oday it was announced that the work of the credentials committee had been handicapped by the indiscriminate isimpossible to separate the accredited delegates from others holding tickets who were not entitled to them. In order to avoid suspicion that the convention was inimical to the administration, the general committee entrusted to Mark Woodruff, head of the Pike's Peak forest reserve force, the duty of receiving the credentials and issuing the tickets and by innuendo he was accused of having "packed" the convention for securing support for the administration's land policies. The fipal report of the committee on credentials precipitated a lively debate, when it was discovered that the committee had given Colorado one vote for every delegate present and one for every delegate accredited, making a total of 496, while for other states only those present were given votes. President Murdo McKenzie of the American National Live Stock Association, led the attack on the report. Senator Warren of Wyoming seconded Mackenzie. He demanded to know whether the convention was a meeting of the Colorado people or of the people of the entire west. MUTINY IN RUSSIAN TROOPS AT KIEV SUPPRESSED WITH A GREAT LOSS OF LIFE.

Those Who Escaped are Hiding in the City-Mutiny Breaks Out at Oth-

By Associated Press. St. Petersburg, Russia, June 19 .-The details of the mutiny at Kiev show that it was suppressed only afa bloody engagement at midnight June 17th between the mutineers and the loyal troops, in which about seventy men were killed or wounded. Two hundred and fifty mutineers were captured and will be tried by court martial, but 193 escaped and are hid in the city. Trouble has also broken out among the troops at Kaluga, but accurate information is not obtainable. owing to the censorship.

New York, June 19.—The general executive board of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union has approved the strike against either or both the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Companies. This announcement was made today by Deputy President Konen Kamp of the union. The date of the beginning of the strike was left to Mr. Small, but the first move is expected to take place within the next week

Mr. Konenkamp said that a tax of one day's pay a week had been levied against all members of the union.

Developments Expected Soon.

Neill, United States Commissioner of Labor, loomed up today as possible factors in a settlement of differences between the Commercial Telegraphers' Union and the Postal and Western Union Companies, that threaten to result in a strike of the key operators.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 19 .- The incorporation of the Barnsdall Oil Company a \$10,000,000 concern, under the laws of Deleware, today caused a slight ripple in Pittsburg, where all those interested have their headquarters. Theodore N. Barnsdall, head of the new concern, which will fight the Standard in the West, is one of the biggest independent oil men of the country, being largely interested in gas and oil in Kansas, Indian Territory and Texas, and the Barnsdall Company, it is learned, tonight will mean the consolidation of all the small companies of the West and Southwest. It will be a Barnsdall affair from first to last, as W. B. Clingman, H. B. Kestor and J. T. Furlong, who appear as the incorporators at Dover, are all employes of the Barnsdall Company at Pitts-

THE NEW ZEALAND IDEA.

Government Action Solves Rent Problem and Makes Many Home Owners.

The rent problem has been solved in New Zealand by Government action by which a workman who formerly to their heels and skedaddled; the shelter which bore no proportion to the accommodations afforded, is enabled to secure a home for his family at a reasonable rental.

Therefore, it was resolved by Parliament to pass legislation by means of which pleasant homes could be provided for the working class, with benefits not usually granted by private holders of property. Not only are fair rents to be charged, (about \$2.50 per week), but sinking funds provided by which, if so desired, a portion of the rent received by the Government is set aside in order that after a few years the house and land may become the freehold propery of the occupier

In the larger cities, where pressure is most extreme, cottages have been built on fair-sized allotments, but are not to be let to persons having incomes exceeding \$1,000 a year.

The cottages are being freely applied for, and the scheme promises not only to provide homes in which workmen can bring up their families in decency, and self-respect, but to relieve the congestion in crowded city streets, by reducing the competition for remaining houses.

The system thus sketched in outline was by no means the full extent or limit of the State attempt to provide workers with homes. 

New York, June 19.—According to

a statement made public today, the requests for gifts sent to Miss Helen Gould aggregate near \$2,000,000 a week. They range all the way from asking for \$15 for a set of false teeth to \$1,000,000 to start a colony in Cuba.

Miss Gould gave an itemized list of a week's requests recently to Franz Kaltenborn, the orchestra leader. A movement is on foot among the music lovers of this city to make Mr. Kaltenborn's orchestral music a permanent feature in New York. For this subscriptions from wealthy persons would be necessary. Miss Gould was one of those consulted. She encouraged Mr. Kaltenborn, but, incidentally, cited the fact that this was not the only thing she was asked to encourage. Then she gave him the list.

In the week referred to Miss Gould received 231 requests for money outright. Out of these, 195 left the amount to her good will and discretion.
