CONTRACTS ARE SIGNED.

Frederick Gives W. F. vay a Bonus of \$30,000 and Right of Way.

The Frederick railway committee has signed up the contract for the extension of the Wichita Falls & Northwestern railway to that place The contract binds Frederick to pay subsidy of \$30,000 and to give the right of way through the big pasture and the ground for the depot and the terminals in Frederick.

The surveyors are now in the field getting ready to locate the route

At present they are following the route first selected, which will throw them about six miles north of Quanah Oklahoma, but they will probably have to make several changes in the route as originally surveyed.

If that line should not be satisfactory the surveyors will drop to the south, about midway between the first line and the line which runs by Quanah, and will run a trial line.

The line that passes through Quanah will probably not be followed, as it ran about five miles south of Frederick.

Oil ompany Will Appeal, Says Pierce's Counsel.

St. Louis Republic.

The finding of the jury in the Waters-Pierce Oil case undoubtedly will be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States on a plea of error," said former Judge H. S. Priest, counsel for the Waters-Pierce Company

"The charge, as given to the jury, is in itself a fundamental error. In reality the contention of the State of Texas is that the Standard Oil Company owned two-thirds of the stock of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. It alleged that if the Standard Oil Company owned a majority of the stock the corporation was a trust, and violated the laws of Texas in operating in that State.

"The Waters-Pierce Company was organized as a corporation under the laws of Missouri, and the contention of the company was that when it went into Texas it carried with it corporate rights. The company also contended that it was not a part of a trust, owing to the fact that neither the Standard Oil Company nor the Waters-Pierce Oil Company had operated in Texas before the consolidation in Missouri. The company holds that a corporaion cannot be a trust unless it is made up of competing factors engaged in the same business in one State.

AS TO SEWERAGE.

The Times believes that the great majority of the citizens and taxpayers of Wichita Falls are opposed to the granting of a fifty-year franchise to Will McKenzie of Gainesville, or for that matter, to any other person, which will give him or them a virtual monopoly over the sewer rights of the city.

If possible the people of Wichita Falls want the city to own and directly control a public utility for this purpose. Their own experience with privately owned public utility corporations and the experience of other towns influence them to this view of the question.

The Times, without having consulted expert opinion, is under the belief that a satisfactory sewer system could be put in at a comparatively small cost. Whether this should be done now or whether we should wait until the town has grown larger and the necessity becomes more apparent a question for the people themselves to decide.

In any event, before the city council give to any individual or corporation a monopoly over the sewers of this city, we believe that they would do well to walt, and to investigate the feasibility and probable cost of the city putting in its own sewers.

Arthur was at the bat when he was hit and other than being rendered dizzy for a few seconds, experienced no immediate injurious effects from the blow. He was able to run the bases and it was not until after his side had been retired and he went out to his place in the field that he fainted.

His father thinks perhaps that the exertion in running the bases had something to do with his fainting as well as the blow.

The young man's hat was pushed back upon his head and protected it from the full force of the blow, which would probably have had serious results but for this fact.

Oil ompany Will Appeal, Says Pierce's Counsel.

St. Louis Republic.

'The finding of the jury in the Waters-Pierce Oil case undoubtedly will be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States on a plea of error," said former Judge H. S. Priest, counsel for the Waters-Pierce Company last night.

"The charge, as given to the jury, is in itself a fundamental error. In reality the contention of the State of Texas is that the Standard Oil Company owned two-thirds of the stock of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. It alleged that if the Standard Oil Company owned a majority of the stock the corporation was a trust, and violated the laws of Texas in operating in that State.

"The Waters-Pierce Company was organized as a corporation under the laws of Missouri, and the contention of the company was that when it went into Texas it carried with it corporate rights. The company also contended that it was not a part of a trust, owing to the fact that neither the Standard Oil Company nor the Waters-Pierce Oil Company had operated in Texas before the consolidation in Missouri. The company holds that a corporation cannot be a trust unless it is made up of competing factors engaged in the same business in one State.

"Of course, it would be absurd for me to say the company cannot ultimately be prevented from operating in Texas, but I am confident in saying it stands an excellent chance of having the findings of the jury at Austin set aside by the Supreme Court."
