Upon receipt of notices from the banks in St. Louis, Kansas City, Fort Worth and Dallas, that no shipments of money would be made to outside points, the bankers of Wichita Falls this morning decided, after a conference, that for their own protection and for the protection of their depositors and the business interests of the city, that until the banks in the larger cities resumed the shipments of currency to the smaller banks, they would allow the withdrawal of only \$50 in one day by any single depositor. ELECTIONS WILL BE HELD TUES-DAY-SIX GOVERNORS TO BE

Mississippi Has Only One, The Democratic-Noel For Governor.

By Associated Press. New York, Oct. 30 .- There will be elections in twelve States one week from tomorrow. In Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, Mississippi, and Kentucky a governor and other State officials are to be chosen; in New Jersey, a governor only; in New York, two asosciate justices of the Court of Appeals; in Pennsylvania, a State treasurer, and in Nebraska, a railroad commisisoner and two regents of the State university. In Ohio, Utah and California municipal officers are to be selected, while in New York county a number of judges and a sheriff are to voted for.

The prohibitionists have a State ticket in all the States except Maryland and Mississippi, and city tickets in Cleveland and Cincinnati, but not in San Francisco or Salt Lake.

The Socialists also have tickets in all the States except Mississippi and Maryland, and city tickets in Cincinnati, Cleveland and Salt Lake, but not in San Francisco.

The socialist labor party has tickets in Kentucky, Massachusetts and New Jersey, while union labor made nominations for city officers in San Fran-

There is only one ticket-the democratic-in Mississippi, and the result, of course, is not doubtful.

Ten Tickets in Massachusetts.

In Massachusetts there are ten tickets, five being divided among democrats, who are engaged in a factional fight with the State delegation to the National · democratic convention next year in prospective. The ballot law commission decided that Henry M. Whitney was the nominee for gover-

In Nebraska the democrats and populists fused on the officials to be voted for throughout the State.

In Maryland there will be a straight contest between the democrats and the republicans, only the two parties having made nominations for State officers. In addition to these, a house of delegates and one-half of the State senate are to be elected. The next legislature will choose two United States senators—one to fill the unexpired term of the late Arthur P. Gorman and the other to take the place of Senator Rayner. The republicans adhere to the old plan of senatorial election, but the democrats are to put into effect a new senatorial primary plan, which requires every member of the legislature to vote for the candidates recelving the highest vote in the district. The senatorial primaries, so far, at least, as the democrats are concerned, will hereafter be a part of the regular elections in Maryland. Three aspirants for the long term will be voted for November 5th, the candidate for the short term having no opposition.

City Elections Hold Interest.

New York county, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Salt Lake and San Francisco are of particular interest this year.

In New York county the republicans and the Independence League (Hearst) forces have fused on the county ticket, which is made up of a number of court justices and a sheriff. This gives an unusual interest to the contest, although the republicans named the gue the others.

Will Erect Monument.

A monument is to be erected at Holden's Creek, Va., to the memory of Francis Makemie, who founded Presbyterianism in the United States in 1706. and was first moderator of the Historical Society of Philadelphia, will raise the memorial. Makemie was a native of County Donegal, Ireland, educated at Glasgow University, Scotland, and came as an ordained evangelist to the American Colonies in 1683. He labored in his calling for a quarter of a century in Maryland, Virginia, the Barbadoes and elsewhere, and suffered in New York under the British Governor, because of his sectarian preaching. He died in 1708, and was buried in the plot of land now obtained by the Presbyterian Historical Society.

THE MONEY SITUATION.

Causes of the Present Financial Condition Discussed By the Baltimore American.

In discussing conditions which prevailed in the financial and industrial world several weeks ago, before the present stringency in the land developed to such an acute stage, the Baltimore American set forth some pertinent facts in the following article:

"The money situation is peculiar. Business houses are still receiving reasonable accommodations from the banks-sufficient, at least, for the maintenance of their normal volume of non-speculative needs-but the big corporations, wanting money in five and ten million dollar lots, have been disappointed, and it is natural that the recesion should first show itself in an abandonment of contemplated railroad enlargements.

Several of the great systems have stopped work on extensions and improvements which were either planned or undertaken when the money market was in a more responsive mood. The Pennsylvania is understood to have deferred to more favorable times various improvements on its line between Philadelphia and Pittsburg which would have called for several millions of dollars. The reduction of a troublesome grade in Ohio, on which it is proposed to expend not far from \$1,000,000 is for the present postponed.

The Southern Railway has decided for the present to stop double tracking, much as that addition to its facilities is needed in answer to the business expansion of the section it serves. Briefly, only such improvements as are necessary will be carried out; those that would be merely convenient will not be undertaken until it is easier to raise the money.



DIET AND SLEEP.

Eating Before Retiring and Digestion During Slumber.

Diet has little influence on sleep except in so far as it may produce disturbances of digestion and through these of the general balance of health.

The hypnotic effects of certain foods, such as onions, lettuce, milk, etc., are chiefly imaginary. Even the time of the last meal of the day is of relatively little importance except that it is well to let this be at least two or three hours before retiring. But even this rule has many exceptions, as many healthy laboring men habitually fall asleep over their pipes directly after supper, and children after poking the spoon into their little eyes nod off over the tea table, with the bread and butter still clutched in their chubby fists.

The processes of digestion probably go on more slowly during sleep, but they are perfectly carried out, as is illustrated by the almost invariable habit among animals of going to sleep directly after a meal.

Indeed, a moderate amount of food in the stomach or intestines seems to promote slumber. Many night workers. for instance, sleep much better for taking a light or even full supper just be-
