The rent problem has been solved in New Zealand by Government action by which a workman who formerly oo their heels and skedaddied; the theiter which bore no proportion to
the accommodations aftorded, is enabled to secure a home for his tamily t a reasonable rental.
Therefore, it was resolved by Par iament to pass legislation by means of which pleasant homes could be pro-
 rate holders of property. Not only are fair rents to be charged, (about $\$ 2.50$ per week), but sinking funds provided by which, if so desired, a portion of the rent received by the overnment is set aside in order that fter a few years the house and land nay become the freehold propery of may become.
