
As our train ran down the valley of the Kansas river, were much impressed with the immense fields of potatoes which seemed the main crop

as we neared Kansas City. All the morning we had passed through immense fields of wheat almost ripe, some of it very fine but much of it badly damaged by the green bugs. Then great fields of alfalfa and much larger fields of corn until after we had passed Topeka.

At Lawrence a committee of six of the leading bankers of Kansas City met our party and accopmanied is to the city. Our train was nearly three hours late, so that the automobile ride planned for us had to be abandoned though a number of the ladies were taken for short rides. However, the bankers of Kansas City gave us a hearty greeting and expressed great regret at our lim ited stay.







The knowing ones saw the ear-marks of the "system's" press-agent in these stories; and they knew that this insustrious institution had not sat up the night before because of insomnia. 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


