WATCHING THE OPENING game of the American League baseball playoffs this week caused all sorts of memories to flood back to Ye Editor.

A number of years ago, as a teenager growing up on a Bailey County farm, I coaxed an invitation from cousins then living in Clovis, Tom and Virgie Inman, to accompany them to Chicago on their vacation trip.

Any trip would beat what I was doing at the time--hoeing cotton and irrigating cotton and maize during a dry, hot summer.

Ye Editor was 16 at the time and halfway through high school. We were great baseball fans, due to the "Game of the Day" on Mutual Radio.

The highlight of the trip was that I was able to see my first Major League baseball game in person--in fact two of them, while in Chicago. (That was my lead-in to this year's White Sox team).

Right then and there, that youngster decided that if he couldn't make it to the major leagues, then he'd do the next best thing, and be a sportswriter, covering their games.

And I did, too--for my first two years out of college, working at a daily newspaper at San Mateo, California. I was able to write-up not only the San Francisco Giants' games, but also the NFL 49ers, and the Oakland Raiders, in addition to the baseball all-star game of 1961.

At that game, I got to see and photograph the likes of Willie Mays, Stan Musial, Mickey Mantle, Roger Maris, Hank Aaron, Yogi Berra, Orlando Cepeda, Willie McCovey, etc., etc.

Having achieved my boyhood dream, about that time Carol and I got homesick and we came back to God's country, where we got into the weekly newspaper business, and I became "just a fan" of major league baseball once again.

I have followed virtually every pitch of Texan Nolan Ryan, since he joined the Houston Astros, and then the Texas Rangers. Realizing that Ryan was perhaps the "last of the legends," I kept a pitch chart on Big Tex the last several years.

So, while watching the White Sox and Toronto Blue Jays this week, more memories were called up, since "Nolie" faced both of these teams several times, and had more than a little success against them, even at his advanced age.

For instance, many of you know that Toronto's Ricky Henderson (then with the Oakland As) was the player Nolan struck out in 1989 for his 5,000th strikeout.

I always thought it was great that Henderson got the honor for that strikeout, since Ricky always thought he was God's Gift to Baseball. A couple of years later, Henderson broke the all-time major league record for stolen bases, but had to share the headlines the next day because Ryan got his seventh no-hitter later in the day.

By the way, that last no-hitter was against none other than this Blue Jay team, the defending World Series champs. (The year Nolan hit them they were "only" league champs).

When I see Roberto Alomar come to bat for Toronto, I'm reminded that this young man struck out to end the game and give N.R. his last no-hitter. It also added "Robbie" Alomar to a special list of fathers and sons who both were strikeout victims of Ryan.

Bo Jackson of the White Sox, the comeback player of the year due to his hip replacement, knows quite a bit, according to his TV commercials. One thing he knows is that he didn't do too well batting against Ryan.

The former two-sport star struck out the first five times he faced Ryan, who was more than 20 years his senior. He ended up his limited career against "Old Man Ryan" with just four hits in 20 at-bats, including 12 strikeouts.

Frank Thomas, the home-run slugging first-baseman for the Sox, along with Jackson, was benched when Ryan started against the

Reed Responds To Farwell C-C Letter

Thomas Reed, director of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) office in Friona, has responded to a letter sent to him the Farwell Chamber of Commerce's agriculture committee concerning the Madigan Plan which would consolidate three government agricultural offices.

The letter was signed by committee chairman Ralph Franse, Anne Norton, Jerry Don Glover, Tom Nichols and Bert Williams.

Reed said the Madigan plan called for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), SCS, and Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices to be relocated in one building. This is a nationwide plan.

In Parmer County, the SCS office is housed in Friona in a building owned by the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation district. The ASCS and FmHA agencies are located in a building they lease in Farwell.

The Friona building isn't large enough to house all three agencies. If the Madigan Plan is approved, it's likely bids will be sought for a building in Parmer County to house all three agencies.

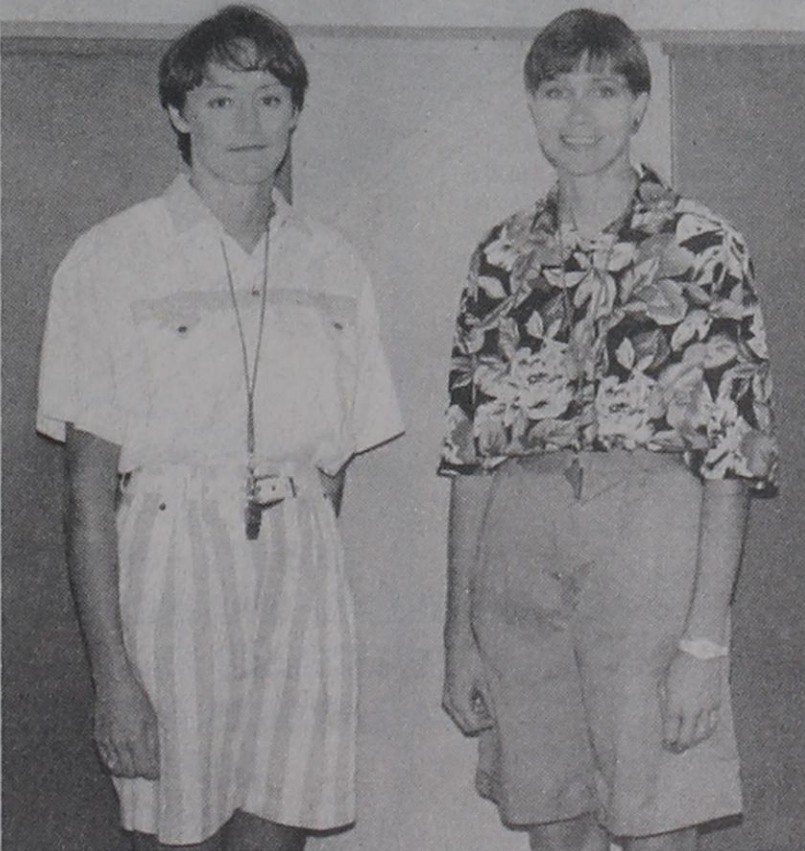

Mindy Neal, daughter of Tony and Dottie Neal, was among the winners of the Farm Bureau awards.

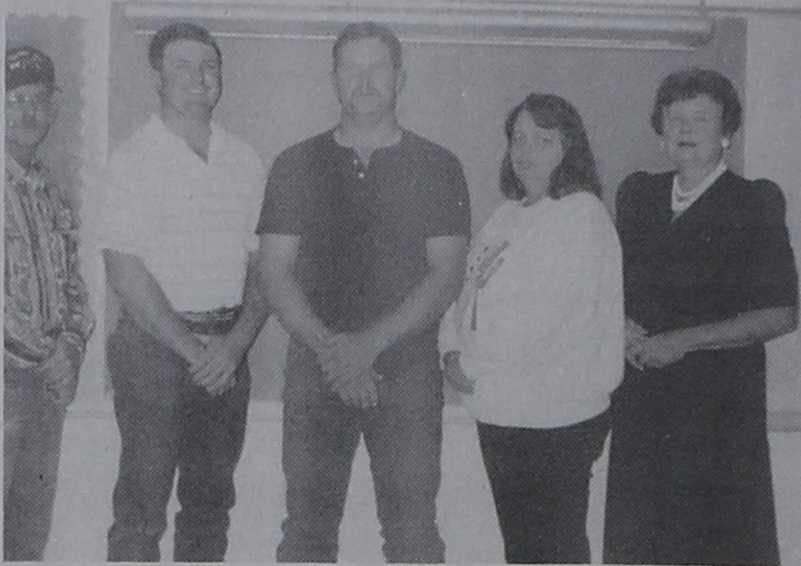

Ag Group Holds Meeting Locally

Immunization Clinics Are Set

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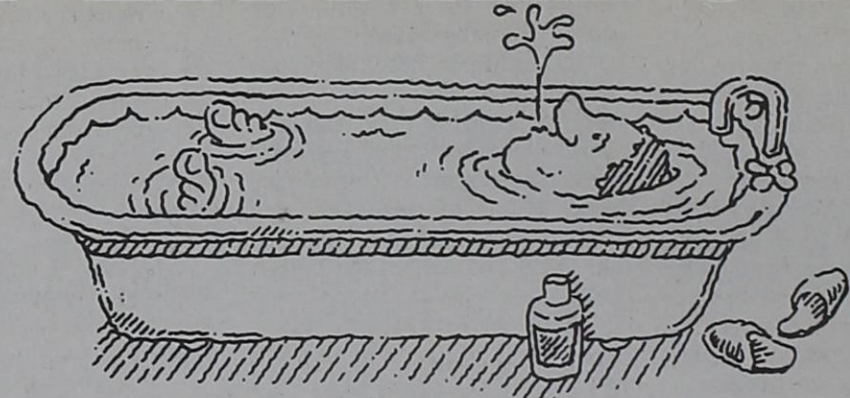
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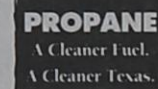


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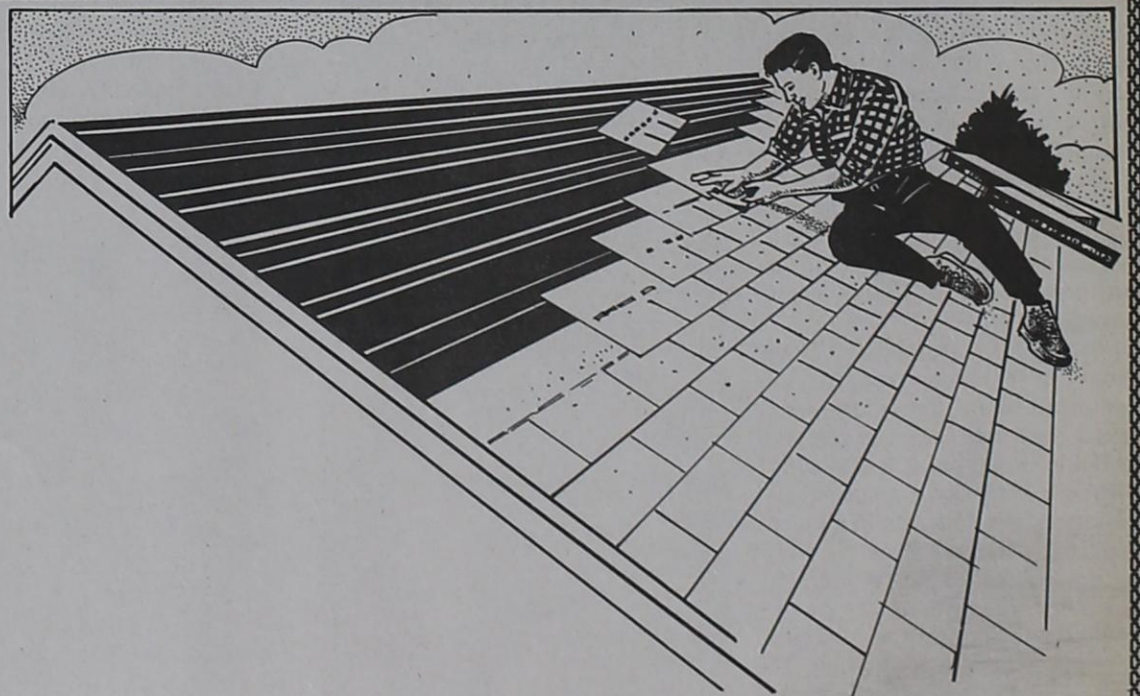
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Start Now Making Plans For Holiday Friendship Cakes

It may seem like we have plenty of time until Christmas, but the holiday season really isn't too far away. Especially, if you're giving homemade gifts this year.

In fact, to have Friendship Cakes ready to give to all of your friends this Christmas, you need to get the original starter going by mid-October. If you've never made or received a Friendship Cake, the process may seem a little confusing

at first. But, I'll try and simplify the directions.

The concept is to give a friend a cake along with a jar of starter syrup and the recipe for expanding the starter syrup and making cakes that the recipient can give to his or her friends.

If you are starting the process from scratch, begin with the Friendship Cake Starter recipe below. At the end of ten days, your starter syrup will be ready to use.

You can make the Individual

Friendship Cake with the fruit from the original starter. Use the original starter syrup to expand the starter and to make up to three cakes using the recipes for Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2. The recipes are slightly different.

Here is a condensed version of the steps you'll need to follow:

1. Make the Friendship Cake starter.
2. Drain the fruit, reserving both the starter syrup and the fruit.
3. Use the fruit in the Individual Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2.
4. Use the starter syrup in either Friendship Cake #1 or Friendship Cake #2.
5. Give three of the cakes away with the appropriate amount of starter and the recipe.
6. Use the extra starter to make another batch of cakes using the Friendship Cake #1 or #2 recipe.
7. Continue until you and all of your friends, family and neighbors can't eat another bite of cake.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE STARTER

- 3/4 cup canned peaches, drained and cut into pieces
- 3/4 cup canned pineapple chunks, drained
- 6 maraschino cherries, halved
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 1 package yeast

Place all the ingredients in a large glass container with a loose cover. Stir to mix. Stir two or three times the first day and once each day thereafter. Keep the fruit at room temperature on the kitchen counter or shelf. Do not refrigerate the starter. At the end of two weeks, the starter is ready to use. Drain the fruit and reserve the syrup. Use the fruit in the following recipe:

INDIVIDUAL FRIENDSHIP CAKE

- 1 yellow cake mix
- 1 box instant vanilla pudding
- 4 eggs
- 2/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1-1/2 cups fruit mixture from the starter recipe
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup grated coconut

Mix the ingredients together and bake in a bundt or tube pan at 325 degrees for 50 to 55 minutes.

Note: If you give the cake as a gift, present it with one pint of the starter syrup and one of the following recipes so that the recipient can use your starter to make their own starter and cakes for their friends. If you choose to give your friends copies of Friendship Cake #2, give them only 1-1/2 cups of the starter syrup.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE #1

- Starter:
- 1 pint starter syrup
 - 2-1/2 cups sugar
 - 1 large can sliced peaches

Mix the ingredients together and set on a cabinet or shelf at room temperature. Stir each day for ten days.

On the tenth day, add 1 large can of pineapple chunks and 2-1/2 cups sugar. Stir every day for ten days.

On the 20th day, add two 8-ounce jars of halved maraschino cherries and 2-1/2 cups sugar. Stir every day for ten days.

On the 30th day, pour off the juice into pint-sized jars and give it to friends along with the following cake and a copy of this recipe. The fruit from this recipe is enough to make three cakes.

- For one cake:
- 1 yellow cake mix with pudding (or one box yellow cake mix and one box instant vanilla pudding)
 - 4 eggs
 - 2/3 cup vegetable oil
 - 1-1/2 cups fruit mixture from the starter recipe above
 - 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix all the ingredients and bake at 350 degrees in a bundt or tube pan for 40 to 60 minutes. Repeat the process to make 2 more cakes.

FRIENDSHIP CAKE #2

- Starter:
- 1 pint starter syrup
 - 2-1/2 cups sugar
 - 1 medium-sized can fruit cocktail and juice
 - 1 large can sliced peaches and juice

Stir the mixture every day with a wooden spoon.

On the tenth day, add the following:

- 2 cans crushed pineapple and juice
- 2-1/2 cups sugar

1 medium-sized can fruit cocktail and juice

Stir every day.

On the 20th day, add the following:

- Two 8-ounce jars of maraschino cherries, cut into quarters, and juice

Stir every day.

On the 30th day, drain the syrup into a glass container, divide the fruit into three equal parts to make three cakes. There will be four "servings" of starter—one to give with each of the cakes and one to keep for yourself.

For one cake:

- 1 box yellow or white cake mix with pudding (or one box yellow or white cake mix and 1 box instant vanilla pudding)

- 4 eggs
- 2/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup syrup starter syrup
- 1-1/2 cups fruit from the starter recipe above
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup flaked coconut

Mix all the ingredients together and bake in a bundt or tube pan at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Repeat the process to make 2 more cakes.

Remember, the entire process from making the original starter to having cakes to give away takes 40 days. Give yourself enough time to have the cakes ready for Christmas.

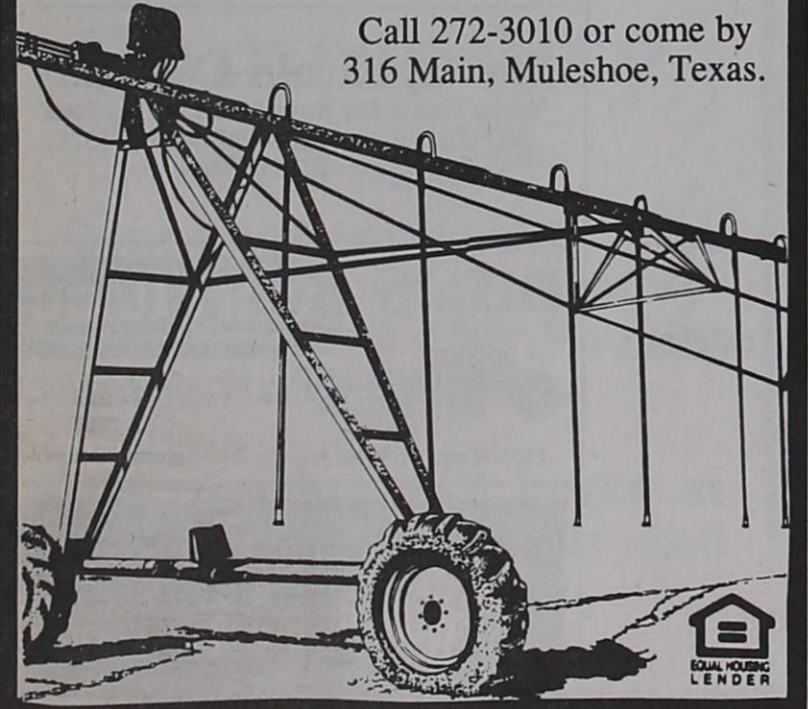

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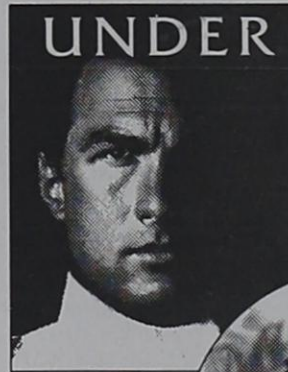

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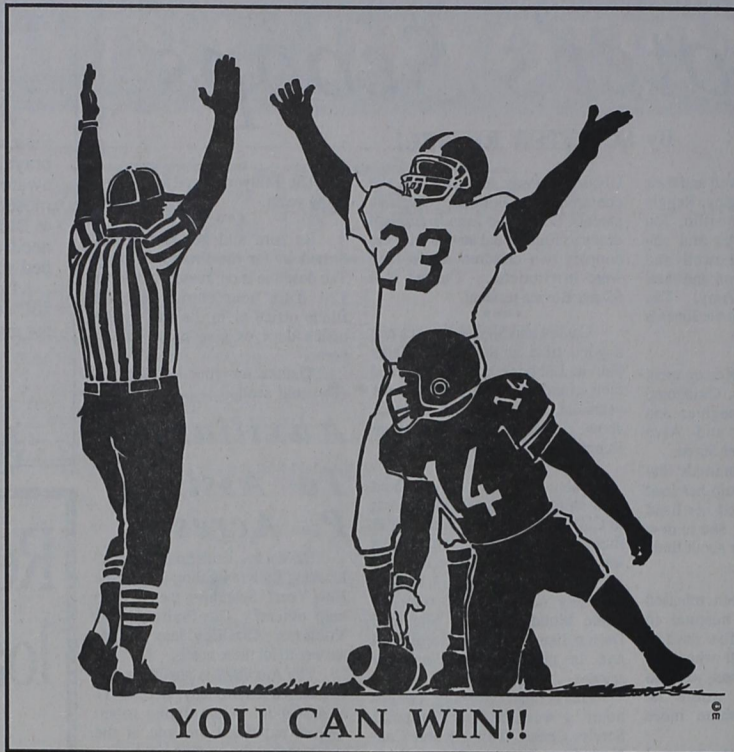
