J. L. McCONKEY SELLS 800 ACRES FOR \$20,000.

Who Will Take Immediate Possession of His New Purchase.

Another big deal in farming land in the Wichita country has just been closed. J. L. McConkey, one of the Wichita country's representative farmers, has sold his farm of 800 acres, situated about twelve miles southwest of Wichita Falls on Holliday creek, to Joseph Petter of Ballinger. Mr. Mc-Conkey agreed to give immediate possession and the new owner has already started to move on his purchase. The sale includes half the season's crops and Mr. McConkey will probably remain on the farm until after the crops are harvested.

He has not yet decided what he will do in the future, but the Times sincerely hopes that he will not leave this

This twenty thousand dollar sale recalls the fact that when Mr. McConkey arrived in Wichita Falls in 1888 his entire capital consisted of fifty cents and the increase in his wealth is another instance of what a man can do in this country through intelligent industry and thrift.

THE ANTI-PASS LAW.

Complying with the State law passed by the Thirtieth Legislautre, the railroads of Texas have issued orders calling in all free passes. The law inculdes in the list of "free-pass toters" the newspaper men who sell advertising space in exchange for transportation, and if the railroads are carrying out the provisions of this new law in every other respect as well as they are the clause which prohibits them from exchanging transportation for advertising space, this paper is of the opinion that the Texas legislature has at least made one law which the railroads seem eager to live up to. The Times was called upon by all roads with which it had contracts for advertising to surrender them, together with all transportation which had been issued. Upon some of these roads not a mile had been used. The contracts were made for one year. The passage of the law provides that the roads shall not pay for services already rendered under their contract in transportation over their lines. This forces those newspapers which have not used their transportation free pass holder. "I told you a rose had a short life," was the answer.




