The reports of the county assessors the State Tax Board shows that es this year amounted to $\$ 1,579,659,611$ This is an Increase over last year of *358,499,742. At the present ratio of $\$ 358,499,742$. At the present ratio or
increase Texas will soon be a two billion dollar State.
As seen in the summary, the pres ent advalorem tax rate will bring $\$ 2$, 653,876 , while a $121 / 2$ basis, this is, on each $\$ 100$ valuation nets general evenue $\$ 1,974,574$, minus the 5 per cent for the county collectors and some probabie delinquent collections. And the last Legislature raised the state school tax from 18 c to 20 c on the $\$ 100$ valuation. The Automatic Tax Board can reduce the general advalorem tax to $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{c}$, or any other fig are it sees att, and $121 / \mathrm{c}$ is believed co
be fts goal at this time, but it can re duce the state school tax only to the extent that the total must produce at least $\$ 4$ for every child within thp cholastle age in the state. As there over 800,000 scholastics in Texas this writing the Automatic Tay Board will not be able to reduce the
State sehool tax this year, and the cate school tax this year, and the it on each $\$ 100$ valuation will stand It must be remembered that the counties will also conlect their taxes on the fncreased raluations, and will be able to reduce the general revenue caxes, as the State Automatic Tax Board is expected to do with the ad valorem tax, $121 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ being regarded as the objective point. If such a redue tion was not made and the countie falled to make reductions the taxpay ers would feel the increased values even to the extent of being burden some in some places.
Whe general revenue fund has soufces of income other than the State adwalorem taxes collected, as has the adyyool tund. The general revenue re schgol fund. ## MIST NOW CONFORM TO JUSTICE OR FAlL

Standard Oil's Day Is as Surely Ended as Right Is Right, Declares Greatest Authority on the Oil Trust's 35 Years of Unfair Dealing.

By Miss Ida M. Tarbell. New York, Aug. 14.-"The day of the standard Ofl Company in fts old form' is over. It must elther now contorm to justice and fair dealing or it wif fall utterly. I don't mean that its tay ts over this year or will be over mext year, but it is as surely ended as right ts right."
Misá Ida M. Tarbell in an interview given to the World last night thus exgiven to the World last night chus ex reessed her satisfaction at the atssess meant of the $\$ 29,240,000$ fine on the ofl
crust by Judge Landis. Miss Tarbell crust by Judge thais. regarded as the greatest muthority on the workings of the oil trust, Her
"History of the standard oul Compaia" Grat brought home to the genaral public a realization of the trust's tarreaching operations and their trué stgnificance.
Credit for the tremendous fine as a Coltimination of her labors is ont, how ever, taken by Miss Tarbell. She re gards it rather as the climax of a warthre extending over thirty-five years.
-After thirty-Ave years of such prac thees of the Standard ofl Company thas been found guilty of" ald Miss Tarbell "fs entirely just that after Tarbell, "is entirely just that, after conviction, the maximum punishment should be imposed. I am only sorry that the punishment ca
thing more than a fine.
"What I have done has been for the sake of the public. It is not that have been vindictive, as many people seem to belleve. On the contrary have a tremendous admiration for the Standard Oll Company and for many of them in it . In one way they have done a great public service, but they have wiped out any posibility of gratitude from the public for these services by their ilelgal methods of operation in conhection with thel good work.

Ite 35 Years of Evil Practices. "If the offenses of which they have Just beèn found guilty were their first, ve might say that the fine was exces afve and be doubttul about the wisdom of imposing it. But it is only the last oftense we know of in thirty-five years K was Just thirty-five years ago that the United, States government had to tavestigate the tSandard Oil Company for its illegal contracts with rallroads. The state of Penngylvania arose in what was almost a revolution agains the Standard's practices. Pennsyl rania, Ohio and New York in the sev entles pased laws to try to stop the trust's drawbackg and rebates which it was recelving.
"It was very largely the rebating the Standard On Company that led to the passage of the finteristate commerce act in 1887. In Ohlo the gtandard vio lated the laws unth the state ordered $n$ to be disbanded.
"I do not belleve that there is aingle year in the whole thirty-five in which some state or the United states has not had some suit on agalnst th trust, and in the last fifteen yeara dozen States have been trying to pass laws to force it to decency and talr ness.
"The difficulty with the men in the standard on Company seems to be that they have no sense that the pubHo has any part in the conduct of corporations. They utterly lack the collective sense. It is individualism sone mad-reduced to an absurdity.
"It is rather fnteresting to notice that chey prent now the same sor
have been caught breaking the laws. They always point to the great num ber of men they employ, to the large fito the country and to the immense ums spent in caritable and educational undertakinkings, with the inference that it is impossible for such good those with which they are charged.
"It seems never to occur to them that this is something the publie can see through and that nobody would sympathize with them, even if they were not guilty.

Connivance With Rallroads.
"I have not examined carefully the estimony in this case of the Chicago and Alton rallroad, but it has been a well known fact that for a good many years there has been a constant dis of the Siandard Oll Company's re anery at Whiting, Ind. That refinery supplies the West and a good deal of independent refineries in or near cago. The nearest independent refining center of any consequence is at Cleveland, Ohio
"Now it has been pointed out repeatedly that in the last six or seven years that the standard was able to ship from Whiting at much lower rates than the independents could ship same. of course this could only have been done through some sort of con nivanice with the freight agents. "I have no doubt that all these facts were taken finto consideration by Judge Landis. If the standard had been shipping oll over the Chicago and Alton without having an advan
tage over competitors, it is the first time in thirty-five years that it has shipped oll without having an advat tage.

The polnt is that the public for thir-ty-ive years has been trying to make
the Standard oll Company play talr It has given the trust repeated tngs in the way of public uprising he passage of laws and idverse decta lons. But every time the trust has ons. But every time the trust has snapped its dingers and gone on in the
same old way. same old way.
"It is a sort of insolence which a people would be very supine to toler ate indefintely. it is betng demonstrated clearly that the American pen ple do not propose to endure it any longer. The standard oll men are not only insolent, but they are stmpld as well, and show that they entirely misunderstand the power of public opinion and the genuineness of the public's sense of fair play.
"They have had every chance to readjust their business and conduct it as gentlemen should, and all they hav eyer done, after a pubic explonion, their same old practices in a now way

The Despicable spy system. "It is not merely taking tllegal rates -the misidemeanor of which they wore convicted in Chicago-that the public has against them. Thetr mefhots of competition are perfectly well known
in all parts of the country. There are hundreds of towns in which their citizens have seen these methods in oporation. They have a spy system which they apply to shipments of inderendents which would do credit to the ber barons of the middle ages
"They have no pride in the quality of thetr product, but always, give as
