ACT REGULATING LENGTH OF TRAIN CREW SERVICE.

Texas Measure Differs From Federal Statute, Which Requires That Men Must Be Employed No Longer Than Sixteen Hours.

Beginning at midnight last night it became unlawful for any railroad to knowingly permit any conductor, engineer, fireman, brakeman, train dispatcher or telegraph operator to work longer than fourteen hours until he

has had at least eight hours off duty. The act was passed at the regular session, but at the special session it was amended so as to make it effective ninety days after July 12, when other laws went into effect.



Interesting Incidents in Life of the Famous Indian Statesman Recalled By His Visit.

Quanah Parker, one of the most celebrated Indians of modern times, is the guest of our city this week.

This Comanche chief has always aken a great deal of pride in the town named for him, and through the medium of the Tribune-Chief has kept himself well informed as to its doings.

Quanah looks well, and does not talk so much about geting old and dying as he did last year. When we first met him Monday he was dyked out in the white man's garb, and sported a diamond breastpin in his tie that would have aroused the envy of the least jealous woman in town.

The old Indian was in high spirits; evidently the companionship of his old friend, Yellow Bear, known among the pale faces as J. L. Elbert, Esq., the pioneer real estate man, was grateful to, him, and they were well nigh in-

Quanah had many thrilling escapes in the early days in the settlement of this country, beginning with the battle a few miles south of here when Nocona, his father, was killed by Gov. Ross, and his mother, Cynthia Ann Parker, captured. His numerous escapades on the plains would fill volumes, still he never came nearer to death's door than one night at the old Pickwick hotel at Fort Worth in the late eighties.

Quanah and another Indian chief had gone to bed in the same room, after carefully blowing out the gas. The fumes during the night killed Quanah's companion but the old chief remained in the land of the living though it took every doctor in Fort Worth the next day to keep him there. The Washington authorities at the time were much distressed, for if Quanah had died, it would have been imposible to have kept the Comanches from believing that he had met with foul play, and they probably would have gone on the war path.

Quanah is a great admirer of President Roosevelt, W. Q. Richards and Burke Burnett, whom he holds among the greatest men of this age.
