Union hat returned to Houston after a tour o the central and soythwestern cotton belt, and discussing crdp conditiond with a Record reporter faday stated that from his viewpotat it looked al though there would be lese than onehalf of lest year's crop in Texas, on less than $2,000,000$ bales.
"There are a few scattering placen In the State where the crop is as good as last year," he sald, "but in othe places, land for that matter, in moss olaces, cotton conditions are deplor able. They are worse than I had apy idea they were. I have been throust the central portion of the suate aif through the southwestern portion an the southern portion. Out in th Brownwood and Coleman sections cor ditionsare very bad. It requires abou eight to ten acres to the brle and down in the San Angelo country condition are worse. If there whi te as much an half that was produced last year, o nct know where it is to come from: The farmers for the most part, stal Mr. Calvin, are atoring their cotton notwithstanaing that the price is 131 ents in the interior or 14 cents Houston. He telleves that it wilt but wise for the faimers to hold it tin cents, feeling sure that the price will cents, feeling sare that the price will reach that figure and teyond. The press Company, of which Mr. Catvin it the manager, is receiving some cotion already, which is being stored and certain percentage of its value loane on it. The company has not renewe its lease on the lnman press and ware house, but has secured storing room and the Cleveland press.

## Farmers Want Big Prices for F <br> stuff.

The farmers of Trexas are putting lectded crimp in the propect for feed ing cattle this fall and winter at the watious oll mills of the State, by hav-
ing already served notice on the mill ing already served notice on the mil men and the public generally that the will not accept less than $\$ 16$ her ton for thetr cotton seed. Leading mill men have expressed the belief that seed may go to $\$ 18$ per ton and even higher.
The shortness of the cotton crop is going to exert a wonderful influence in backing up the demand of the farm. ers for higher prices for seed, and it Is possible that if the situation has been fully understood at the time the demand was formulated the figures would have bieen placed even higher, The alacrity with which the mill men have accepted the $\$ 16$ figure and are showing a disposition to go it even $\$ 2$ better; serves to show the effect the short crop is having on the situation. Some of the leading teeders of the State are showing a disposition to approach the situation very carefally. in ordinary times and seasons they are quick to make their plans and shape up thetr contracts, but there is too great an element of uncertalnty in the existing situation for men to rush in and undertake to feed and finish a big bunch of steers on such an uncertainty. Recent developments. Indicate feeding operations in the state would
have been limitted this fall and winter even if the high price of feed stuff was not such a certainty.
The class of cattle used for feedern
in Texas is both scarce and hilbi in
the range country found it was a dip cult matter to find the class o? gtu hey were looking for, and when wals found prices were so high as to was practically prohbitive. Men đo no cel disposed to risk much in feeding when the cost of getting starte mounts to so much.
Bearing all these facts in mind, nay be safely stated that the number cattle fed in Texas this fall and
winter will be considerably below the normal, but the indications are those who do feed will reap a yery satisfo ory proft on thetr Igns of the times all seem to higher beef.-Weatherford Herald.
