Said to Have Been Discovered By Rockefeller's Benefactions.

By Associated Press Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 6 .- According to private advices received last night from New York the wealth of John D. Rockefeller has made possible a cure for meningitis. Dr. Simon Fetzner, the dispatches say, has discovered a serum which will cure the heretofre fatal disease. Experiments made at Castala, Obio, it is declared, have demonstrated the efficiency of the serum. Dr. Felzner is at the head of the Rockefeller institute for medical research in New York.

Paris, France, Aug. 6.-Captain Tsuneda, the Japanese miltary attache who, while on the staff of General Nogi, conducted the negotiations for change, committed suicide by shooting the surrender of Port Arthur, in an last night. Their Villages Were Destroyed and Rebels Were Utterly Routed.

Tangler, Aug. 6.-The French cruis er Galilee was bombarding the Moor ish quarters of Casa Blance and the neighborhood of the city last night when the last steamer which arrived here today left that port. Kabyles at tacked Casa Blanca and the Moorish authorities applied to the commander of the Galilee for assistance. He there upon landed sixty men and the Spanish cruiser landed forty. This landing party was fired upon by Kabyles and seven Frenchmen, including one officer, were wounded. The combined French and Spanish forces thereupon cleared the city of the hostiel tribes men. Guards were placed about the foreign consulates and then the Gal ilee opened fire with her big guns upon the rebels.

Moorish Commander Seeks Pardon.

By Associated Press. London, England, Aug. 6.-A special from Tangier today describing the bombardment of Casa Blanca says the French cruiser Duchayla and the Span ish gunboat Don Alvare de Bastan participated with the Galilee in the bom bardment of the villages surrounding Casa Blanca, which were destroyed by the fire of the warships. During the bombardment large reinforcements of tribesmen came up and many of them were killed or wounded. The Casa Blanca battery joined in the firing upon the foreign warships, whereupon the guns of the French and Spanish cruisers were turned upon the battery, which soon caused the Moorish com mander to send a messenger to the French admiral, requesting his pardon This was refused and the admiral sent a peremptory order to the Moorish comamnder to surrender himself to the French consulate.

If the census shows that Wichita Falls has a poputation of 5,000 or more, there can be no grounds upon which a refusal to give the city free mail delivery can be based. Members of the B. P. O. E. especially should feel interested in the census, for it is contemplated to petition for a charter for a lodge here from that odrer. Unless it can be proven that the city has a population of not less than five thousand inhabstants, it will avail nothing to ask for a charter, as lodges are established only in towns of more than 5,000 popu-

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BETTER SERVICE.

Shippers More Concerned Over Trans portation Than Rates.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 6.-Several months ago it might have been conjectured, from complaints about railroad rates and methods, there would be inaugurated an irresistible movement looking to the general and perhaps arbitrary reduction of rates. This anticipation has not been realized by developments.

Although the railroads have begun increasing many rates, especially on commodities, shippers are not objecting. Most of the protests which the interstate commerce commission has received do not seek reduction in rates but the elimination of inequalities. Shippers appear to be, as a rule, satisfled with the tariffs.

It is obvious that a new sentiment is growing in all parts of the country, particularly among shippers who understand the transportation problem. There is a spreading desire for justice to and from the carriers.

The chief need of the country, and it is observed principally in developing territories and large distributing centers, is better service from the railroads. Shippers seem to be unanimous in the opinion that the enlargement of terminals, the construction of necessary extensions, the building of more passing track, the augmentation of motive power and equipment, and the rapid and safe transportation of freight, constitute the principal needs of the country.

Shippers insist, of course, that rates should be reasonable and fair. One center or town does not want another to have any advantage in rates, and one class of shippers does not want another to enjoy a relative advantage in rates. But, outside of the questions of reasonableness and fairness, the rate problem is not, with existing tar. in their line. iffs, of vital importance.

It is a cause of regret among Government and railroad officials, that there has been conflict between the Federal and the State commissions, and financiers fear that the antagonistic policies of several State commissions may hamper the carriers to such an extent as to prevent the acquisition of funds for necessary improvements and betterment. In Canada the Dominion Commission's orders have precedence over those of Provincial commissions, and it is hoped that some such working arrangement will be found in the United States. If this can be done and certain State commissions can be induced to become conservative or reasonable, the solution of transportation and rate problems will be facilitated.

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



DOGFISH CUTLET.

to Be as Good as the Best Lobster Ever Eaten.

Dogfish ought to be good to eat, as it is well known that they feed on soles, plaice and flounders. The naturalist hailing from the north Kent marshes with whom I collaborated in various books said that in his boyhood they were much used by the fishing folk and that they were excellent eating, a middle cutlet being considered by many to be as good as the best lobster ever eaten. As a boy he never tired of hearing the fishermen's yarns about how the great savage creatures snapped and fought when they were captured. Lying in the bottom of the boats, they lashed about and bit at the men and at each other. The larger ones would fix on the men's sea boots as they moved about or hang on to their oilskin fishing coats like buildogs. A bite from one was no joke.

Dogfish abounded at certain seasons in some parts of the fishing grounds: other parts they avoided. Sometimes the men would go out only to eatch dogfish just to reduce their numbers a little. They caught great numbers of them and sold them somewhere farther down the coast, keeping back just a few for themselves and their neighbors. You could get a monster for a couple of shillings.

Couch, the naturalist, says he has known 20,000 of the picked dogfish to be taken at one cast of the seine. Robert Chalmers quoted as follows from the "journal" of Spalding, the town, clerk of Aberdeen: "1642. From the beginning of this year up to June there was a searcity of whitefish along the; east coast to the hurt and hunger of the poor and beggaring of the fishermen. It was reported that when the fishers had laid their lines and taken fishes abundantly there came one beast called the seadog to the lines and ate and destroyed the haill bodies and left nothing on the lines but the beads. The like scarcity of fishes to continue so long has scarcely been seen in Scotland, while all other meats were also very dear."-Pall Mall Gazette.

A FAMOUS DUELIST.

This French Fighter Was Gallant as Well as Courageous.

The Marquis de l'Angle-Beaumanoli was in his younger days famous as a duelist. One evening, meeting his cousin, the Marquis du Hallays, in the foyer of the Opera, he walked up to him and in the course of conversation remarked:

"Isn't it odd, my dear fellow, that. quarrelsome as you and I are, we should never have fought with one

"That's true," replied Du Hallays. but that can always be remedied."

And on the strength of that the two consins met in mortal combat on the following morning, the encounter resulting in the Marquis de l'Angle-Beaumanoir having his right hand pierced by his adversary's rapier, which, while it rendered a continuance of the fight impossible, left the other hand free to grasp that of his cousin in undiminished friendship a moment afterward.

On another occasion when he was about to fight a duel in which he was entirely in the right and his adversary in the wrong he suddenly discovered that his opponent was a perfect novice in swordsmanship and that he would therefore have him completely at his mercy. So he strode up to him and in the presence of twenty or thirty persons presented the most courteous and full apology. Almost dumfounded, the latter inquired why the marquis assumed such an extraordinary course. A GREAT BASEBALL SERIES How Boston and Providence Battled Ir

the League In 1884.

Probably one of the grandest series of baseball games played by National league clubs was that between the Bostons and the Providence Grays in 1884. The Bostons had won the champlonship of 1883, and it was the ambition of Providence cranks, who lived only forty miles away from the Hub. to wrest the laurels away from the Bean Eaters. Every game that was played between the clubs was tended by immense crowds, and the excitement was at white heat.

The first game of the series in 1884 was one of sixteen innings and resulted in a tie, the score standing 1 to 1. The pitchers were Charley Radbourne and Jim Whitney, and 10,000 persons saw the battle. The next day Providence won by a score of 2 to 1 in nine innings, and Charley Sweeney struck out nineteen Boston batsmen. Of the first eight games Boston won five and Providence three. When it came time to meet for the four final struggles the Providence team had won every series from the other league clubs and wanted to win the series from the Bostons too. Radbourne accordingly was assigned to pitch in all four games on four successive days. He was in such magnificent form that H H H H H H H H H H in all of the games the Bostons were beaten and scored the sum total of one run. One of the games lasted eleven innings. It was played in Boston and I was finally won by the Rhode Islanders by a score of 1 to 0. Arthur Irwin, who was the shortstop for Providence, drove a long fly toward the right field fence, and the ball went through a hole between the boards. It was a four bagger and decided the

Radbourne's wonderful pitching in I those days will never be forgotten by those who saw him perform. He went into the box game after game and I pitched for nineteen consecutive contests. It was his remarkable twirling I that was instrumental in helping Providence to win the pennant that year. Sweeney jumped the club in the middle of the season, and Rad went along single handed. One feat that was the talk of the baseball world in 1883 was his pitching in an exhibition game at Trenton. The home club would not allow Providence to play with the regulation league ball and insisted upon substituting another of lighter weight. Radbourne, however, accepted the latter ball and proceeded to strike out every man who came to the bat until one man had been retired in the sixth inning. Then a player fouled the ball, which had not been done before. The pitching distance then was forty-five feet from the home plate.
