

The same, but even worse, goes for neighbor letters "d" and "f," if they get crossed up in a story about waterfowl. (Oh, come on, think about it!)


Computers have no morals...or is it morels? No matter, they care knot. Be they dirty words or fancy mushrooms, if their spelled rite, the computer is happy.



country's No. 1 cause of death. But few Americans know what puts them at risk for CVD. And even fewer know that the risk factors for heart disease, such as smoking, lack of exercise and obesity, can actually be decreased with lifestyle changes.

The American Heart Association believes that one of the best ways to reduce the more than 900,000 deaths each year from heart disease is to focus educational efforts on children: to reach them before behaviors such as smoking and lack of exercise become hard-to-break habits. The AHA hopes that early education will help children live healthier lives as adults and decrease their risks for heart disease.

Every year, the American Heart Association launches a nationwide education campaign throughout February known as American Heart Month. This year's American Heart Month message--"Make Exercise a

#### Cardiovascular disease is this Family Affair"--emphasizes the importance of reaching children and families and educating them to take care of their hearts by engaging in regular physical activity. Consider these facts:

Studies show that at least half of today's youth do not get enough regular exercise. Less than 36 per cent of elementary and secondary schools offer daily physical education classes, which means that many children are not receiving the training to nurture life-long fitness

Some 25 per cent of all children are obese, and obese children are at an increased risk for obesity as adults. A recent study indicates that U.S. children now spend as much time watching television as they do in school! In addition, watching television enhances the likelihood of weight gain by encouraging snacking and by substituting TV for active, energy-burning

The AHA has a number of education programs for children and families on the issues of exercise, nutrition and smoking. Many schools in this area use these programs as they provide teachers with materials to help them incorporate AHA messages into their classroom activities.

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

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
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

This idea evolved after several of the granddaughters had started asking for Eva's method of combining buttermilk and flour mixture to make biscuits, making dressing for the Thanksgiving turkey and other advice that had to do with meal preparation.

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About the same time, Eva's daughter, Donna Mears, had gotten a new computer with a genealogy program and started compiling the family history.

These two ideas developed into full blown projects before someone came up with the idea of combining it together and coming up with the "Miller-Roysden Cookbook-Genealogy.'

Before its completion, Maridale and her mother, Mary Lou, collected and sorted recipes while another daughter, Linda, used her artistic talent for illustrations.

Before the book was finished, just about everyone in this large family had been asked for assistance in proof reading or giving advice in one form or another.

One of Eva's grandsons, Clint Mears, printed the book at Intheden Graphics in Friona in November of 1993. It is in a looseleaf binder and contains many memories as well as recipes and genealogy.

Incidentally, it was dedicated to John David and Ross Kent Miller, Roy's and Eva's two sons, who are different flavors of Jello. deceased.







pivot irrigation systems have been put into operation between 1990 and 1993 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent pivot inventory update by the District. 60. This brings the total number of center pivot sprinklers in use in the \$30,000 per sprinkler system, the District to 6,433.

The current tally shows Parmer County wih 1,258 center pivots; Lamb County, 1,250; Castro County, 786; Bailey County, 671; and Hale County, 604.

The total in other counties in the District is Deaf Smith, 433; Hockley, 349; Cochran, 347; Lubbock, 304; Lynn, 170; Crosby, 141; Floyd, 78; Randall, 39; Potter, 3; and Armstrong, 0.

### **Farmstead** Windbreaks Discussed

When planning a farmstead windbreak, it is important to choose the proper tree species for the Panhandle.

The tree species should be cold tolerant. Some species are adapted to the Panhandle, while others are better suited to the warmer climates

south of the Panhandle. The species should be drought tolerant. Species native to arid regions perform better in West Texas. In order to perform well, species should be resistant to insect and disease problems.

Species compatibility is important. Some species are fast growing, while others are very slow growing. The mature height of the trees should be considered. The mature height of different species can vary greatly.

The tree species can be a mixture of conifers, deciduous and shrub species. A mixture of different types provide year round protection and greater aesthetic values.

The aesthetic value of the windbreak can be enhanced by selecting species with a combination of colorful blooms, fruit or leaves.

If snow control is needed, the species selected should provide density during the winter months.

With proper planning and species selection, the farmstead windbreak will give good wind control, enhance the beauty of the farm and provide good wildlife habitat.

### Sign-up Dates Are Set For Wetlands Reserve Program

to enroll eligible acreage into U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) second Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) sign-up from February 28 through March 11, 1994. Landowners can offer their land for the program at their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office.

The program, which has \$66 million to enroll up to 75,000 acres this year, restores former wetlands converted to crop production and currently cropped wetlands to their natural state. The wetlands restoration protects habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife, improves water quality, increases ground water recharge, and reduces flooding.

Under the program, USDA will purchase permanent easements on eligible lands in return for restoration and management of wetlands. In addition to purchasing wetland easements at the appraised agricultural value of the land, USDA will pay up to 75 per cent of the wetland restoration costs.

WRP provides an excellent financial incentive to retire marginal cropland while retaining some agricultural and recreational uses," said Gary Valentine, biologist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Temple.

Eligible lands include former wetlands or existing wetlands that were cropped at least once between

Texas landowners will be able 1986 and 1990 and remain in a condition to be cropped. Also eligible are buffer areas of noncropped wetland and upland that protect restored wetlands, riparian areas (vegetated strips along rivers, creeks, streams, and other water bodies) that link WRP or similarly protected wetlands, and eligible lands currently enrolled in the

Conservation Reserve Program.

ASCS and SCS will determine eligibility of both land and landowner during sign-up. Eligible landowners can sign an "intention" to enroll their land in WRP. After the sign-up period, environmental benefits and cost estimates of each intention will be compiled and sent to ASCS's national office in Washington, D.C., for ranking. Intentions that provide the most environmental benefits at the least cost will be selected.

ASCS will obtain an appraisal of the agricultural value for each intention selected in Texas. Landowners will work with SCS and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to develop wetland restoration plans.

The Wetlands Reserve Program was funded in 1992 for nine pilot states to restore wetlands that had been converted to crop production. The limit of 50,000 acres was easily met when landowners offered 250,000 acres for the program.

Anyone interested in WRP should contact their local ASCS or SCS office for sign-up information and more program details.
