ELECTIONS WILL BE HELD TUES DAY-SIX GOVERNORS TO BE chosen.
MANY TICKETS IN FIELD
Mississippi Has Only One, The Dem ocratic-Noel For Governor. By Assoctated Press. ections in twelve States will be elections in twelve States one week
from tomorrow. In Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, Mississippt, and Kentucky a governor and other State officials are to be chosen; in New Jersey, a governor only; in New York, two asosclate Justices of the
Court of Appeals; in Pennsylvania, a State treasurer, and In Nebraska, a State treasurer, and in Nebrask, a
rallroad commisisoner and two regents of the State university. In Ohio, Utah and California municipal officers are to be selected, while in New York county a number of Judges and a sherir are to voted for.
The prohibitionists have a State ucket in all the States except Mary-
land and Mississippl, and clty tickets in Cleveland and Cincinnaty, but not in San Francisco or Salt Lake.
The Soclalists also have tickets in all the States except Mississippt and Maryland, and clty tickets in Cincinnati, Cleveland and Salt Lake, but not San Francisco.
The socialist labor party has tickets In Kentucky, Massachusetts and New
Jersey, while unlon labor made nominations for city officers in San. Fran-
cisco.
There is only one ticket-the demo-cratic-in Mississippl, and the result, of course, is not doubtful.
Ten Tickets in Massachusetts, ets, five belng divided among demo ets, five being divided among demo
crats, who are engaged in a factional fight with the State delegation to the National democratic convention next year in prospective. The ballot law commission decided that Henry M. Whitney was the nominee for governor. In Nebraska the democrats and populists fused on the officiale Ior throughout the state.
In Maryland there will contest between the democrats and the repubtlcans, only the two parties havIng made nominations for Staté offi cers. In addition to these, a house o delegates and one-hair of the State senature will choose two United State
islatur islature will choose two. United State
senators-one to fill the unexplre term of the late Arthur P. Gorman and the other to take the place of Senator
Rayner. The republicans adhere to the old plan of senatorial election, bu the democrats are to put into effect a new senatorial primary plan, which
requires every member of the lature to vote for the candldates re celving the highest vote in the district. The senatorial primaries, so far at least, as the democrats are concern ed, will hereafter be a part of the regular elections in Maryland. Three as plrants for the long term will be voted for November 5th, the candidate fo
the short term having no opposition.
