

# 1971-'72 School Year Begins Here Aug. 23

Bovina Schools begin the 1971-'72 school year Monday, August 23. Registration for kindergarten pupils, first graders, junior high and high school students is scheduled for Thursday, August 19, according to an announcement this week by L. F. Jacobs, superintendent. Faculty members will begin their school year a week earlier than students -- Monday, August 16. They will report then for in-service work for that week from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day. Thursday's registration of high school students will be

in the library. The schedule is as follows:  
Seniors -- 8-9 a.m.  
Juniors -- 9-10 a.m.  
Sophomores -- 10-11 a.m.  
Freshmen -- 11 - 12 noon.  
New high school students will meet in the library at 1 p.m. Thursday.  
Junior high students will register in their various classrooms. Eighth graders will register from 9 to 10 a.m. and seventh grade students will register from 10 to 11 a.m. All new students will meet at 1 p.m. in the junior high classrooms.

## Teachers Report Week Earlier

Kindergarten and first grade students who did not pre-register this spring will register at Ridgelea Elementary School from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. They are asked to bring their immunization and birth records.  
Pupils in grades two through six will register the first day of school.  
\*\*\*\*\*  
According to Jacobs, a new

Texas law, now in effect, requires that all children entering Texas elementary or secondary schools must have been immunized against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by Jan. 1, 1972, and all completed as soon as medically feasible.  
There are some exclusions from compliance, Jacobs says. Exclusions are allowable on an

individualized basis for medical contraindications and religious conflicts. Students falling into these categories must submit signed affidavits as specified in the law: the student must present an affidavit signed by a physician, in which it is stated that, in the physician's opinion, the immunization required would be injurious to the health and well-being of the applicant or any member immunized against six diseases: diphtheria, tetanus,

poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox.  
All students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the Fall 1971 of his family or household; the student must present an affidavit signed by the applicant, or if a minor, by his parents or guardian, stating that the immunization conflicts with the tenets and practice of a recognized church or religious denomination of which the applicant is an adherent or

member; provided, however, that this exemption does not apply in times of emergency or epidemic declared by the Commissioner of Health.  
For complete immunizations, the following are required in the respective class or age groupings: children in kindergarten and grades one through five, polio -- at least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday, diphtheria/tetanus -- minimum of three doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday, measles -- one dose of

vaccine, or history of measles illness, rubella -- one dose of vaccine, not required past age 12 years, smallpox -- one vaccination within the past 10 years; children and others in grades six through 12, polio, same as above, diphtheria/tetanus -- minimum of three doses with last dose within 10 years, booster dose only after initial series, measles -- recommended but not required on an individualized basis if history of vaccine or illness is thought to be negative, rubella -- not required past 12, smallpox -- one vaccination within the past 10 years.

Don't look now if you're enjoying the good ole summertime, but a new football season, which traditionally marks the end of summer and the beginning of autumn, is almost here. Practice for the 1971 season begins in just 12 days, as a matter of fact.

One of the magazines about area school boy football which have sprung up during the past couple of years appeared last week. This one, "Top-O-Texas Football," picks the Kress Kangaroos to repeat as the winner of District 3-A and goes on to predict that the KK team will be rated second in the area, behind only the always-strong Seagraves Eagles.

That's good publicity for this district, we're guessing, even if there's seldom any similarity between what a sportswriter thinks in July and what comes about the following November.

The Bovina Mustangs are picked fourth in the District 3-A race by the slick magazine. There's not much honor in that except that the Ponies are picked one notch higher than their arch-rival, the Farwell Steers. The latter point is an interesting one to us.

Springlake-Earth is tagged as the second place team and the Vega Longhorns get the nod to show. Following Bovina and Farwell in the fourth and fifth slots are Sudan, sixth; Happ, seventh; and Hart, eighth.

The magazine goes on to concede that the Mustangs could finish as high as second or third in the loop standings, but doesn't see anyway for the hopping Kangaroos to be knocked off the top rung of the ladder.

The 'Roos were overlooked last year by the prognosticators, got off to a slow non-district start, but were red hot and rolling by the time district action began and strolled away with the pennant.

We think they'll be lucky to do it again.  
Springlake-Earth is tagged as the second best 3-A team primarily because of its big, experienced, outstanding running back, Hoyt Glasscock.

We're guessing this is the fourth year for this big guy to be starting in the Wolverines' backfield. He's good, but he'll have to have some help before the S-E club can do as well as the predictors think.

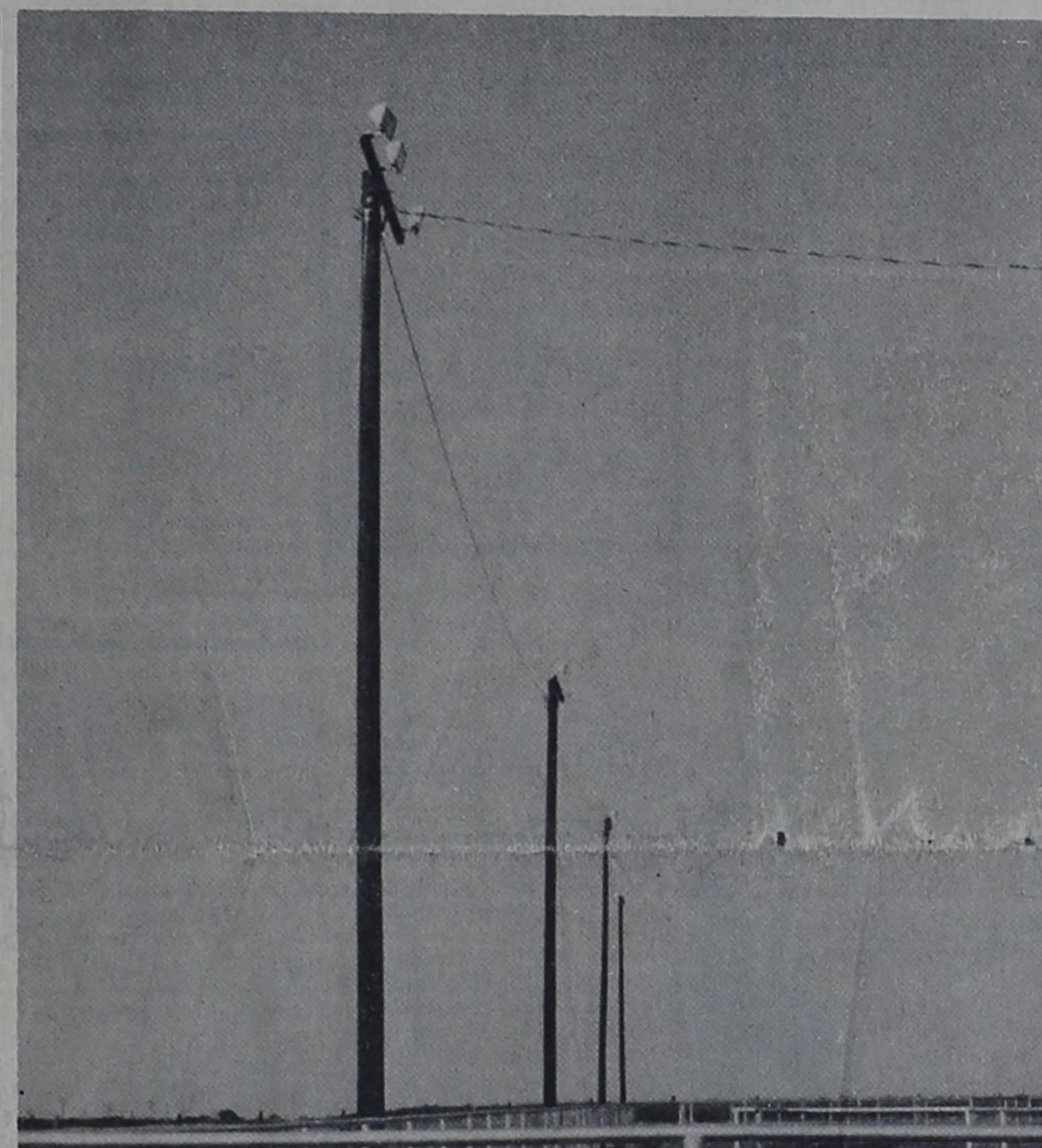
Opening games of the '71 season are scheduled for September 10. That's just some five weeks from now. The Mustangs meet the Boys Ranch Rough Riders in that one. The game will be played there. The season finale is November 12 against Hart here.

With seven district opponents, the Mustangs play only three non-district games. In addition to BR, they meet two Parmer County neighbors, the Friona Chieftains and the Lazbuddie Longhorns, in that order.

The State of Texas will get rid of a lot of deadwood on its records of cattle brands beginning at the end of this month.

According to a new law passed during the last session of the legislature, livestock owners will have a six-month period to re-record their brands with their county clerks. All brands now recorded will be done away with, as far as the clerk's records are concerned. The livestock people will have six months, from August 30 through February 29 of next year, to record their brands. After that time, any unrecorded brand will be available.

### Regular Showers Help --

## More Rain Aids Crops

"There's no telling how many millions of pounds of grain sorghum these showers have added to our production," an area agricultural observer said this week following showers Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday nights.

The four showers followed on the heels of a good rain earlier, bringing the total rainfall for July to 1.75. Most farmers continued to irrigate during the showers, but the extra moisture was a big help in making the pumped water go over more area.

Tuesday night of last week, the moisture totaled a tenth of an inch. Wednesday night, the measurement was .16 of an inch. Two-tenths were recorded Thursday night and .16 was the amount late Saturday afternoon.

Those were the measurements in Bovina and the totals varied around the area. The rainfall was especially heavier to the southwest Wednesday night.

The rainy season was accompanied by cooler than normal temperatures and many people wore light jackets, especially at night.

July started out to be an extra dry month, but the moisture began around mid-month and has continued steadily. The showers here were part of general drought-breaking rainfall across the Southwest.

While the rainfall came later in the growing season than would have been ideal, it is still considered highly beneficial to the grain sorghum and cotton. Also, the moisture will provide seasoning for wheatland.

# Early Contributions For New Park Fund

The community fund-raising drive, to raise \$30,000 to pay Bovina's portion, approximately 25 per cent, for a new park-community center building-swimming pool complex, is expected to get underway "in earnest" this week, according to Ovid Lawlis, drive general chairman, and Lewis

McDaniel, president of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, sponsoring organization for the promotion. Citizens of the community will be asked by volunteer workers to contribute cash or, in the case of farmers, acres of crop to the drive. A list of contributors will be

published weekly in The Blade during the drive, McDaniel says.  
At a drive kickoff meeting last week, a few contributions pledges were accepted. These included Ralph Roming, two acres of mlo; Lawlis Gin Co., \$300; Edwin Lide, one acre of mlo; Tom Ware, two acres of mlo; and Chas W. Flynn, one acre of vegetables (\$500 minimum).

Area leaders for the drive, appointed by Lawlis, include Ware, west of town; Tom Caldwell and Ralph Roming, south of town; Edwin Lide, east of town; and Jim Russell, north of town.  
Lawlis and Johnnie Horn will be in charge of contacting business people. Ellen Estes and Pearl Cervantez will contact individuals in town.

Cost of the overall facilities will be in the neighborhood of \$160,000. The difference in what is raised locally and the total is expected to come from a federal government grant.

### On Probation For One Year --

# 'Minimum Penalty' For Basketball Team

Bovina High's boys' basketball team will evidently not be eligible for district honors during the forthcoming season. Superintendent L. F. Jacobs made that announcement this week following a telephone conversation with Bailey Marshall, athletic director of the state's University Interscholastic League, which controls high school athletics in the state. Jacobs says it is his understanding after the phone conversation that the boys basketball team will be on probation and not be eligible for district honors and there will be no penalty for the girls' basketball team.  
The ruling came as a result of the two basketball squads having members participate in more than the maximum three tournaments during the season. An investigation of the UIL

rule infraction came about after two unsigned letters, evidently mailed from here, were received at the UIL headquarters in Austin charging the sports program here with these and other violations.  
After receiving the letters,

Marshall instructed the District 3-A executive committee, made up of superintendents of schools in the district, to investigate the situation and make a recommendation to the UIL. The committee's recommendation was evidently followed

exactly, Jacobs said this week. The probationary period for the boys basketball team will be for one year.

School officials here are of the opinion that there was no intent to break the UIL rules and a few players who were shifted from the A to B teams participated in more than the maximum of three tournaments.

The anonymous letters were received by the UIL office in late May and early June. The investigation by the district committee was conducted in June and an announcement of the findings and the recommendations was made last month at a meeting of the board of trustees of Bovina Independent School District.

The reason for the difference in the ruling of "minimum penalty" for the boys' team and no penalty for the girls' team, according to Jacobs, is that the UIL rules read that no boy is to play in more than three tournaments and in the girls' basketball section of the rules it reads that no team is to play in more than three tournaments.

Other charges made in the unsigned letter accused the school of practicing basketball and football out of season and on Sundays and having no woman chaperone to accompany the girls' basketball team on trips. These charges were ignored by the investigating committee.

One of the letters to the UIL was accompanied by clippings from this newspaper showing that individual players participated in more than the maximum number of tournaments.

The investigation of the executive committee was made by

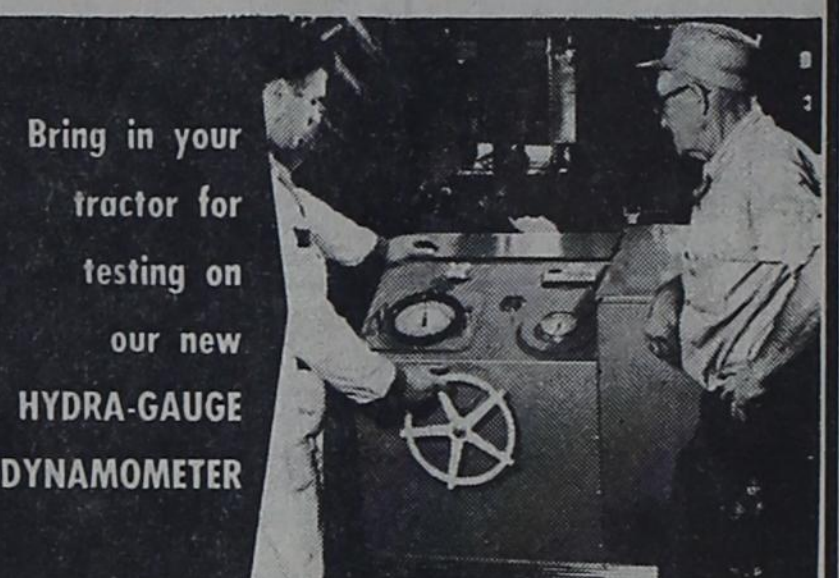
