THIRTY-SEVEN DEAD AND 2340 IN-JURED IN CELEBRATION OF THE FOURTH.

Of Victims Will Be Added to Death List By Tetanus, the Grim Aftermath of Gunpowder Wounds.

By Associated Press Chicago, July 5 .- The Tribune today says: Thirty seven men and women; and children are dead, and 2340 are maimed, lacerated or burned as the result of yesterday's excess of patriotism in the United States. The number of dead does not include five that were drowned. The roster of the dead is four more than last year's mortality Unfortunataely, the death roll will increas day by day as tetanus, that grim aftermath of gun powder wounds, claims its victims by the scores and even hundreds for weeks after the Fourth.

Pittsburg, Fa., July 5.-All records for fatalitis following the celebration of Independence Day in Pittsburg.were broken this year. Up to 10 o'clock today 19 deaths were reported to the Coroners office, while the number of the injured were three score. It is said that many that are injured wil die.

ENCOURAGE GOOBER GROWERS.

Since it has been demonstrated that peanuts do well in this section of the country and that prices are good, many farmers have given cotton second place in their programs and are placing their bets on the goober. Until the past few months little was generally known lowest average yield of wheat realized about the demand for this toothsome nut and some farmers still fear that the industry may be overdone. To those who have entertained such fears the following from the Beaumont Enterprise will be interesting and instructive:

The consumption of peanuts in this country is constantly on the increase. A few years ago, the imports of peanuts were nil, but in recent years the biorease in such imports has been marvelous. It is estimated that there were consumed in the United States last year no less than 12,000,000 bushels of the goobers.

At present Virginia and North Caro-He a supply two-thirds of the total crop of the nuts, and Georgia and Alabama and Florida nearly all of the remainbeg third. The cultivation of the peanut in Texas is considerable as compared with the totals of the country and yet there are large areas in this state admirably adapted to the growth of the nuts. The increase in the imports and consumption of peanuts during the past few years creates a condition that is of importance to the farmer of Texas.

At times the farmers and orchardists have run up against the results of over production and it is not surprising that they are a little wary about renewing the experience in other lines, but if the above excerpt from the Beaumont paper is reliable, and there is no reason why it may not befully depended upon, as the sta-Gales are accurately gathered, there a no danger of over production for many years, if at all. One reason for this is because it is only on certain kinds of soil that the peanut is profitable, and that area is comparatively small. Besides this is the fact that consumption of the nut is so rapidly increasing that the demand of the coming years can not well be met, and so long as we grow only for the domestic demand there is no danger of over production. We hope to see no cotton planted in future on peanut land, and thus the price of that staple will be increased.-Abilene Reporter.

A representative of the Times took advantage of an invitation extended by Mr. J. A. Kemp to make a visit to the Olney country on the Fourth. The automobile party started from this city at about 6 o'cloke on the morning of the Fourth of July and by 10 o'clock we landed at the hotel at Olney, a distance of 45 miles. Two hours were spent at Olney, which is located in Young county, and is surrounded on all sides by as fine a farming country as can be found in Texas or else-

As yet the little village has a population of only about 200 people. Its enterprises consist of a State bank, five or six business houses, hotel wagon yard, telephone exchange, three churches and a large two-story frame school house. That the people in and around Olney are well-to-do and prosperous is evidenced by the fact that when an opportunity was given them to secure the Wichita Falls and Southern railway, they called for a meeting of citizens and raised a bonus of \$20,000 in cash and in addition to this gave one hundred acres of land for the depot grounds and terminals and right of way for fifteen or twenty miles of

From interviews with farmers, the Times learned that last year more than an average of a bale of cotton to the acre was made on all lands planted to cotton in the Olney neighborhood. This year the acreage in cotton is more than double what it was last, and the crops in fine shape, being a good stand, free from grass and in high state of cultivation.

The greenbugs damaged the wheat and oat crops of this section of country greatly, but nearly all farmers who planted these crops last fall have raised wheat and oats that would justify the expense of harvesting. The threshers are now running and the was five bushels per acre. One crop of oats made an average yield of fifty bushels per acre.

That this is a fine farming country proven by the fact that land has been selling for the last year or two at about \$30 per acre. When the railroad reaches Olney, the value of this farming land, as well as grazing land will be greatly enhanced.

The opening up of this country will mean much to Wichita Falls, as it will more than double her trade territory and place her business people in close touch with a thrifty class of farmers whose acquaintance they can well afford to cultivate. At present nearly all Olney people do their trading at Graham. After the building of the Southern it will be much more convenient for them to do their shopping in Wichita Falls.

Olney is twenty-seven miles from Graham by the nearest wagon road and forty-five miles from Wichita Falls. Before the Rock Island built to Graham, many of these farmers brought their products to Wichita Falls to market, because they could get a better price for them here. This trade was lost by Wichita, after the Rock Island was built, but will now be regained. The Southern will be completed in time to bring all cotton produced in that section of the country to be marketed here, and will be a saving to the farmers who produce It of more than a dollar per bale in freight charges. Many farmers are also holding their yheat for the purpose of shipping it to Wichita Falls when the Southern is completed.

JAPANESE DISBELIEVE REPORT THAT U. S. WILL SEND BAT-TLESHIPS TO PACIFIC COAST.

United States Does Not Possess Nava Bases Adequate For A Ren dezvous.

By Associated Press.

Tokio, Japan. July 5.- A report from Washington attributing the proposed sending of sixteen batlleships to the Pacific coast to Admiral Dewey's private plan is generally disbelieved here by those whose knowledge and experience entitles their opinion to some at tention. The United States is not known to possess any naval base in the Pacific adequate for such a purpose and the impression prevails that the sending of a large squadron where sufficient rendezvous does not exist would simply mean that the vessels would be an easy prey to torpedo boats and destroyers. Should sixteen battleships be so employed as to disprove this, a record breaking naval feat will have been accomplished.

#### JAILED FOR DEBT.

At One Time the Law Was Severe on These Who Owed Money.

In nearly every country until comparatively recent times debtors have been subject to imprisonment. After the panic of 1825 101,000 writs for debt were issued in England. In 1830 7,000 persons were sent to London prisons for debt, and on Jan. 1, 1840, 1,700 persons were held for debt in England and Wales, 1,000 in Ireland and less than 100 in Scotland. From time to time modifications in the laws governing the imprisonment of debtors have been made, so that fewer debtors are imprisoned for this crime each

In 1829 there were 3,000 debtors in prison in Massachusetts, 10,000 in New York, 7,000 in Pennsylvania, 3,000 in Maryland and a like proportion in other states. Many of these persons were jailed for debts of \$1. The law providing for the imprisonment of men who could not pay their debts was shown to be impracticable by statistics taken from Philadelphia, where in 1828 there were 1,085 debtors imprisoned for debts amounting to \$25,000. The expense of keeping these persons in confinement was \$302,000, which was paid by the city, and the amount recovered by this method was \$295.

Imprisonment for debt was abolished by congress in the United States in 1823, though this measure was not fully enforced until 1839.-New York Tribune.
