The grand jury for the present term of court, having finished their labors, beg leave to submit to the court the following report:

We have been in session for nine consecutive days and have summoned and examined a large number of witnesses, upon the topics mentioned by the court in his charge and upon such other violations of the law as were brought to our attention.

We have found twenty-eight true bills which we have returned into court.

We are glad to note that the peace officers of the county and city are working in harmony and unison for the enforcement of the law and we are led to believe that if the people will give them the moral support they should have they will do better work in the future than they have ever done in the

PRESIDENT WINCHELL SAYS ROCK ISLAND HAS EVERY-THING READY TO BEGIN.

HELD BY TEXAS LAWS

Claims That Rock Island Will Undertake No Extensions Until Adverse Legislation Towas is Stopped.

The station agent told them that if they wanted to take the responsibility upon themselves they could take the flag and stop the train, and he would not interfere with them.

DRAGGED TO DEATH.

Jacksboro, Tex., Dec. 11.-W. M. Church manager of the Cobb ranch, three miles south of Jacksboro, was killed this afternoon by being thrown out of a buggy and dragged along the ground, while on his way from this place back to the ranch. None saw the accident and just how Mr. Church met his death is a matter of circumstantial evidence.

About 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon Mr. Church started back to the ranch. He was alone in a buggy, driving two spirited animals. The horses took fright at something and ran away. They were caught by a ranchman about three-fourths of a mile from the Rock Island freight house.

Mr. Church's body was found on the road. He had evidently been thrown from the buggy and had become entangled some way so as to be dragged a considerable distance. He was barely alive when found, and was carried



EARLY RISERS SAW GREAT BALL OF FIRE SWEEP ACROSS THE HEAVENS.

Passed Over the City in Southeasterly Direction—Explosion Shakes Houses at Mineral Wells.

At about 6:45 o'clock this morning a huge ball of fire swept across the heavens north of Wichita Falls, going In a southeasterly direction and, according to some reports, bursting into a thousand brillant fire balls in the southeastern heavens.

Some few minutes after the meteor had passed every window in town was raftled and later a sound resembling the far away rushing of a thousand wings was heard. The meteor was of a brilliancy that

far surpassed any electric light and lighted up the whole beavens. Many citizens were aroused from their beds by the glare of light.

The Times has telegraphed in all directions, hoping to find some trace of the meteor, and so far as has been learned the only other places where it was seen were at Weatherford and Mineral Wells. At the latter place the explosion is said to have shaken the houses and occasioned great alarm to the citizens, who feared an earthquake.

Meteor Seen in Other Towns.

Weatherford, Tex., Dec. 14.-This morning about 6:30 o'clock a monster meteor passed over this city, creating a blaze of light sufficient to dim the brilliancy of the moon, which was shin ing brightly and unobstructed by the clouds at that hour, lighting up rooms in which shades had been drawn as brilliantly as the noon hour, and casting swiftly moving shadows of trees and houses as much so as a bright

The passage of the meteor was from the southwest to the northeast, and its movement was preceded by a great rumbling sound as of heavy, distant thnuder. When it first came to view. the monster seemed to stand still for a moment, and then seeming to gather strength as well as size, it shot across the heavens, leaving a broad, bright trail of fire.

After traversing the heavens for a considerable distance it seemed to burst, after the manner of a huge sky rocket, throwing sparks in all directions, and then went out entirely.

People ran out of their homes, believing that either a great electrical storm was upon them or that their own homes were on fire; horses and ampbell today received a letter from cattle trembled in their stalls, and even the chickens were disturbed on their perches.

The wonderful phenomenon was witnessed by hundreds of people in this city, and reports from Mineral-Wells are to the effect that when the explos for of the huge meteor occurred houses sheok on their foundations and the roar of the meteor was almost deafening.

As it passed over this city the meteor gave out a loud hissing sound, much the same as a sky rocget, only greatly intensified. It has been the subject of much discussion among the people today, and even the "oldest inhabitant" does not remember to have ever seen anything to equal it.
