The first bale of Wichita county cotton was brought into the Wichita Falls market this morning by J. H. Jones, Commissioner Charles P. Neill read: who lives about three miles southwest of the city on the old Coffield farm. load weighed 1460 pounds, field weight.

The cotton was purchased by Trevathan & Bland, at \$4.60 per hundred, the purchasers getting the seed.

In addition to the purchase money Mr. Jones will receive a cash bonus of about \$35.00 as a prize for the first bale of Wichita county cotton brought into the Wichita Falls market.

Shortly after the arrival of Mr. Jones' load, W. L. Bumgardner, who lives two miles northeast of town, arrived with the second load. This was also purchased by Trevathan & Blands at \$4.60 per hundred/

### CROP OUTLOOK BLUE

CALVIN PREDICTS A HALF COT-TON YIELD IN TEXAS.

### **FARMERS**

In Spite of the Price Now Offered They are Storing Crop as Fast as Gathered.

Houston, Tex., Sept. 6.-Ex-Prest dent Calvin of the Farmers' Union, has returned to Houston after a tour of the central and southwestern cotton belt, and discussing crep conditions with a Record reporter teday stated that from his viewpoint it looked as though there would be less than onehalf of last year's crop in Texas, or less than 2,000,000 bales. -

"There are a few scattering places n the State where the crop is as good as last year," he said, "but in other places, and for that matter, in most places, cotton conditions are deplorable. They are worse than I had any dea they were. I have been through the central portion of the State and through the southwestern portion and the southern portion. Out in the Brownwood and Coleman sections conditions are very bad. It requires about eight to ten acres to the bale and down in the San Angelo country conditions are worse. If there will be as much as half that was produced last year, 1do not know where it is to come from."

The farmers for the most part, statd Mr. Calvin, are storing their cotton notwithstanding that the price is 131/4 cents in the interior or 14 cents in Houston. He telieves that it will be wise for the farmers to hold it for 1 cents, feeling sure that the price will reach that figure and beyond. The Farmers' Union Warehouse and Compress Company, of which Mr. Calvin in the manager, is receiving some cotton already, which is being stored and a certain percentage of its value loaned on it. The company has not renewed its lease on the Inman press and warehouse, but has secured storing room

and the Cleveland press. Mr. Calvin was anxious yesterday to hear what action had been taken by the convention of the National Farmers' union at Little Rock relative to the minimum price of 15 cents. During the meeting of the State Farmers union at Fort Worth recently, a resolution was adopted asking that the national body adopt 15 cents as the minmum price. A couple of days ago a committee was appointed by the national president, the duty of which was to make an investigation and report on what should be the minmum price. ### THE PRICES ARE SOARING

seed Froduces Less Oll Than Average. Farmers Will Receive More For Total Crop Than Last Year.

With prices for cotton seed ranging from \$19 to \$19.50 per ton in the interior, which means \$21.00 to \$21.50 laid down in Houston, coupled with the condition of the seed thmselves, in that they are so dry that they produce on an average of two gallons less oil per ton this year than last, the cotton seed oil men are up against it.

It is stated that every mill in Texas s losing money, while at the same time they are all scrambling for all the seed they can get. They are bidding against each other at a lively rate. They must have the seed in the face of the fact that the more seed they can get hold of the less money they will lose.

These conditions are the result of the condition of cotton seed last year. The storms east of the Mississippi river and up through Arkansas rendered the seed in those districts almost unfit for refining purposes. In fact, about the only prime oil secured last year was from the Texas seed.

Secured Contracts Months Ago.

This condition caused a shortage of oil and months ago the consumers offered big premiums for oil. The Texas oil mill men taking advantage of these offers entered into contracts, the deliveries to be made from this season's crop, and consequently when cotton seed began coming in all the millers were pitted against each other, and bidding has been lively ever since, and he mill men do not see the end yet. It is stated, however, that it is expected that there will be a let-up about the 15th of this month, when the crop tegins coming in at a lively rate.

Last year the prices for seed at this time ranged from \$12 to \$12.50 per ton, and produced from thirty-five to thirtysix gallons of oil to the ton. Though the price for oil this year is much bet ter than last year, the difference, it is stated, will not offset the difference the mills are forced to pay for seed coupled with the falling off in produc-

ing qualities. Estimate of This Year's Production.

A cotton seed oil man informed a Post representative yesterday that he telieved there would be a let-up by the 15th of this month. He stated that in his opinion there will be 3,500,000 bales of cotton produced in Texas this year, less by half a million than last year's crop. There were 2,000,000 tons of seed produced in Texas last year, or about half a ton of seed to each bale of cotton. The same average will hold good this year, it is stated, which means that there will be a production of 1,750,000 tons of seed this year, or a quarter of a million tons less than last year. The production of oil last year was about 70,000,000 gallons, while the production this year from a crop of 3,500,000 bales, if the estimate of the crop is not excessive, will be about 57,-750,000 gallons of oil.

Farmers are in Clover.

While the mill men are up against it, and are, according to the statements of some of them, losing money this year, the farmers are in clover. In fact, the farmers will receive much more money on their short crop this year than they received fast year on their heavy crop. Last year the farmers received more than \$24,000,000 for their seed, while this year, if present conditions maintain throughout the season, should the crop in reality be 3,500,000 bales, they will receive something over \$33,250,000



The law as regards the bakeries is as follows: All rooms in bakeries must be screened with not coarser than 14 mesh wire gauze.

Dogs, cats or other domestic animals are not allowed to enter the bakeries under any circumstances. Persons employed in bakeries must at all times when at work keep their hands and arms washed clean in fresh water.

Flour must be kept in dry places and free from contamination. Only fresh water must be used in preparaticn of bread.

#### A Sizzling Campaign.

The gubernatorial campaign in Oklahoma has turned into one of personal abuse. C. N. Haskell, the Democratic candidate, charges Governor Franz, his Republican opponent, with employing infamous character assassins to circulate false and malicious charges gainst his personal character.

The following extract is taken from a recent speech delivered by Mr. Haskell and the tenor of his statements indicate that there are some hot doings in the Oklahoma campaign:

"The hired character assassins," said Mr. Haskell, "employed by Franz to make vicious attacks upon my character have published statements alleging that I have been drunk in at least seven different places in the last week. You may select a committee of any three ministers and if they can find a single instance in my life when I was intoxicated, I will withdraw from this race.

"Since Franz has invited a comparison of reputations I will meet the matter squarely. Less than a year ago, when Vice President Fairbanks was coming to the territory, Franz and five or six Guthrie citizens went to Arkansas City to meet him. Unfortunately, they were compelled to wait a short time and it took just that short time for Franz to get dead drunk, so that he forgot all about the special and it pulled out of Arkansas City, leaving the Oklahoma executive behind.

"His absence was not noticed for some time and the special had to wait at Ponca City until it was overtaken by a regular train with Franz aboard. After he joined the party his condition was so maudlin and his conversation so obscene in the dining room that the vice president was forced to leave the table before he had finished his meal in order to avoid hearing.

"When the train reached Oklahoma City, two of his friends forced Franz from the train and prevented him from proceeding with the party."




