Business is moving with almost its ordinary promptness and Western Union officials say the strike is practically broken. The Associated Press is now moving its news on its principal trunk wires, with more normal conditions prevailing. Only in the South and the West is any trouble being experienced. Several operators who were formerly employed by the

Associated Press applied for positions today and were reinstated. The present stike of telegraph operators brings to mind the great strike of 1883 when for a period of thirty days the wires were tied up complete-

ly and as generally as they are now. That was twenty-four years ago and the operators who participated in the strike are now either gray-haired veterans in the service or have passed over the river where communication does not need the medium of wires. There have been isolated cases since then when the men at the keys in certain territory have walked out in protest against what they believed to be acts of injustice, but the entire force of lightning artists throughout the country has not united in a general strike until they again went out in the present instance.

from the clouds during a rainstorm. An acre contains 6,272,640 square inches of surface, and an inch of rain means, therefore, the same number of cubic inches of water. A gallon con tains 177.27 cubic inches of water, and an inch of rainfall means 22,622 gallons to the acre, and as a gallon of water weighs ten pounds, the rainfall on an acre is 226,220 pounds. Counting 2,000 pounds to the ton, an inch of rain means over 113 tons, per acre. An acre is about half a St Louis block so that a rainfall of an inch means a downpour of about 226 tons on every city block .--- Globe-Democrat.







Leuderbach of the University of California recently gave the results of his examination of a new gem of great beauty recently discovered by two prospectors in San Benito county, Cal., says a San Francisco dispatch to the New York Sun.
