ASA THOMAS IS DANGEROUSLY WOUNDED BY GUN OF A PREACHER.

SQUIRREL HUNTING

Young Man Climbed Tree to Scare Quarry When Pender's Gun Was Accidentally Discharged.

Bowie, Tex., Oct. 23.-Asa Thomas, m years of age, and a bridegroom of only a few weeks, lies at his home a few miles south of here at the point of death as the result of the accidental discharge of a shotgun in the hands of Rev. R. C. Pender late yesterday

Rev. Mr. Pender and J. L. Rudy, both of this city, were yesterday on a hunt for squirrel and were about four miles south of town when they were joined by young Thomas. Shortly after this a young squirrel was sighted, but he ran into a hole in a tree. Young Thomas climbed the tree for the purpose of getting the game out. Both the hunters were watching him eagerby, when Rev. Mr. Pender's gun was accidentally discharged ..

Almost the entire charge struck Thomas in the body, entering along his side from the waist line to the shoulder. Though desperately wounded, the young man was able to keep his hold on the tree, thus preventing a fall which might have made the accident fatal. Rudy then climbed the tree and was able to get the young man to the ground without further mis-

Though the wounded man was given prompt medical attention, it is feared that he will not recover. His condition today is very grave.

Rev. Mr. Pender is grief stricken as a result of the accident and its probable result. He is an experienced hunter and the premature discharge of his gun is a mystery to him.

FATAL BUZZARD FLESH FEAST.

One Italian Dead and Three Others in Dangerous Condition as Result of Unusual Meal.

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Corbin, Ky., Oct. 23.—An Italian section hand employed on the Louisville and Nashville railroad killed a buzzard yesterday and cooked the bird, serving it with dumplings. He invited three other Italians to partake of the meat. Immediately afterward all four became

An hour later the host died in great agony and his three countrymen are not expected to recover.

Physicians attending the men say that their condition is due entirely to laving eaten buzzard flesh.

WILL BE PLANTED IN COTTON NEXT YEAR, ACCORDING TO FARMERS' UNION OFFI-

WILL RAISE PEANUTS

Diversification is the Scheme to Beat the Cotton Gamblers-Beene's Big Potatoes.

Special to the Times. Fort Worth, Tex., Oct. 24.-President D. J. Neill of the Farmers' Union advances the prophecy that the entire cotton crop of the South next year will be reduced 25 per cent. In fact, Mr. Neill says a proposition of this kind is now going the rounds of all the local unions of the country and practically every one is passing a resolution calling for the reduction by a unanimous vote. Particularly are the members of the Texas organization taking to the idea, Mr. Neill says. Letters endorsing the propositions are pouring into headquarters daily by the

"The farmer has determined that if he can't get his price one way, he can in another," said Mr. Neill yesterday. "The cotton gamblers of the country are doing their best to hold the price down this year, and are to this end endeavoring to coax the country into the belief that the crop is really larger than it is represented. We are going to reduce our acreage to the extent of one-fourth next year and then there will be but very little room for such misrepresentations. By the time of planting the 1908 crop we will have 300,000 members in the Texas union alone lined up behind the pledge. With such a following, failure is impossible." Mr. Neill says that peanuts in many places are going to take the place of cotton next year to a large degree.

LAWTON, WICHITA FALLS AND NORTHWESTERN EXPECTS TO BEGIN ACTUAL WORK.

REPORT KATY BACK OF IT

Line Will Penetrate Indian Reserve and Give Outlet Into North Texas from Coal Region.

From Tuesday's Daily.

Lawton, Ok., Oct. 21.-The Lawton, Texas, will soon become a reality. J headquarters in Lawton, is now displaying the profiles and specifications to contractors, preparatory to receiving bids for the grading contracts. work on the new right of way that bechanged to run through Randlett, in the Big Pasture. When the original survey missed Randlett, it quickly raised \$15,000 bonus, to be paid when now on deposit.

1st. The road will not only connect, Lawton with the big scope of country in the pasture reserve, but give a competing line into this city. The Katy is said to be back of the proposition, and that insures Lawton a direct communication with North Texas and the coal fields of Indian Territory. There will be two towns on the line in the Indian reserve land, Randlett and Emerson. Emerson was recently platted and sold by a townsite company.

This road connects with the Wichita Falls and Northwestern railroad, another branch now building into Frederick from Wichita Falls.

For Better Roads.

Stamford has the reputation of being one of the most progressive towns in West Texas and her people are right up to the minute on almost all of the things that are for the growth and betterment of the town. In giving a report of a recent meeting of the commercial organizations of Central West Texas, the Abilene Reporter tells how hey are building good roads around Stamford, calling to mind the fact that the roads entering Wichita Falls are not what they might be and suggesting a line of effort for the Chamber of Commerce. A Stamford man, speaking at the meeting mentioned, said:

" A short while ago we concluded that the public roads leading into Stamford must be graded. We had a large and enthusiastic meeting of the commercial club, at which I made them a proposition that I would give 5 per cent of whatever amount was necessary to grade the roads. Ten other business men without any hesitation said they would give equal amounts; then we had the smaller subscriptions and the Swenson interest, after which went before the commissioners court of Jones county, and got from them a promise of \$10 per mile to be added to this. By this method we raised \$5,000 to grade the roads leading into Stamford, which we estimate will grade one hundred miles of road, and the work will soon begin.

SHOWS INCREASE IN MILEAGE.

Commission Auditor Bond Prepares Statement-Total 15,482.

Austin, Tex., Oct. 17 .- J. H. Bond, auditor of the railroad commission, has prepared a statement showing the total track mileage in Texas for the period ending June 30, 1907. The table prepared by him shows there has been an increase in railroad mileage of 831 miles since June 30, 1906.

The tabulated report shows that there were on June 30, 1907, 12,575 DR. W. H. NO FURTHER LOANS

PORT THAT UNION WILL NOT MAKE FURTHER LOANS.

Is Given as the Cause of the Action. Local Interests Not Directly Affected.

Special to the Times. Houston, Tex., Oct. 23.-The report that he Farmers' Union Cotton Company will not loan any more money on cotton for the present has been confirmed by an interview with Manager

It is stated that the apparent stringency in the money market has been responsible for the action on the part of the company, and while it is claimed that it does not necessarily mean that the farmers will stop the storing of their products, it is conceded that the farmers will not feel disposed to hold their cotton unless they can, at the same time, procure an advance of a portion of its value.

There are approximately 275 warehouses in Texas, and it is estimated that the amount of cotton stored away for the purpose of holding for the maximum price agreed upon at the convention held recently in Little Rock will aggregate more than 200,00 bales, although Mr. Calvin does not care to confirm this report.

When asked about the matter, Mr. Calvin confirmed the report received in this city tihs morning that the notice had been given.

He did not care to discuss the matter in detail, but stated that the banks had practically shut down on further loans for the present. He said:

"We have simply decided that we cannot loan any more money on cotton for the present. The truth of the matter is that the farmers have been shipping their cotton to our warehouses in such great quantities that we are unable to keep up with their

"The banks are loaded up with cotton certificates and they do not feel disposed to advance any more funds.

"We had arrangements made for a line of money that we supposed would carry us through the season, but we find there is a tightness in the money market, and communications have been received from the banks in New York to the effect that they do not care to turn loose any more mones for the purpose of helping out the cotton farmers of the South."

From a reliable source it was learned that there is between \$75,000,000 and \$100,000,000 tied up in the cotton product, which has been held or marketed, and while it is not believed that the bankers of the country have a design to force the crop into the market at a sacrifice, it is argued that the money is needed in other channels and it to be confined longer to the one in-



REDEEMS PLEDGE A Dollar

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE RAISES \$1,000 FOR FARMERS' UNION WAREHOUSE.

Bearing Higher Rate of Interest for Sewer Improvement is Recommended by Business Men.

From Wednesday's Daily.

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, which was attended by a fair representation of the membership, was held yesterday afternoon, at which several matters of importance were taken up for discussion.

The first matter to be brought up was a pledge given last spring to the Farmers' Union Warehouse people to donate \$1,000 toward the erection of the warehouse. A subscription paper was circulated and within less than five minutes \$760 of this amount had been pledged: A committee was appointed to raise the remainder of the

Mayor Noble was next called upon to state the situation with reference to the sewer improvement. He said that the engineer would not make his report on the estimated cost of the sewer until October 25th and that until that time no action could be taken by the council. He said that the engineer thought it probable that the sewer would cost more than \$20,000 authorized for its expenditure, and that the bonds would probably have to be sold at a higher rate than 4 per cent. 'After a short discussion a motion that it be taken as the sense of the Chamber of Commerce that the City Council be asked to order another election, if necessary, for the purpose of voting \$25, 000 for the construction of the sewers and that the bonds be sold at 5 per cent if it was found they could not be sold at the lower rate.

At this meeting a memorial to the City Council was adopted requesting that body to attempt to have the numbering of the houses completed within the next thirty days, so that steps could be taken to secure free mail delivery.
