# WAS CONTINUED

Hargrove was represented in the court this afternoon by Attorney Graham of Bowie. In asking for a continuance of his client's trial, Attorney Graham stated that the defendant lived in imminent peril of assassination and would therefore plead justification in carrying weapons. He asked for a continuance of time to bring witnesses and depositions into the court to show the danger of assassination under which Har grove constantly lived. Judge Yeager granted the petition for a continuance of the trial and it was set for the first day of the October term of court.

Head of the Telegraphers' Union Intimates That There Will Be No

Compromise.

New York, Aug. 25 .- S. J. Small, persident of the Commercial Telegra phers' Union of America, arrived in New York this morning from Chicago He was met at the station by a large delegation of strikers.

In the afternoon Mr. Small attended a meeting of the striking telegraph operators, where he was received with enthusiasm. He made a brief address, in which he dealt with the general situation, reftaining from discussing local conditions. Tonight Mr. Small gave out an optimistic statement, regarding general strike conditions, say-

### PAPER SACKS FOR HATS.

Pullman Company Solves. Problem of Protection for Ladies' Headgear.

The Pullman Company has added another to the long list of conventences provided for its patrons. When traveling, the disposal of their hats during the journey has long been a problem with the women tourists. To wear them all the way was out of the question, if they were placed on the seat the owner or someone else was sure to sit upon them. For a time the problem was solved by the supplying of soiled pillow cases for the hatt, so that they could be pinned to the berth curtains, out of the way.

But the general office in Chicago issued an order that the Pullman linea should be used for the purpose intended for it; the porters were ordered to discontinue the issuing of pillow slips. It was then up to the company to find a solution of the difficulty and the plan of supplying paper bags, similar to those used by milliners, was put in practice. These are carried on every Pullman car and are given out to all of the women travelers, so they can protect their hats from the dust and have a convenient way of disposing of them during the trip.

WHAT TO DO WHEN A

## ONLY FOUR REPTILES

In the United States Dangerous-Rattlers and Cotton Mouth Maccasins the Most Deadly.

The only dangerous snakes in the United States are the rattlesnake, the copperhead and the cotton mouth moccasin. The small coral snake (harlequin, bead snake) of the gulf states, and the Sonoran coral snake of New Mexico and Arizona are somewhat venomous, but their bite is not fatal to a healthy adult. The Gila monster of the Southwest is a dangerous lizard -the only one that is venomous-but can scarcely be provoked to bite.

All other reptiles of our country and Canada are harmless; their bite is no more to be feared than that of a mouse. The notion that the bite of a puff adder must be dangerous because the snake puffs up its neck and hisses like a goose, or that the common water snake is a moccasin and consequently venomous, is all moonshine, like the story of the hoop snake and the snake with a poisonous sting in its tail.

However, that other notion that a rattlesnake's bite is not a serious matter is moonshine, too. Men who know nothing about other rattlers than the little prairie rattlesnake are not competent to express an opinion on the subject.

A bite from any veomous snake is dangerous in proportion to the size of the snake and to the amount of venom that enters the circulation. A bite that does not pierce an important blood vessel is seldom fatal, even if Hardware Store. You will no treatment is given unless the snake be quite large.

> The rattlesnake, copperhead and cotton mouth are easily distinguished from all other snakes, as all three of them bear a peculiar mark, or rather a pair of marks, that no other animal possesses. This mark is the pit, which is a deep cavity on each side of the face between the nostril and the eye, sinking into the upper jawbone.

All venomous snakes have fangs, and no harmless ones have them. The fangs are in the upper jaw only. In the coral snake they are permanently erect, but in the other venomous snake here named they lie flat when not in use, pointing backward, and are erected by the reptile in striking. They are long, slender, sharply pointed, eith er grooved on the outside or perforat ed and connected by a duct with the venom glands which lie behind the eyes. 'Auxiliary fangs lie in a sac underneath the regular fang on each side, and in case the latter is broken off or extracted, a new fang will be ready for business within a few days. Here are a few characteristics of the pit vipers, as our three deadly

1. Copperhead (also called deaf ad der, upland moccasin, pilot snake, chunk head). A small snake two or three feet long, with moderately thick body, broad and triangular head quite distinct from the neck tail short, dark colored and pointed. Color of black, a bronze hazel or light reddish brown. with 15 to 20 darker bands, which are narrow on the back and expand to wide blotches on the flanks, the shape being somewhat like that of a dumb bell with a very short handle. Head, a bright copper red, with two small dark brown spots close together on the forehead at upperpart, of head

Still, the copperhead is a particularly dangerous creature, because it gives no warning of its presence, nor, according to my observation, does it try to get out of the way, but holds its ground and springs at any intruder. 2. Cotton mouth moccasin (water moccasin). A larger snake, ordinarily about three feet, sometimes four feet long. Stout body, head shaped like that of the copperhead and similarly distinct from the neck. Back brown, reddish or olive, with 11 to 45 rather inconspicuous bars or pairs of bars of flank. Tail short, pointed and dark brown or banded. Belly brownish yellow mottled with dark blotches.

The little prairie rattlesnake, which is not very dangerous, is abundant on the plains west of the Mississippi river. The great diamond rattlesnake of the south, which sometimes grows to a length of nearly nine feet, is the most formidable member of this group. The small ground rattlesnake of the southern states is aggressive and gives only a faint warning, and on this acount is more dreaded by the negroes than the larger species, but its bite is seldom fatal to grown people. The other species are confined to the Southwest and the Pacific

Rattlesnakes are easily identified by their rattles. They generally last only long enough to become eight or ten jointed. Ratlers with as many as eight or ten rattles are quite rare The number of rattles does not indicate the snake's age. Their office is not clearly understood. Dr. Stejneger "They are a substitute for a voice."

When a rattlesnake sees a man ap proaching it generally lies quiet to escape observation so long as it thinks itself concealed. It does not strike unless provoked. If alarmed when it is wide awake, it always springs, its rattle before striking, the sound being very similar to that made by our common locust or cicada. If the reptile is trodden on when asleep it strikes like lightning and does its rattling af- that he never tells his neighbor until terward. Unfortunately for us, the poisonous snakes sleep in the daytime and hunt at night. They are prone to seek the warmth of bedclothes and will sometimes coil up alongside of a sleeping man. Mosquito netting is an effective bar against snakes. Snakes despise musk, tobacco and turpentine. A snake is not obliged to coil before

striking, but can strike from any position. It wil leoil first, however, unless attacked very suddenly or taken cakes in a box for 25c. Try it.

intentionally throw its venom, but, if it misses its mark, the act of hissing may throw the poison several feet. The blow is delivered with lightning rapidity, and the fangs are instantly sunk into the victim. No snake can leap entirely from the ground, nor can it strike more than two-thirds of its own length, unless it has the advantage of striking down-hill or from some purchase on a rock or bush. A snake does not expend all its venom at one blow. It is not rendered permanently harmless by extracting it's fangs, for it wil promptly grow new ones. A venomous snake is immune against its own poison, and propably against that of other poisonous reptiles, but nonpoisonous snakes are not immune. The bite of even a newly born snake of venomous species is serious.

The bite of a venomous reptile is intensely painful. The victim soon becomes dull and languid, breathing with difficulty. The venom first enfeebles the heart, then the breathing apparatus. If this early depression pases over, recovery is often sudden; but if the quantity of venom injected be large, death may follow, in man, within twenty minutes. The tendency of the poison is to spread very rapidly through the system, making the blood thin and destroying its power to clot. At the same time it rots the blood vessels, and in fatal cases it causes a general seepage of [blood throughout the system. In some cases a whole limb is soaked to the bone with decomposed blood. There is always inflammation around the wound, with great pain.

Much depends upon the part struck. Bites on the bare skin are no more dangerous than those received through the clothing. A bite in the extremities is rarely fatal. In a large majority of s the wound does not touch an im portant blood vessel, and the patient wil lrecover with no other treatment than a ligature promptly applied, and a free bleeding and sucking of the

TWENTY STATES HAVE EITHER CUT PASSENGER RATES OR PLAN IT.

### TWO CENTS IN FOURTEEN

Numerous States Adopt Flat Charge For Transportation on Railroads Within Their Borders.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 26.-There are twenty states that have either reduced rates on passenger traffic in the last year or have taken steps preliminary to doing so. Of these fourteen have enacted a flat 2c rate for their principal lines of railroad. These figures are based on figures on file with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Alabama has a fixed rate of 21/2c per mile on all railroads over 100 miles long. This rate will go into effect pending the determination of the Constitutional questions involved.

Arkansas has a flat 2c rate, which went into effect by law on April 9, though some of the roads have refused to reduce their fares, among them being the Rock Island and the Frisco.

Georgia has a 2c rate on her principal lines, with 21/2c and 21/2c on the smaller roads. This rate becomes effective September 9th.

Illinois has a flat 2c rate, the railroads being given the privilege of charging 3c for fares paid in cash on trains. This law went into effect on

Indiana has a flat 2c rate. Iowa has a 2c rate on roads with gross earnings amounting to \$4,000 per mile, 21/2c on roads earning \$3,000 and 3c on roads earning less than that amount per

Kansas has a law requiring railroads to sell straight mileage books of 500 miles at 2c a mile, and interchangeabio mileage books of 2,000 miles at 2c a

The Michigan statute provides that all roads having passenger earnings of \$1,200 per mile shall give a 2c rate. This law goes into effect on Septem-

The Minnesota law provides for 2c rate, and went into effect on May 1. Missouri's 2c law went into effect on June 19th, and applies to all roads with a mileage of over forty-five miles.

## CROPS

RAINS DURING PAST WEEK HAVE INSURED GOOD YIELDS OF ALL PRODUCTS.

### BY GENERAL MANAGERS

The Question of Contest of Bookkeeping Order to be Decided by Them Soon.

Rains of the past week have insured bumper crops in the upper Panhandle, according to reports of agents received by W. F. Sterley, general freight agent of the Fort Worth and Denver City railway. On the whole, therefore, conditions along the Denver road are very promising, as the lower sections have had copious rains heretofore.

Writing from Clarendon, a Denver agent says that the rains visiting that section benefitted cotton immeasurably and put the ground in good shape to prepare for fall planting of alfalfa. Four inches of rain around Claude makes ready for fall plowing. Twee ty-six cars have already been shipped from this point and between forty and fifty cars are yet to move. In Hartley county three good rains insure bumper crops of corn, milo maize and Kaffir corn, regardless of any future dryness Forage crops are promising above the average. At Channing one and one half inches of rain fell, benefitting lodian corn, which promises big yields. The ground is also placed in good coodition for the next planting of wheat Forage crops promise record-breaking yields. Grass is good and cattle are doing well. Rains around Dalhart have proven highly beneficial to feedstuffs. which are expected to make big crops. The second car of wheat has been shipped. Wheat is making between twelve and fifteen bushels to the acre. At Texline heavy rains have delayed threshing of wheat, but helped grow

Along the Wichita Valley road no rain of any appreciable amount bas fallen, but crop conditions continue good, no section reporting crops as usf fering for want of moisture. Seymour and Stamford send in particularly epcouraging reports, notwithstanding drouthy conditions.

As an example of what is being accomplished in the lower sections of the Panhandle, Mr. Sterley yesterday received from W. H. Huggins of Vernon, a basket collection of milo maize, Kuffir corn and Indian corn, grown on the farm of Davis Mays near Vernon. Alt of the products are well matured and fruited perfectly, being as fine specimens as ever displayed. The corta promises to yield fifty bushels to the acre. This is on land bought for \$16 an acre. Mr. Huggins, in speaking of conditions around Vernon, reported that cotton is doing well and with continued favorable weather a record breaking crop will result. Kaffir core has such a stand as to justify the claim that it will make sixty bushels to the acre, netting the grower between \$22 and \$23 per acre.

Summing up the situation along the Denver road, Mr. Sterley says prospects are unusually good, and he is predicting a most prosperous fall .--Fort Worth Record:
