New York, Aug. 25.-The Sun's spe clal from Atlantle, Iowa, says: clal from Atlantle, lowa, says:

ing with the recent speeches of 'Presing with the recent speeches of Pres
ident Roosevelt and Secretary Taft: Among other things, he sald: Mr. Taft's speech at Columbus not likely to please anyone. He uses too much denunciation to please the
trust magnates, but when it comes to trust magnates, but when it comes to
discussing the remedies he is so weak and ineffectual as to disappoint the reformers. The two speeches show that the President is Hamiltonian in his views of the respective spheres o and that Taft is not much of a reform er. He does not go quite só far as the president. Where he favors tarif reform he qualifes it by postponing it. (1) "No threats of punishment of big of tudens can don to deprive the states of thel
power to regulate the railiroads and nower to regulate the railroads and
other corporations doing business whth the state. The centralization wh power means the doom of the State's strength in checking the evi arising from corporate greed. The present laws affecting rallroads are not
effeetive. Taft says nothing regarding the reduction of rates. He regards the present laws effective, excepting so tar as reducing the watering of stocks raft is not strong on elther the trus question or the tariff question. His remedies on the tariff are such as to give little hope to tarif reformers and his discussion of the trust question shows he has no well defned policy in mind."
Mr. Bryan, in commenting on President Roosevelt's speech, sald today: "The president has at last disclosed his scheme for centralization, a which he has hinted in former speech es. In his Provincetown address he proposed the National incorporation of
rallfoads and other corporations enrayroads and other corporatiops en
gaged in interstate is the secret; it is ours at last. The States are annoying the corporations and the corporations demand Federal protection from State legislation. The president thinks that action is most pressing as regards these corporations,
which, because they are common carriers, exereise a quasi-public function. "The States have been enacting 2 cent laws and reductng freight rates, and the raliroad managers demand that they shall be rellieved from further fear of much legislation. The pres Ident's Hamiltonian idea makes him an easy vietim and he yields to the/entreaties of the ralliroad.
"If it was the public he sought to remedies which wind with State remedies; but it is the rallroad, not the public. that demands the removal of authority to Washington. "The democrats can be depended upon to oppose with all their might chis movement toward centralization. ## IS ALMOST REABY

FOR PERILOUS DASB
Chleago, Aug. 25.-Under date of August 2 Walter Wellman writes io the Record-Herald trom spitzenberg, describing the tatation of the balloon of his alirshtp. In part, the explorer says:
Hy tomorrow moruing the ballown, or jas reservolr of the America should be giled with hydrogen. At once the work of attaching the steel car and adjusting the riteel cable suaspenstion whech holds it to the balloon will be gin.
"Making the Americe ready for her voyage ts a hatge task, She ts a bre craft. Manutacture of the gas begai last Monday. It wis continued day and night. SIX men work' the day bift and the same number the night, under direction of Hervieu, our gas engineer, and the day shift under Major Heraey. Every day they have had to handle about ten tons of sulphurie acid, elght tons of ipon shavings and scrap, pump forty tons of water, besides other chemicals for drying and puritying the gas. And this goes on or nearly slix days in order to produce the $280 ; 000$ cuble feet of hydrogen which the America holds.

Water Piped 750 Foet.
The gas is thoroughly puritied with water, plped 750 feet from a melting Elacler, trenh water being better for his purpose, and also for mixing with the sulphurie acld, than the sea water. he ice water runs Crougn wooden pipling to the gas apparas, and hen boisted to the lanks by a steam pump. Before it leaves the producing apparatus on its way to the balloon the hydrogen is thoroughly washed cooled by being forced to ascend hrough cascades of hundreds of atreams of talling water. It is dried by belng forced through a cyllinder alled with coke, and the actd (witich might damage the envelope of the balof the gas through another vertical cyllider filled with caustic soda.
"Finally it is tested for its temperaure by a thermometer; for its humidny by a hygrometer; for its aciatly by a chilling test tube.

Cas is Periumed.
"At the very last it is perfumeth by belng apssed over sponges filled with muronlne, which has a powerful but a precuution: Nearly pure hydrogen wehl nigh odoriess. If such gas were to escape tinto our car and conme in contact with the motors,' a fatal ex. plosion might ensue.
"While the gns was pouring into the balloon night and day through a plpe ot varnished cloth 400 feet in length all parts of the preparation were puabed as rapilily as possible. Chiet Englneer Vaniman ufted the steel car with block and tackle and attached it to the olg weighing machine, which weighs up to 5,000 kllograms- 17,000 pounds,
