The country about Holliday, a smal
town situated about fourteen miles southwest of Wichita. Falls on the most fertile and most favored sections in the whole of Northwest Texas, is the scene of wonderful develop-

He then began to settle on these propertles Russian German families from the Dakotas, making Homiday the nucleus of the settlement. Withtn the las few months he has sold lands and ettled eighteen ramilles of these peo ple in and about Holliday, and not a ew settiers coming into that country nd making thetr homes there. Dr Young is so enthuslastic over the promise of that section and so firm In his bellef of its future prosperty and produciveness that he has brough here his father, who owns and lives on what is known as the styles section of the Clab ranch, of which ranch the Doctor was formerly a part owner A brother-n-law of the doctor's lives Ahe Thatcher ranch near Archer on the Brigman ranch, which was the frist Dr. Young purchased when he started to establish a Russian German

 ready been consummated and are now belng carried. out for the establish-ment by these people in. Holliday of a church, a national bank, in which it is understood that Dr. Young is to be
associated with Mr. Langford of the City National bank of this eity, a hardware store, a lumber yard, livery stable and other Institutions to meet the needs of the community.
These Russian Germans are indus zens and are the best wheat farmers to be found in the whole world and excel in every line of agricultural work. Wherever they have settled, in other sections, they have become the owners of the most fertile and pro-
ductive farms and todayl are substan thal, patriotic and loyal eltizens. This Is true wherever these Russian Ger the people regarded their' settlem with some distrust and evidences of antagonism, today these same settler are looked upon with respect and ad miration.
Many of these people who first set led in the Dakotas have found the winters there too rigorous and this reason are coming to Texas. As they are becoming our neighbo in' increasing numbers something thefr history will be of interest. an article in Harjer's Magazine in 1898, Kirk Munroe, one of the fore most Journalists of today, says abou these same people, who'were then Jus: beginning to settle in the Dakotas: "The Russians being the newest nounced by that class of Americans who glory in the ttile of "Know Noth Ings," claimed my chtef attention and be found in the greatest number somewhere along the fine of the Missourt river At Buspar of fortunate as to meet a' young Ame canized Russlan who has been in strumental in bringing more of his people to this country than any other person. Under these favorable conditions th colonists, flourished and multiplied fo wo hundred years, becoming in that ime Russlanized in everything save heir language, relligion and independence of thought and speech. In Ger many some of them had been Luther ns, while others had remained Cath ilics, and to this day their descend lef through all the vicissitudes of for tune.
"At length these seml-Independent people became so numerous and on ccount of the extraordinary privi
