towards him as the two argued over whether or not LaGioia answered directly to Garcia in the chain of command and if LaGioia should have a separate budget for the police department. LaGioia believes he should answer only to the council. A discussion about reprimanding Garcia is planned for the September Regular meeting.

As reported by this newspaper in April of this year and in March of 2009, the Brackettville City Council has the authority to appoint a city manager without an election, Municipal Law and Procedure Manual, Chapter 7.01, "The city council of a municipality may appoint a "city manager" or "city administrator" without an election for a city manager plan."

The difference between a manger led and council led form of government is described in the Municipal Law and Procedure Manual, Section 4.06, "In many smaller Type A municipalities the city council appoint a city manager. This is not necessarily the same as the city manager plan form of government discussed in Manual, Chapter 7. The city council simply uses its powers under LGC Section 22.071 and Section 22.072 to create the office of city manager and prescribe the duties of that office."

The duties of city manger were prescribed in the Resolution, No. 2011-04-04, which reads, "Whereas, The City Council in a Regular meeting on May 2005, took action to further affirm the position of City Manager Plan. Whereby, the City Council Serves as the Legislative Body of City government. Whereas, The City Council affirms under the City Manager plan, the City Manager serves as the Chief Executive and Administrative Officer of the City. Has unilateral authority over all Department Heads; and is accountable to the City Council for the proper conduct of all Municipal Operations." This resolution was passed with a majority vote on April 12, 2011.

The Municipal Law and Procedure Manual does caution city councils they, "retain responsibility, regardless of the title assigned to the position," and they can only delegate nondiscretionary ministerial and administrative tasks to the manager, (Manual, Chapter 7.03 (b.)) The cautionary advice also includes references to the Texas Attorney General Opinion No. JC-0544. This opinion details the council's authority under Local Government Code Chapters 22 and 25. The City of Brackettville operates according to Chapter 22, a distinction made in the resolution in April.

City Attorney Heriberto Morales, Jr. said via email Wednesday, "For example, I informed the Mayor that during the budget, she was the chief budget officer in charge of presenting the budget. Obviously, she could delegate all administrative work to the city manager and other employees (have them do all the legwork in compiling numbers and information) but if there was a question as to who was ultimately responsible for the budget it was the Mayor. It was one of those tasks that could not be farmed off to someone else. It was a sovereign function. Administration is fully aware of this distinction. The same goes for the hiring of the (Chief of Police). That function belongs to the Council and the Council voted to hire Vito. Obviously, the city manager was the one that did the legwork in reviewing the candidates and recommending someone to the Council but it was the Council itself that took action."

Off-duty federal agent survives crash

An off-duty federal agent survived a motorcycle accident on August 25.

A caller from the US Border Patrol reported a motorcycle accident on Highway 334, two miles outside of Brackettville at 8 p.m. last Thursday.

According to the Kinney County Sheriff's Department, the driver lost control of his 2009 Suzuki near the main gate of the Evans U-Bar ranch and collided with the fence.

Fearing possible head injuries, the driver was transported by Kinney County EMS to the landing zone area at the entrance of Fort Clark Springs where he was air-lifted to a trauma center in San Antonio.

The victim has been released from the hospital.

Legislation regulating speed limits

Texas motorists may notice some changes to speed limit signs in the next several months, as new laws regulating speed limits on the roadways of the state highway system begin to take effect.

The 82nd Texas Legislature passed and the Governor signed House Bill 1353, which takes effect on September 1. This legislation allows the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to create a 75-mile per hour speed limit on any state highway found to be reasonable and safe through a speed study. TxDOT will be reviewing existing 70-mile per hour speed limits to determine where a 75-mile per hour speed limit may be safely posted.

HB 1353 also eliminates the 65-mile per hour nighttime

speed limit and all truck speed limits. On September 1, the existing nighttime and truck speed limits are repealed and no longer enforceable.

TxDOT awarded maintenance contracts in August to remove the nighttime and truck speed limit signs and is also in the process of hiring consultants to perform the required speed studies needed to implement the higher speed limits.

"We will be removing the existing nighttime speed limit signs, truck speed limit signs, and evaluating approximately 50,000 miles of state highway with a current 70-mile hour speed limit," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT Director of Traffic Operations. "With these contracts in place, we are moving steadily ahead to implement these new laws. However, it is important

to remember that any increases to speed limits are not effective until the new speed limit signs are actually installed."

Speed limits in Texas are set by the 85th percentile method, which represents the speed the majority of drivers are traveling at or below. This is a sound engineering principle used to set speed limits on highways nationwide for the past 60 years. The existing 65-mile per hour night and truck speed limit signs should be removed by the end of this year. The complete evaluation of the state highway system and posting of all new 75-mile per hour speed limits should be complete by early 2013.

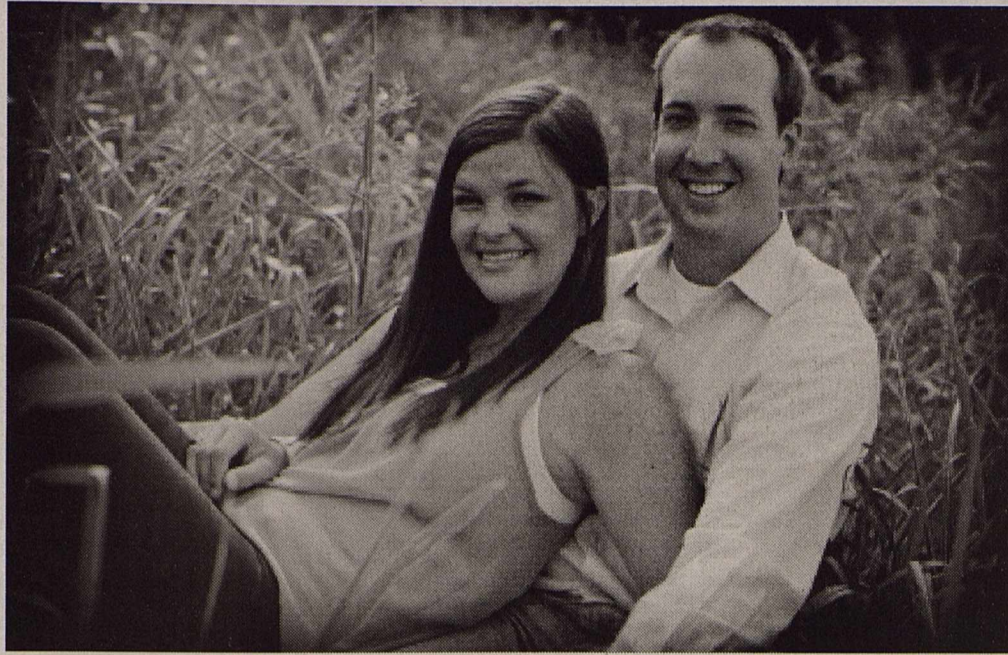


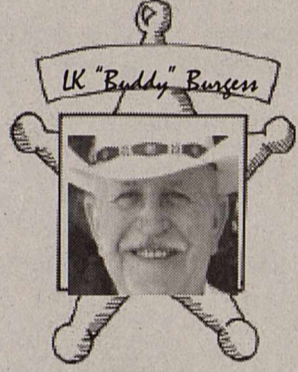

Save Your Excuses for the Judge

2011 Labor Day "Drink, Drive, Go to Jail"

After the scorching weather Texas has had this year, a few cold beers may sound like welcome relief as summer draws to an end. However, the sad reality is that far too many impaired motorists will get behind the wheel over Labor Day weekend, putting themselves and the rest of us at risk for serious injury or death. They'll also be taking a big chance on being pulled over and taken to jail.

If previous trends hold, on average, an alcohol-related crash will occur approximately every 20 minutes in Texas during Labor Day weekend. That's why police officers, sheriff's deputies, and state troopers will be

out in force to arrest drunk drivers.

The standard excuses for driving while intoxicated won't fly. Law enforcement has heard them all. Telling a police officer or state trooper that you're ok to drive, that you're only going a few blocks, or that you're being extra careful won't protect you from a night in jail, legal fees, a hefty fine, and all the other consequences that go with a DWI arrest and conviction.

The Texas Department of Transportation is again joining forces with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to support the annual national crackdown on impaired drivers. According to an August 2010 NHTSA report, Texas has the dubious distinction of being the national leader when it comes to deaths from crashes in which a driver had a

blood alcohol concentration at or over .08, the state's legal limit for intoxication. In 2010, the state saw 25,032 alcohol-related crashes that resulted in 1,057 deaths and 16,877 injuries.

No excuse can make up for a family member or friend killed or injured by a drunk driver.

So if your holiday plans include alcohol, think twice before you drive. Designate a driver in advance. Ask someone sober to take you home. Call a cab. Just stay where you are until you're sober and can drive safely. Any inconvenience pales in comparison to the pain and suffering that goes with a drunk driving crash.

If neither concern for yourself or others on the road is motivation enough not to drive if you've been drinking, law enforcement has this promise for you: drink, drive, go to jail.
