the United States Dangerous- Lers and Cotton Mouth Mace ins the Most Deadly.

The only dangerous snakes in the United states are the rattlesnake, the copperhead and the cotton mouth moc casin. The small coral snake (harle quin, bead snake) of the gulf states, and the Sonoran coral snake of New
Mexico and Arizona are somewhat enomous, but their bite is not fatal to a healthy adult. The Gila monster of the Southwest is a dangerous lizard -the only one that is venomous-but can scarcely be provoked to bite. All other reptlles of our country and no more to be feared than that of mouse. The notion that the bite of a puff adder must be dangerous because he snake puffs up ats neck and hisses nke a goose, or that the common water suake is a moccasin and consequentiy enous, is all moonshine, like the with a poisonous sting in its tall. However, that otner notion that rattlesnake's bite is not a serious matknow nothing about other rattlers than the little prairie rattlesnake are not competent to express an opinion on the subject.
A bite from any veomous snake dangerous in proportion to the size of he snake and to the amount of venom that enters the circulation. A bite hat does not pierce an important blood vessel is seldom fatal, even if no treatment is given unless the suake be quite large.
The rattlesnake, copperhead and cot ton mouth are easily distinguished from all other snakes, as all three of them bear a peculiar mark, or met pair of a that mo other antme a pair of marks, that no other animal
possesses: This mark is the pit, which is a deep cavity on each side of th face between the nostril and the eye All venomous snakes have fangs, and no harmless ones have them. The fangs are in the upper jaw only. In the coral snake they are permanently erect, but in the other venomous snake here named they lie flat when not in use, pointing backward, and are erected by the reptile in striking. They are long, slender, shatply pointed, elth er grooved on the outside or pertont ed and connected by a duct with the venom glands which lie behind the eyes. Auxiliary fangs lie in a sac underneath the regular fang on each side, and in case the latter is broken off or extracted, a new fang will be ready for business withip a few days. Here are a few characteristics of the pit vipers, as our three deadly snakes are collectively called I. Copperhead calso called deaf ad der, upland moccasin, pilot snak three feet long, with moderately ree leet long, win moderately thick distinct from the neck, trial head quit istinct from the neekr, tail short, dar colored and pointed. Color of black a bronze hazel or light reddish brown with 15 to 20 darker bands, which are narrow on the back and expand to wide blotches on the flanks, the shaipe being somewhat like that of a dumbell with a very short handle. Head a bright copper red, with two small dark brown spots close together on he forehead at upperpart of head shleld, and with a cream-colored band round the mouth.
The copperhead inhabits the moun inous and hilly reitons from Man chusetts southward to the gult estward (sourh to the guif, and onsin, lowa. and Nebraska) to Kansas, Indian Territory and Texas. Its venom is as deadly as that

The bite of even a newly born snake of venomous specles is serious.
The bite of a venomous reptlle is Intensely painful. The victim soon becomes dull and languld, breathhng with dificulty. The venom first en. feebles the heart, then the breathing apparatus. If this early depression pases over, recovery is often sudden;

yields. Grass is good and cattle are doing well. Rains around Dalhart have proven highly beneficial to teedstuffs which are expected to make big cropk The second car of wheat has been shipped. Wheat is making betweal twelve and fifteen bushels to the acre at Texline heavy rains have delayed threshing of wheat, but helped grow ing crops.
Along the wichita Valley road no rain of any apprectable amount bos fallen, but crop conditions continue good, no section reporting crops as ust fering for want of molsture. Seymour erias and stamford send in particularly en ouraging reis, notwithstandio drouthy conditions.

Mr. Huggins, in speaking of conditions around Vernon,' reporte that cotton is doing well and with rob inued favorable weather a recor breaking crop will result.
