Then he shall nie a petition with the county Judge, setting forth that he has been a resident in such county for two years and has complled with preliminary statutes of this law, and if the place of business he wishes to locate in be in any block or square where there are more pona
Ade residences than business houses, or in any block where there is a church or school, them sald petition
shall be accompanied by the written consent of a majority of such property owners.
The saloons shall close at 12 oclock at night and remain closed until 5 o'clock in the morning during week
days, and from 12 oclock Saturday night till 5 oelock Monday morning. The penalty for violating this clause is not less than $\$ 25$ or nore chan $\$ 300$ fine or imprisonment in the
county fall for not more than three months, or by botls such fine apd imprisonment, and, in addition, upon complaint of county attorney, the ul cense of sald dealer may be forfelted. A bond of $\$ 5,000$ shall be given for held responsible for the good conduc of the proprietor.
