 and This Exerts a DepressingAtlanta, Ga., June 25 .- President Harvie Jordan of the Southern Cotton Association, who returned last night from a tour of Europe in the interests of the cotton growers of the South today gave gut the text of a letter
to the president of the New York exchange, which was published in New York today. In this letter he says: It am informed by prominent cot ton factors and brokers of Liverpool
that a shipment of 9,000 bales of American cotton in one lot would soon leave Liverpool for New York to be lendered on July contracts, sold
through the New York cotton ex through the New York cotton ex
change: further, that the buik of tht change: further, that the bulk of this shipment of 0,000 bales sent back to America was cotton which had been endered on the Liverpeol exchange mittee on account of its belng too low a grade to meet the minimum requirements of the Liverpool contracts.
was shown the sample of a portion the grades of this shipment of 9,000 bales, and was informed that such cotton was regarded as the refuse o the Liverpool market. As 1 understan it, the rules of the Liverpool and Nev York cotton exchanges as to the ten ter of grades on contract are pract cally the same, and that nothing be cally the same, and that nothing be in elther market. York cotton exchange must be he lowest in the world, or eise fairly and hoasstly administered. "There appears to be no secret or a to this special shipment of low grad cotton, and they seemed to take it a a matter of fact that New York was the best place to get rid of such refuse cotton at a ponfit.
"It cannot be denied, and this matter 1 wish to urge upon you, that the notorious accumulations of the world refuse cotton in New York, where it is recognized and received as legal ten der against contracts, means the ex istence and perpetuity of a depressing influence upon the price of spot cotton in the South which no true Americal eltizen should stand for.
"The criticisms of the New York exchange, its methods and transactions by the cotton interests abroad, no only injure the usefulness of your exchange for the safe conduct of business, but ther also injure the entire spot cotton interests of America. In concluding. Mr. Jordan appeals to the president of the New York exchange to check the dellivery of cotton refuse scraped up in forelgn markets and entoree the rules of the New York exchange for the anfeguarding of the American interests.
