CHECKS WEEVIL AND PLANT.
Prof. W. D. Hunter of Government
Forces Diseusses Cotton Crop Prospecta in Texas.
"Throughout Texals there has been inusually drye weather, which has re sulted in checking not only the bol weevils, but the cotton plant as well. Prof. W. D. Hunter, in charge of the
boll weevil investigation df the Bureau of Entomology, sald yesterday, speak ing with regard to Texas cotton crop prospects, as shown $L$ by the report which he is recelving from entomolo gists who participated in the recent xamination of Texas, Oklahoma and Territory cotton fields.
${ }^{2}$ Early in the season the indications were and statements of the condition that then existed was made from this office that, because of the unusually fa. vorable winter which the (weevils had
enjoyed, the damage to the cotion crop by reason of the weevils would be very severe. It was predicted that only one condluton could check the probable boll weevil ravages-the prev-
dence of dry weather. The dry weathor has come, the boll weevils have
been checked, but unfortunately in oome localities the drouth has been so evere that cotton has been seriously

There exists in Texas what might designated as a 'spotted' situation. In some ocalitied the weevils have ineen knled, whille the cotton plant has not been damaged. Elsewhere the cotton plant has been hurt, elther by the weevils or by dry wefither or by
both. Between here and Paris, at Wolte city, there is a large regio where the boll weevil damage scarcely visitbe, while about Hugo, T., the damage is heavy and over 90 vier cent of the squares on the plant are infested.
"In general it is true that the farmers have made the utmost of the situ
ation in which they have found them. jelves this year. They began the year with grass and weeds in the fields. They, began with a late spring and nade the best of a bad situation $r e$ planting from time to time. The additonal labor used this year in crop production will add' considerable to the cost that the farmer has to bear. I Robertson county, for instance, the cost of production of a pound of cot ton will this year be double the usual cost. It is a rather pessimistre idea, but the price of cotton, deemed by some to be high, is not ${ }^{\circ}$ commensurate with the increased cost of its produc Ion."-Dallas News:

Astin, Tex., Aug. 27.-Colonel R. Milner, commissioner of agriculture has returned from his visitt to hils old home in Rusk county. In estimating the cotton crop this year, he think approximately the same amoun will be recelved by the farmers for their cotton as was received last year notwithstanding that there were ove $4,090,000$ bales last year ahd that there whll be only $3,000,000$ this year; he thtnks the farmers will get $\$ 225,000$ ., the same as last year. Some inink that the crop won't reach 3,000 , 00 bales, but Colonel Milner says that hey have not taken into consideration the increase in acreage, and that he helfeves the crop will produce that number of bales.
He also thinks that the fruit or chards of East Texas have recelved a greater loss than is generally believed of course, there will be practically no fruit this year, and he thinks that the greater amount of trees have been klil ed outright and will not bear again. due to the fact that they have not been properiy cuitivated. NEW SANITATRY LAK FOR PUBLLC SCHOOLS

Prof. E. O. MeNewl superintendent of the clty schools, has received copies of the new law recently passed by the legislature relative to the sanitation of pubife school buildings, also a ctreuler letter from Dr. W. M. Brumby, state health officer, requesting the ald of all school officers in the enforcement of the law. He states that it is to the cultured and educated element of the State that he looks for ald, and asks that every effort be made to assist in not only enforcing the law, but also th making sanitation a matter of dally routine to the children, in fact a part of their trafning and education.
The new law contains many inter esting and instructive features, among them belng: Every teacher, trustee, officer or other person in charge p the schools, elther separately or jotnt ly, is held responsible for the enforce ment of the regulations; every school house, whether public, private or pa rochial, must be well ventliated and lighted, the quantity of fresh aif must be set at 3,000 cuble feet per hour; be set at 3,000 cuble feet per hour; cumulation allowed or any no ac into wells, te; atter puple lenve anch lay the for mut day the fioor must be swept after saw dut 40 wih a $21 /$ der cont so lution of 40 per cent formaldehyde hai been sprinkied over the surface; ail lesks, wainscoting, window sills and baseboards must be wiped off dally and under no circumstances must feather duster be used for this pur pose; closets must be cleaned and dis infected at lest once a week; pupils are requested to bring their own drink ing cups where possible, and coolers must be scoured dally; sufficient gar bage cans must be provided to be emp tied dally; no teacher or Janttor having tuberculosis to be employed; all caser of pupils having contagious disease must be reported at once.
