Trained & Certified Volunteers at the Kinney County Public Library will once again offer free tax return preparation through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program.

The VITA program reaches out to people whose incomes are \$49,000 or less and will prepare basic Form 1040 tax returns, including Schedules A for Itemized deductions, claims for the Earned Income Tax Credit and other tax credits.

E-filing provides the highest degree of speed, accuracy and security in filing tax returns. Last year more than 78 Kinney County residents e-filed their federal tax returns through the VITA Program.

County's oldest resident celebrates 101!

"I feel good! I don't even feel like I'm 100!" were the words of Kinney County's oldest resident Theresa Garcia on her 100th birthday. A year later, on her 101st birthday Garcia has the same response.

Born Theresa Urbina to Juan and Virginia (Delgado) in Monterrey, Mexico on January 17, 1911, Garcia moved to Brackettville as a young girl. Garcia lived at 214 James Street in a house that still stands today. Garcia lived in her James Street home until about ten years ago. Garcia currently lives with her granddaughter Noemi

Martinez in Brackettville.

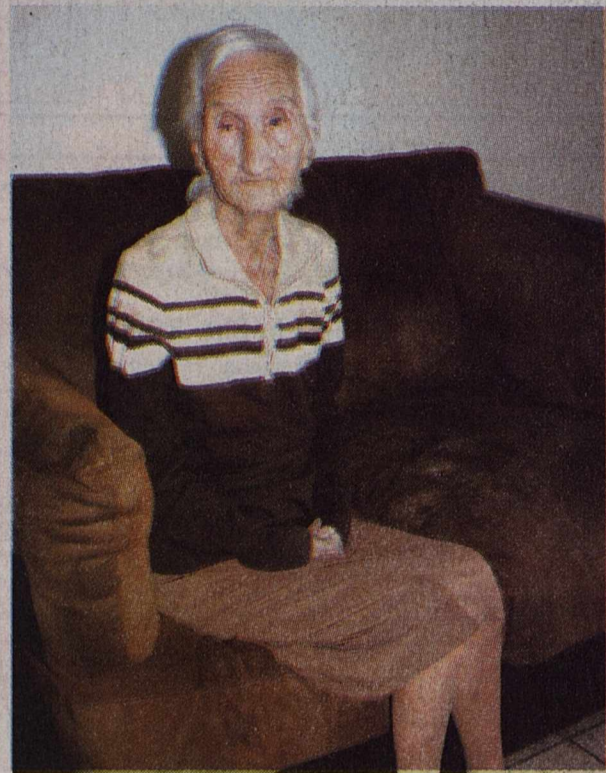
Garcia's mother died when she was only eight, but her father, Juan, a shoemaker at Fort Clark, stayed on in Brackettville where he raised his nine children.

Garcia, the youngest and only living sibling, married Victor Garcia, Sr. on November 19, 1933. Victor, Sr. was a cook at Fort Clark and Garcia was a wife, homemaker and mother to three children, Juan Garcia, Julia G. Terrazas and Victor Garcia, Jr.

Juan Garcia died at age one; Julia G. Terrazas passed away at age 74 in May, 2010; and Victor Garcia, Jr. currently lives in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Garcia was surrounded by her loved ones at the Martinez residence, as she blew out her candles.

At one hundred and one years old, Garcia has been given the rare opportunity to see her family grown from her own three children to one that has nine grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren and 26 great-great grandchildren.

Car chase ends in Brackett

A man was detained by the Kinney County Sheriff's Office for reckless driving and evading arrest with a motor vehicle on January 10.

According to the Kinney County Sheriff's office, the 33 year old, Houston man reportedly checked himself out of a mental health facility and then went for a drive that ended at Spring and Gove streets in Brackettville.

At approximately 10 p.m. last Tuesday, an off duty federal agent reported a driver in an orange and gray Honda was following behind him on Highway 90 without the use of his headlights.

Deputies responded to the call

and quickly fell in behind the Honda that was traveling west towards Del Rio. According to official reports, the deputy activated his overhead lights and the driver accelerated his speed. The car was clocked on radar at speeds exceeding 90 miles per hour. The deputy passed the Honda and forced the driver to eventually stop on Spring Street near the post office.

The man was rambling incoherently; however, he was quoted saying he thought driving with his lights off evading and driving at a high rate of speed was, "really fun."

No charges were filed against the Houston man and he was turned over to state psychiatric authorities.

The Honda was towed to Del Rio.

EMS applies for special exception

Kinney County Emergency Medical Service (EMS) held a public meeting to discuss their request for a special variance on January 12.

Kinney County EMS Administrator Jim Titchenell said the county's medical service operation is challenged, not for its quality of care, but by the number of local certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) it has on staff.

The State of Texas requires an ambulance to be staffed with two certified medics, even if one of them is serving as a driver. Titchenell explained this does

not create a problem until the station is tasked with two calls at the same time.

The average medical call for one ambulance that requires transport to an area hospital can take up to three hours, said Titchenell. The closest hospital, Val Verde Regional Medical Center, is 30 miles away and the second closest hospital, Uvalde Memorial Hospital, is nearly 40 miles away from Brackettville.

The special variance to the current regulations would allow a Kinney County Volunteer Fireman to drive an ambulance with a certified medic on board to respond to a second call if its first crew is busy. The fireman would only be allowed to assist

the medic and drive the ambulance, not make decisions regarding the care of a patient.

Without the special exception to the rule that requires two certified medics to man an ambulance, second call patients would have to wait for a mutual aid ambulance and medics to travel from Del Rio to receive any care.

The county expects the approval from the state by the end of the month and if approved it will expire on December 31 of this year.

Kinney County Volunteer firemen will be offered a state sponsored ambulance driving class and will also be working to obtain their EMT certifications.

"With that many EMTs, the station will no longer need the variance and it would also open the station up to becoming a 'first responder' facility and it would then qualify for applicable funding," said Titchenell.

Kinney County EMS responded to 500 calls in 2011 and averages 15-20 'double calls' per month, with approximately five of them requiring mutual aid.

Titchenell, hired as the EMS Administrator, is a businessman with years of supervisory experience in the medical field. Titchenell is currently studying to obtain his EMT certification.

Kinney County EMS services an area of more than 1,600 square miles with 3,800 residents.

If your job is to dig a ditch and you don't plan and implement bringing the shovels, the job isn't going to get done. The people we need on the council are people who will bring the shovels.

It is time for the leaders in our community to answer their town's call for help and direction.

Do what is right!

Don't play politics with your investment decisions

While the election season heats up, you will hear more and more promises, claims and counter-claims from the candidates. Stick with quality. It's a good idea, when owning stocks, to invest in quality companies with diversified businesses. These companies are usually less dependent on a particular government program, and they typically have a global reach, so they may be better able to handle any changes implemented in Washington.

Stay focused on your long-term goals. Politicians come and go, and our political parties seem to take turns holding the reins of power. Yet your long-term goals — such as college for your children, a comfortable retirement and the ability to leave a legacy to your family — don't really change. By realizing that you are largely responsible for achieving your goals, and by following an investment strategy that's suitable for your individual risk tolerance and time horizon, you can make gradual, but still meaningful, progress toward those goals — no matter what's happening in Washington.

Review your strategy regularly. With the possible approach of changes in tax policies and in government programs that can affect your retirement security, you'll want to review your investment strategy regularly to make sure it's still on track toward helping you meet your objectives. As part of this review, you may want to seek out more "tax-smart" investment opportunities, while always looking for ways to supply the asset growth you'll need to enjoy the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

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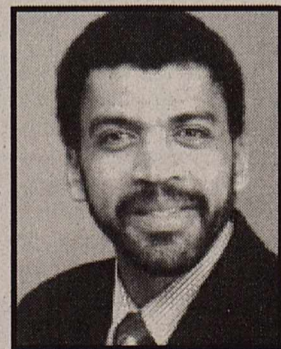
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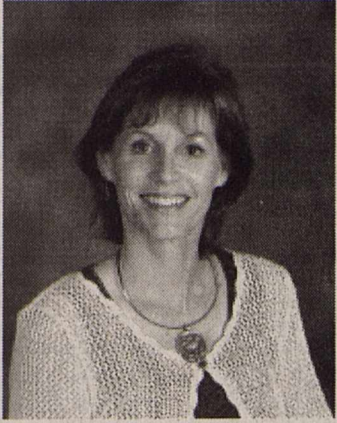

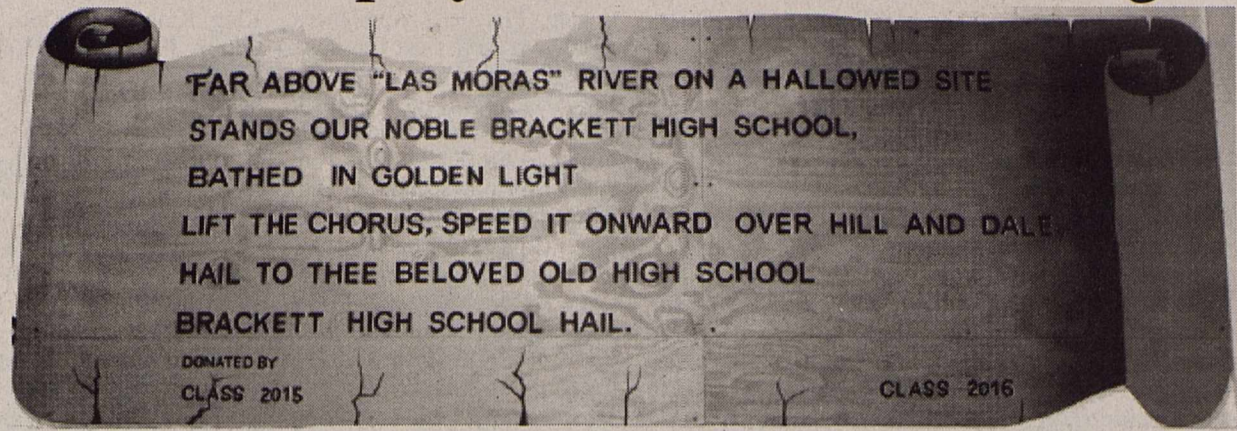
Finally, there was the last burger but I did not eat it or even look at it because I knew Gramma needed it. When I gave it to her she looked in it and then threw it on the TV.

TEMPLE, TEXAS, Jan. 6, 2012- USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) State Conservationist Salvador Salinas reminds agriculture producers that the ranking period cut-off date for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) is January 27, 2012. Producers interested in CSP should submit applications to their local NRCS office by the deadline so their applications can be considered during the first ranking period of 2012.

"CSP gives conservation minded producers the ability to apply and build on their current stewardship efforts," says Salinas. "Farmers and ranchers actively engaged in natural resource conservation practice have the opportunity to earn financial rewards through CSP."

CSP is a voluntary five-year program offered to landowners statewide through continuous sign-up. Producers interested in CSP should submit applications to their local NRCS office by the deadline so their applications can be considered during this first ranking period in 2012.

Eligible lands include cropland, pastureland, rangeland and nonindustrial forestland and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of Indian tribes. Individual landowners, legal entities and Indian tribes may be eligible to apply for CSP assistance. Participants will have the opportunity to receive payments for practices that maintain and improve water and soil quality, as well as enhance wildlife habitat.

EQIP is a valuable tool to help Kinney County's agricultural producers implement conservation practices that provide environmental benefits to help sustain agricultural operations.

EQIP is a continuous sign-up program that allows landowners or operators to apply for financial and technical assistance for the application of specific conservation practices; but the deadline for the first 2012 funding is

February 3, 2012. Contracts are offered periodically depending on budgetary allocations. Applications made after the deadline will be considered in the next funding cycle. Higher priority will be given to those applications that address national, state and local priorities and provide higher cost efficiency.

EMS aplica para modificación especial

El Servicio de Emergencia Médica del Condado de Kinney (Kinney County Emergency Medical Service — EMS por sus siglas) llevó a cabo el 12 de enero una conferencia pública para hablar sobre su petición de modificación especial.

El Administrador del Servicio de Emergencia Médica del Condado de Kinney Jim Titchenell dijo que la operación de servicios médicos del condado se ve amenazada no por su calidad de atención, sino por el número de Técnicos de Emergencia Médica certificados que tiene en su personal.

El Estado de Texas requiere que una ambulancia cuente con dos médicos certificados, incluso aunque uno de ellos se desempeñe como conductor. Titchenell explicó que esto no significa ningún problema a menos que la estación tenga que responder a dos llamadas al mismo tiempo.

El promedio de la llamada médica de una ambulancia que

requiere el transporte a un hospital del área puede tomarse hasta tres horas, dijo Titchenell. El hospital más cercano, Val Verde Regional Medical Center, se encuentra a 30 millas de distancia y el segundo hospital más cercano, Uvalde Memorial Hospital, está a casi 40 millas de distancia de Brackettville.

La modificación especial al reglamento vigente permitiría que un Bombero Voluntario del Condado de Kinney pueda conducir una ambulancia con un médico certificado a bordo para responder a una segunda llamada de auxilio, si la primera tripulación está ocupada. Al bombero sólo se le permitiría asistir al médico y conducir la ambulancia, sin tomar decisiones respecto al cuidado del paciente.

Sin la modificación especial a la regla, que requiere de dos médicos certificados por ambulancia, la segunda llamada de auxilio de algún paciente tendría que esperar la llegada de una ambulancia y médicos de ayuda mutua para ser trasladado

a Del Rio para recibir atención. El condado espera la aprobación del estado para finales del mes y si la petición es aprobada, el plazo vencerá el 31 de diciembre de este año.

A los Bomberos Voluntarios del Condado de Kinney se le ofrecerá una clase de conducción de ambulancia patrocinada por el estado y estarán trabajando también para obtener su certificación de Técnicos de Emergencia Médica.

"Con tantos Técnicos de Emergencia Médica, la estación ya no necesitaría la modificación y convertiría también la estación en una instalación de "primeros auxilios" permitiéndole calificar para los fondos correspondientes," dijo Titchenell.

El Servicio de Emergencia Médica del Condado de Kinney respondió a 500 llamadas en 2011 y un promedio de 15 a 20 "dobles llamadas" por mes, requiriendo aproximadamente cinco de ellas de la ayuda mutua.

Contratado como Administrador del Servicio de Emergencia Médica, Titchenell es un empresario con años de experiencia en supervisión en el campo de la medicina. Actualmente, Titchenell está estudiando para obtener su

certificación de Técnico de Emergencia Médica.

El Servicio de Emergencia Médica del Condado de Kinney cubre una área de más de 1,600 millas cuadradas, con 3,800 residentes.
