THE MERCHANTS AND THE ANTI. The section of the Texas antirust taw which makes it a penal offense to selt trust made goods is a proposition which is
puzzting many: of the retail merchants of Wichita Falls. One of them said to the Times this morning "The law, would
not be so hard if it only imposed ane for we could make the manufacturer or wholesale furnish us with a guarantee hat the goods were not trust made, and could hold either the wholesaler or the manufacturer iable for our fines, but this penal business can't be shifted hat way.
The new law is bound to work a hardship on every mer chant in Texas, for it will place the burden upon him of ascer taining that every line he han fles is not of trust manufacture. t will devolve upon him to cither go himself or send someone East to find out if the firm he is doing business with is rust. Even then it is doubtful of he could get the desired in formation. The whole idea of the law is impracticable wrong. I an against the trusts, and think that the country would be better off if it could be purged of them, but this proposition of putting the whole matter up to me to find out whether any of the goods I am selling are trust made or not, is going too far it seems to me, and I don't know what to do."

It is the mission of the Times to talk bout how best to build ap the town, but occaslonally it becomes necessary o haye something to say how to make commercial graveyard out of a thriv ing, prosperous city. The best way to do this is sometimes to follow in the footsteps of organizations that-have for their purpose the upbuilding of a fty and makes the mistake of order ing its supplies away from home, ofter ing as an excuse for findulging in this pratice that the same can be purchas ed a little bit cheaper, or berhaps the uality is a little bit better. This same excuse could be given. by everyone who feels finelined to make their mon-
ey in Wichita Falls and spend It
abroad, but it the practice was general there would be but little use for mierchants and business men generally to
pay rent on pay rent on buildings and taxes on stocks of goods. In order to make Wichita Falls a thriving commercial center, we. every one of us, should
spend our money at home. Again, if our leading business organizations our leading business organizations
make a practice of sending away for make a practice of sending away for that whith could be obtained of the
local dealer, the local newspaper i placed in an awkward attitude to offer criticism to those who are following the example of organizations that are the example of organizations that are supposed to have for thefr purpqse building.
