



With splendid railroad advantages, fertile country rapidly being settled with thrifty, energetic farmers around the city, he believed that the population of Wichita Falls would go beyond 25,000 within less than three He announced that a good qualty of coal would be laid down in Wichita Falls within 60 days at a price cheaper than any other city in Texas could get it. With cheap fuel and splendid traffic facilities he believed hat with the proper effort Wichita Falls would become one of the leadng manufacturing centers in the South-

He spoke also of Lake Wichita as a pleasure resort, saying that the Fort Worth and Denver railroad had agreed to run excursion trains to this place from Fort Worth and other points as soon as an electric line was built from this city to the lake. His statement hat it was not only a probability, but almost a certainty that such a line would be in operation within the next welve months was greeted with enhusiastic shouts and applause.
