TWO HUNDRED CADETS AND OF-FICERS ON JAPANESE CRUISER LOSE THEIR LIVES.

140 Men Were Saved, But of 300 Ca dets, Only Fifty-Eight Were Rescued.

#### By Associated Press.

Tokio, Japan, April 30.-The Japanese training cruiser Matsushima was sank off Pescadores Island this morning by the explosion of a projectile.

The cruisers Itsukashima and Hashidate rescued some of the crew

It is feared that over two hundred, including the captain of the Matsushima, were lost. Admiral Yoshimatsu, emmander of the training squadron, reports that the explosion took place in the magazine of the Matsushima. The cruiser immediately sank until

only the bridge was visible. The lives of a hundred and forty one men, including some officers, were saved. Only fifty-eight cadets out of a complement of three hundred were saved.

The sons of Baron China, vice minister of the foreign office, and Prince Oyama, field marshal, are among the cadets who were lost, and it is feared that Captains Nama, Yoshmori and Yashiro were also lost.

#### CHILDREN DROWNED gully and the rain beat upon them with all the fury of the pasing tempest, a great rush of angry storm waters

THEY SOUGHT SHELTER IN DUG-OUT BUT WERE DRIVEN OUT.

#### ENGULFED IN TORRENT

Older Sister Made Heroic Effort to Save Their Lives, But all Three Perished.

Weatherford, Tex., April 24.—Information reached this city this morning of the drowning of three little daughters of J. L. Lovelace, near Springtown late Wednesday afternoon, under very unusual circumstances. The dead:

BEL. HA LOVELACE, aged 14.

CARRIE LOVELACE, aged 9.

DONNA LOVELACE, aged 7. Mr. Lovelace formerly lived at Peaster, but now resides about three miles northeast of Springtown in what is known as the Terrapin Neck community, and his children attended the public school in Springtown, taught by Prof. Johnson, brother of County Superintendent J. N. Johnson of this Wednesday afternoon about the time school was dismissed a heavy black cloud came up and all the pupils made quick time in the direction of home in order to avoid what seemed to be an inevitable drenching. The three little girls, Bertha, Carrie and Donna, were walking and were accompanied by a little brother, Harvie. As the great cloud seemed to settle down on them and the big Tain drops began to patter down in the road about them, they became frightened and sought safety in a dugout or storm cellar on the place of Ben Wylie, a short dis-

tance out of Springtown. After, reaching the dugout and ensconcing themselves beneath it friendly shelter, the candren rested in fan cied security while the storm king held high revel outside. The storm had broken over that section with all the fury of a veritable waterspout, and the thoroughly frightened children huddled in the dugout until the water began to pour into the entrance in a perfect sheet. Believing that they would be drowned if they remained in the dugout, which was fast filling with water the four wretched and thoroughly frightened children made a rush for the outside and out into the pitiless storm they went, with no shelter to protect them from its fury. Now thoroughly demoralized, the four children next took refuge in a deep gully that had been washed beside the public road by the waters of many previous rains, and it was here that death

came to the three little girls.

As they crouched shivering y in the

all the fury of the pasing tempest, a great rush of angry storm waters swept down upon them and in a moment they were completely engulfed. There was no opportunity for the older girl, Bertha, to escape. She was larger and stronger than her two little sister and when the flood swept them off their feet and they were floundering in the turbid depths, the older sister nobly went to their rescue, and lost her own life with them. She could not save them, but she could and did give her own noble young life in the effort and death never claimed a truer or grander heroine.

The alarm was given and a searching party was organized and the bodies of the three little girls were recovered and yesterday they were all tenderly laid to rest in the same grave in the Springtown cemetery.

As they found death together, so will they rest and arise when the great day comes.

BURKBURNETT MAN SLUGGED AND ROBBED OF \$65 IN CASH, WATCH AND TICKET.

When Caught By Bowie Officers He Had Some of the Stolen Articles In His Possession.

W. W. Deal of Burkburnett, in the city en route to IowaCity, Iowa, was slugged in the head by a robber or robbers near the Wichita Mill last night at about 9 o'clock and was robbed of his purse containing \$65 in cash, a gold watch and a railroad ticket to Iowa City, for which he had just

paid something over \$17.00.

While waiting for his train, Deal had taken on a few drinks and had started out to see the sights of the tenderloin. It seems that he fell into the company of a man who pretended to be deaf and dumb and while walking through the yards he was hit over the head with a slung shot or some other weapon and knocked into insensibility. When he recovered, his companion, together with his purse, money, watch and railroad ticket was missing. He reported the robbery to the officers, but they were unable to find any man answering the description given of Deal's companion.

The police in all the surrounding towns were telephoned a description of the man supposed to have committed the robbery, and early this morning the man was arrested in Bowle by Officer Wales and some of the articles taken from Deal were found in the

Constable Randolph left at noon to day for Bowle to bring the man back to this city.

According to the information received in the message from Bowle this morning, the man arrested there, while having the watch and other stolen ar ticles, had only about \$20 of the mony and it is thought that he may have had a pal with whom he divided the money here.

The State seal of Oklahoma furnishes an expression of the individuality in this new State. In the center is a five-pointed star, and in each point of five Indian tribes; here is the Chiekasha national seal, wherein the Indian building will be the president's veto, warrior stands upright with bow and and under the law, if the president ex-Seminole nation is represented village opposite a lake, which has a float on it, an Indian paddling in his canoe; the Cherokee Nation is represented on the fifth point of the star and is surrounded by a wreath of oak emblem on the shield. In each one of the indentures of the star are groups 21-4t

of nine stars, representing altogether the forty-five other States; while the large star in the center indicates the new State—the forty-sixth in the union -so that now, as in the days of Tecumseh, when the Indians referred to the American nation as "my brother of the thirteen camp fires," the full bloods of Oklahoma can gather about their tepees and look upon the great cities and towns and railroads crossing the prairies of old, and think of the Great Father now having "forty-six camp-fires," instead of thirteen as in colonial days.—From "The Story of Oklahoma," by Joe Mitchen Chapple, in the National Magazine for April.

PARMERS' UNION OFFICIALS IN FALSE LIGHT.

#### POLITICS ARE AVOIDED

Dispatch is Either a Wilful or Ignorant Misrepresentation, Says Manager McConkey.

Several days ago a representative of he Times called to the attention of Mr. J. L. McConkey, manager of the Farmers' Union warehouse in this city, to the following dispatch, which was reprinted in the the Houston Post from the New Orleans Picayune.

At the request of the Times Mr. Mc-Conkey has prepared the statement which follows the dispatch to show his own and what he believes is the position of President Neill in connec-tion with the insinuation made in the

Wichita Falls, Tex., Mar. 22.—The Farmers' Union, which has been a powerful factor in Texas, is now divided into two factions, one of which, headed by practically all of the State officials, seems inclined to meddle in all political affairs, and the other, headed by no one particular person, is endeavoring to build warehouses and cotton seed sheds for the benefit of the

Mr. J. L. McConkey of this city be to the latter faction, and has handled cotton and cotton seed through the union warehouses here so successfully that higher prices have been paid the farmers both for cotton and seed in this section than in any other part of the State.

President D. J. Neill is an old-time worker in the populist party and W. T. Laudermilk, a school teacher and chairman of the executive committee, is also an old populist worker, and all other members of the executive committee, as well as Secretary-Treasurer Smith, are middle-of-the-road populists, hence it is not very difficult to lead them all into politics, and the anti-Balley forces seem hopeful of securing full indorsement from that faction.

The only democrats in the present official family are Vice President Lane and Organizer B. F. Chapman, and both have been almost completely ignored by the other State officers.

President Neill's chief advisers are Clarence Nugent, a labor union lawyer and son of the late Judge Nugen populist candidate for governor against Hogg, and Sam Hampton, a newspaper man, whose radical utterances on so cialism are well known. Another factor in the case is some well known cotton firms in Galveston, who are known enemies of the warehouse sys-Orleans in favor of Galveston, and it is said they are the financial backing of the Neill-Nugent-Hampton faction.

A large area involved is much nearer New Orleans than Galveston, and it is believed that most of the cotton from of every hundred of the rank and file this section will eventually go to New Orleans, after a system of warehouses are built, and much interest is being manifested to see if the warehouses orpolitical faction will finally prevail in the roster of the Farmers' Union.

There is no doubt but what the majority of the membership favor this idea, which has been kept to the front by O. P. Pyle, former president, but he has also been completely set aside and many are of the opinion that the fate of the union is now in the balance on the question of politics vs. ware-

The above is a special to the New Orleans Picayune. It is the understanding that President Neill has been laboring to keep the union out of politics, but if he expects to succeed he will have to keep professional politicians out of places of authority.- Fa-

Otherwise Kansas City Method of Clar

ifying Water is Satisfactory. While a member of the city council Dr. J. F. Reed last month addressed a letter to the mayor of Kansas City making inquiry as to the satisfaction given by the settling basins used there in the city water waterworks, the process used in Kansas City being the same as that the local water company propose to install.

A few days ago he received the following reply to his inquiry: Kansas City, Mo., April 17, 1908.

Mr. J. Fleetwood Reed, M. D., Wichita Falls, Texas: Dear Sir :-

Referring to your favor of the 29th ult., addressed to the mayor, waich has remained so long unanswered, I have to say in reply:

1st. Settling basins are not enitrely satisfactory to the people generally, owing chiefly to the fact that they are too small.

2nd. The water is not in any way contaminated by the coagulated substances, so as to render it unpalatable or injurious to the health.

3rd. The chemical analysis shows that no alum appears nor could appear in the water, because there still re mains as much as one hundred and wenty parts per million by weight of temporary hardness in the water. Very
