# PHONE COURTSHIP BARRED.

Billing and Cooing on Wire Forbidden to Trenton Teachers.

"Billing and coolng" between young women school teachers and their sweethearts over the telephone wire must cease, at least during school hours, because, say the Trenton school authorities, such conversations are not seemly should anyone inadvertently break in on the line, and also because the telephones are for school business and not for "spoonging."

The order, of course, has caused criticism and considerable indignation among the 500 pretty young school marms of the city, all of whom, it is said, are positive in their denials that they never "spoon," either on the telephone or elsewhere.

The incident which stirred up the trouble occurred when Supervising Principal Mackey, in trying to reach one of the schools by telephone, interrupted a conversation made up mostly of endearing terms and giggles. In the two minutes he was on the wire Dr. Mackey heard more, "dears," "sweethearts," "honey boys" and "darlings" than probably he has heard in a long time. It was like a passage from Ronieo and Juliet, with the telephone wire substituted for the balcony.

It was when a teacher's vioce declared that the man on the other end of the wire was the "only onliest" and the man promised the girl a dozen kisses dunlicated a hundred times, which jarred on Dr. Mackey's mathematical neves. At this point communication was cut off, probably by a sympathetic telephone girl, who had heard the third party break into the conversation.

At any rate, Dr. Mackey hung up the receiver, called a meeting of the school principals and directed them to instruct their teachers that "love-making" over the telephone during school hours. would not be tolerated. The school board will back up Dr. Mackey if for no other reason than that it is difficult to fill places of many teachers who are resigning to become brides.

The minds of the farmers are still riveted on the question of fifteen-cent cotton. They are not content to sell their cotton for less, and until they have reached that as a basic price they will never be satisfied. There is a class of people who are,

however, opposed to fifteen-cent cotnext few months. ton, and from their viewpoint, they have a right to be, at least, you can

say they have reasons for not wanting the farmer to get fifteen cents for his cotton. A careful investigation will make those reasons plain to the mind of any man who understands the commercial system of the South. The New York speculator is not the only man who does not want the farmer to receive fifteen cents for his cotton. There are people within our borders, near our

own doors, that do not want the farm er to get fifteen cents for his cotto Namely, the credit merchant, and the money lender. The farmers are 'h people from which the credit merchant gets his largest profits. They are the best paying class of people in the world

Then, why should the credit mer chant desire to change? There is no reason for his wanting to change. If the farmer should become independent, tites. the credit merchant must either go out of business or hunt debtors elsewhere. and it is useless to say did justice to as he knows he is bound to take a less each course. reliable debtor than the farmer if the farmer becomes independent. The credit merchant knows that if the farmgrowth of womanhood, whose ideals er gets fifteen cents for his cotton he shall be nobler, and in their excellency will become independent and cease to buy his supplies on credit.

The money lender is opposed to the farmer becoming independent; is opposed to the stopping of the credit

system, because the credit system enables him to loan his money at a high rate of interest. The Southern mone lenders can borrow money from 3 to 6 per cent.
