

## THIRTY MILLIONS

**GOLD HAVE BEEN ENGAGED FOR IMPORT TO THE UNITED STATES.**

## LARGE SUM DISTRIBUTED

November Disbursement of Dividends and Interest Exceeds \$75,000,000, Breaking all Records.

New York, Nov. 2.—Engagements for gold to import to the United States, necessitated by the recent period of money stringency in this country is approaching the \$30,000,000 mark. The announcement was made today that the National City Bank has engaged a total of \$1,000,000 United States gold, now coined in Havana, for import; that N. W. Harris & Co. of Boston have engaged \$100,000 in gold and Geo. H. McFadden & Bro. of Boston have \$500,000 in gold en route to the United States from Europe on the steamer Lusitania. These sums bring the total engagements up to this time to \$28,150,000.

## Largest November Disbursement in History.

New York, Nov. 2.—The banks and trust companies distributed \$75,000,000 yesterday, representing stock dividends and interest on bonds. This was the largest distribution of its kind in any November in the history of the country. Of the \$75,000,000 distributed \$45,000,000 represented interest on bonds and \$30,000,000 dividends declared by industrial steam railroad and street railway companies.

## Immense Sums for San Francisco.

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 2.—The United States government came to the assistance of the San Francisco banks yesterday, announcing through telegrams that it had taken steps to expedite the shipment of coin to the Pacific coast. A vast sum, said to be in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000, will be transferred by the government for use in the San Francisco savings banks. The government will coin \$343,000,000 in San Francisco.

Withdrawal Limit is \$30 Per Week.  
At Abilene the clearing house association has limited withdrawals of cash from the bank to \$10 per day and not more than \$30 per week.

## INAUGURAL CEREMONY

At Guthrie on November 16th Will Be Brilliant Affair.

Guthrie, Ok., Nov. 2.—Plans for the inaugural ceremonies, which will take place Nov. 16th, the day the President has promised to proclaim Oklahoma a state, have been completed. The ceremonies will begin at 11 a. m. with the reading of the statehood proclamation and the administration of oath to the new governor. The proclamation will probably be read by Charles H. Filsan, secretary of Oklahoma Territory. The oath will be given by some person yet to be named. The local committee hopes to secure the presence of Associate Justice Brewer of the United States Supreme Court, who, it is understood, will be in this section of the country about the inaugural period. If not this, the oath will be administered by a local functionary. It is hoped to have Governor Frank Frantz, the last of the territorial executives, present to deliver the retiring address.

The opening ceremonies will occur in front of the Carnegie library, the scene of former inaugurations, from where Governor Haskell will deliver the main address, consuming not more than forty minutes time. Following this a parade will form and move to one of the public parks, where a big beef barbecue will follow, and where the new governor will again speak. At the barbecue, which is regarded as a new and unique function in inaugurations, the committee proposes to bring the occasion up to time, and have a ceremony similar to a marriage, celebrating the eternal union of the two territories, and attended by

an appropriate benediction. Congressman-elect Bird Maguire will, if possible, represent Oklahoma, and some one from the Indian territory that half of the State.

At night Guthrie will give a grand ball in honor of the new governor. The governor's inaugural will also serve in the cases of all other State officers.

## TWO NEGROES LYNCHED AT VINEGAR BEND, ALA.

Mobile, Ala., Nov. 2.—Abe Sumroll and Hank Lucas, two negroes, were lynched some time this morning at Vinegar Bend, Alabama, near here. Sumroll murdered Julian Boaz, a young Cuban, Monday night while the latter was trying to arrest him for larceny.

Lucas' crime was the protecting of Sumroll from the officers of the law and a posse of citizens.

The bodies were found hanging to telegraph poles in north part of town by early risers.

## MISSIONARIES WERE STONED BY ANTI-FOREIGN CHINESE.

Hong Kong, Nov. 2.—The Scandinavian mission in the district of Namho has been attacked by the anti-foreign element of the population. The missionaries, the Misses Wendall and Ericson, were stoned by the Chinese, who alleged that native women were forced to become Christians and were then kept for immoral purposes. The Magistrate at Namho has succeeded in restoring order.

## STORE BURGLARIZED

ROBBERS SECURED CASH AND REVOLVERS AT KERR & HURSH'S LAST NIGHT.

## BROKE THROUGH WINDOW

Robbery Believed to Have Been Committed Between Midnight and Daybreak—Rewards Offered.

Sometime between midnight and daybreak this morning a robber or robbers visited Kerr & Hursh's hardware store on Ohio avenue and got away with about \$2 in cash, several revolvers and possibly other articles.

The entrance into the store was made by breaking the glass in a window at the side of the south front door.

When the store was closed last night \$2.00 in small change was left in the cash drawer. This was missing this morning, as was also a .38 Colt's six-shooter on a .45 frame, numbered 288, 191, and two Ivers-Johnson pistols. A number of pocket knives were stolen and other shelf hardware, the exact description of which is unknown.

The discovery of the robbery was made by the negro porter upon opening the store this morning.

Shortly after midnight the night watchman found everything in good order about the premises.

Two suspicious characters were seen about the premises during the day and are suspected of the robbery.

A reward of \$50.00 has been offered for the arrest of the guilty parties.

## THE TELEGRAPH STRIKE IS OFF IN NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, La., Nov. 2.—Following the meeting of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union here, in which it was voted to permit all operators to go back to work who so desired, the officials of the Union today announced that so far as New Orleans was concerned, the telegraph strike is a thing of the past. During the past twenty-four hours about fifty applications have been made to the two telegraph companies, and but about half of this number have been reinstated.

## BISHOP'S MEETING

BIENNIAL MEETING OF BOARD OF BISHOPS OF METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

## IN SESSION AT SPOKANE

Bishops From All Parts of the Civilized World in Attendance.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 2.—The biennial meeting of the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church was opened here yesterday with twelve Bishops present from all parts of the civilized world. Eight or more bishops will come today. The bishops were entertained at a banquet in the new First Church last night.

## The Fear of Publicity.

"I am here to receive sentence at your hands and not to be humiliated by a lecture which the newspapers can repeat and print."

These words, used in the remarkable interruption of Mayor Schmitz of San Francisco, while standing up for sentence before Judge Dunne, point to a moral if they do not tell a tale.

The particular sore spot that made Schmitz flinch was the publicity of his punishment.

More than the penitentiary sentence he felt the humiliation that was coming to him through the newspapers.

If only he could be condemned in a corner and quietly put behind the prison doors—that he could bear with equanimity.

But to be pilloried in the press, to have his crime characterized in public with the reporters at their tables taking it all down ready to blazen his infamy to every quarter of the globe—that was the refinement of cruelty to this public man.

The moral of it, then?

The deterrent power of publicity. More than all else the average man dreads the punishment that comes with publication. He instinctively draws back from standing in the full focus of the newspaper limelight.

And that dread keeps many a one from wrong-doing.

The newspapers do not always live up to their ideals, but every day they render a great service by standing as a mirror to reflect the doings, good and bad, of all the people.

Schmitz did not care for the Judge's lecture. He cared only because it was a "lecture which the newspapers can repeat and print."—Fort Worth Telegram.

## ENGLISH RAILWAY SERVANTS' STRIKE IS POSTPONED.

## DINNER TO BRYAN

PROMOTERS OF FEAST PLAN TO MAKE THE OCCASION A NATIONAL AFFAIR.

## IS URGED TO ANNOUNCE

Nebraskan Receives Pressing Entreaties to Make Known His Attitude.

A Washington special to the Dallas News under date of Nov. 1st, says:

It is intended by local promoters to make the \$3 Bryan dinner, Nov. 26, at the Raleigh Hotel in this city, a national affair. Willis J. Abbott, chairman of the invitation committee, who is an ardent New England advocate of the Nebraskan, also located in Washington conducting a literary bureau mainly devoted to Col. Bryan's service, said today:

"I have been asked if Mr. Bryan will, at the dinner we give him, make an announcement as to his candidacy. I can only say that I wish and hope he will. When I last saw him at Richmond I asked him to do this. His reply was that he would within the next two or three weeks make his position as clear as he could and after that it would be for the national democratic convention to decide if it wanted him for standard bearer. A letter has just been mailed to Mr. Bryan, urging him to announce himself, as he indicated he might do at an early date, and make known his views at the Washington dinner."

Seats for the dinner were gobbled up quickly today, leaving only a few reserved for prominent men. The promoters of the occasion say their purpose, more than any other, is to bring Bryan and anti-Bryan democrats together and show the latter that there is nothing in their notions that Mr. Bryan will raise issues to which they as democrats would object. They declare that Mr. Bryan is in favor of the simplest, shortest platform possible, which at the same time, will ignore no cardinal democratic principles. It is expected to have former anti-Bryan speakers, John Sharp Williams will possibly be one of them, to join in making the reunion a love feast and a pledging of determination to battle for a Democratic victory next year.

## FIX 16-CENT MINIMUM.

Oklahoma Cotton Growers Hold Secret Meeting—Will Hold Crop.

Guthrie, O. T., Nov. 1.—Cotton growers in all parts of Oklahoma and Indian Territory held secret meetings and discussed the cotton market situation. It was decided to hold the 1907 pick until cotton prices advanced to a certain point.

The cotton growers have a compact organization and each member is sworn to secrecy. It is rumored that the minimum price at which the farmers will sell is fixed at 16 cents.

The action of the cotton growers to hold the crop is considered in a favorable light by financial concerns as indicating that the flurry has not frightened the planters and that they are not in need of ready money. The fact that the banks will not be called on to supply cotton purchase funds will aid in restoring normal conditions. It is estimated that over 10,000 bales of cotton will be held out of the market in Logan county alone.

#### The Man and the Woman.

Five years ago Ed Hammond and Miss Eliza Manning were married in a little town in Arkansas. The husband was a man of good standing in the community, a faithful member of the church, and a successful business man. He prospered, and in his home was every comfort and convenience. Children came to bless the home, and there was not a day for almost five years that there was a shadow over the happiness of the little family gathered around the hearthstone. The woman was a gentle, loving, faithful wife and mother. Life was sweet to all of them, and the future promised continued bliss.

One day Ed Hammond took a journey back to the State where his wife spent her childhood. When he returned home, he came a changed man. A cloud was on his brow, a shadow in his heart. He could not hide from the loving eyes of his wife that something was wrong. She urged him to tell her what it was, but for a time his lips were silent. With a woman's intuition she guessed it.

Years before a shadow had fallen across her own life because her mother had sinned. She guessed her husband had learned the truth, and when she asked him if it were so he said "Yes." Then she told him the miserable story of how her mother had forsaken her when she was a child and had gone away to share an illicit love with a man who had fascinated her.

But why should that make Ed Hammond unhappy? Why should it cloud his brow and turn his happy disposition to a morose one? There was not a breath of evil against his own pure wife. No one spoke of her but in the highest terms. Still, the husband was moody. Day by day he grew more morose, more unkind. He allowed the story he had heard to rankle in his heart, and to poison his mind. His love turned to indifference, and indifference to hate. Finally he asked the courts for a legal separation from his wife. The principal ground set up for his plea was that his wife did not bear a good reputation and that she had deceived him. When the judge heard the evidence in the case, he very promptly and properly refused the man's petition. Not only did he refuse it, but he administered to him a rebuke so severe and so stinging that he will not forget it to his dying day.

No matter the action of the court, though, the happiness of two hearts is gone, and the lives of little children left with a blight upon them, because Ed Hammond was weak, sensitive, cowardly and selfish. He could not bear to think that his wife could be pointed at with the finger of scorn, even for the deeds of another.

This is the man. What think you of him?

Tomorrow John Copper, once a banker in Texas, will be released from the United States prison in Fort Leavenworth, where he has served a sentence for a crime he committed. When he is released the first one to greet him will be his wife. When he was accused of the offense for which he was sent to prison, when he went to jail, when he sat before the bar of justice and former friends forsook him, there was one ever by his side to comfort him, and to inspire him with hope. There was one whose love never faltered, whose devotion never ceased, whose labors in his behalf never flagged. There was one, just one, who stood beside him when all the world condemned; and when shame overcame him, there was one who shared it with him, and defied the world to shake her faith in the man she loved. There was one who went with him to the prison gates, and when they shut her away from him, turned back to take up the burden of her life, to bear the cross of shame to which he had nailed her, to care for his children and await his coming once more.

That one was his wife—a frail, broken, saddened woman.

Through all the months and years that he spent behind prison walls she labored, she watched, she prayed, she longed for his home-coming. Never once did her love fail; never once did her fidelity waver; never for a moment did she dream of forsaking him because he had sinned. And tomorrow when she clasps him once again in her arms she will feel that all of her sufferings have been as naught now that she has gained him again. What is the world's scorn to her? What shame can touch a love like hers?

This is the woman. What think you of her?

And when you look on this man and then on this woman, can you, O my brother, call man strong and woman weak?

Standing in front of the statue of a great statesman, a man notably tidy in his day and a great worry to his valet, I studied the undignified results of a family of sparrows that had set up housekeeping under his elbow and thought how indignant he would be could he catch a glimpse of this unseemly domestic arrangement.—Mrs. John Lane in Fortnightly Review.

### A SEAT IN THE COMMONS.

Going to Parliament a Costly Honor For Englishmen.

Every Englishman who is not fortunate enough to be a peer wants to become an M. P. Every man who has succeeded in business or professional life feels that a coveted seat in the commons is necessary to round out his career. But many men of moderate means are deterred from pampering their ambitions by the big expense entailed. No salaries are paid, and besides supporting himself, an M. P. is called upon to meet heavy drains upon his pocketbook during his entire term.

At the most moderate estimate the expenses of a campaign are \$5,000. Once elected, the member must "nurse" his constituents. Clubs and charities are the greatest beneficiaries of this nursing, but many individuals come in for assistance also. Not less than \$3,000 a year is required for this item, which for a term of five years represents an outlay of \$15,000.

All told, then, a prospective member faces an outlay of \$20,000 in addition to his living expenses, which in London are far from moderate when he maintains himself in keeping with the dignity of his position.

Many of the commoners of course spend far more than the above amount. And, in addition to the cash outlay, some of them find their lives embittered by the worries and exacting of their positions.

### BALLOONING.

With an Experienced Pilot in Charge It is Not Dangerous.

The uninformed are prone to look upon the balloon as a sort of country fair attraction, whose principal interest lies in the risk the aeronaut takes. This is a mistake.

Like the automobile, the balloon requires an experienced pilot, and when such a one is in charge serious or fatal accidents are never recorded. Most balloon clubs require all ascensions to be made under a regularly licensed pilot, who receives his certificate from the club only after having demonstrated his fitness. The pilot who is willing to go up only in favorable weather and to come down at the proper time need never endanger lives. He knows he has only to open the valve and he can descend. He has only to throw out a handful of sand, and he can prevent his balloon from coming down or can send it up. When he is ready to land he picks out a favorable spot ahead of him, lets his balloon come gradually down near the ground, cuts loose the anchor which stops his progress, then opens the valve again if necessary. When the car touches the ground he tears out the ripping strip, and the balloon stretches out on the ground, a flat and empty bag.—F. P. Lahm, U. S. A., in Outing Magazine.

### The Love of Nature.

A Japanese friend of mine lived in Paris for a year. Waking on a winter's morning, he found that snow had fallen in the night. As a matter of course he took his way to the Bois de Boulogne to admire the beauty of the snow upon the trees. What was his astonishment when with his companion, a compatriot, he arrived in the Bois to find it entirely solitary and deserted. The two Japanese paid their vows to beauty in the whiteness and the stillness of the morning and at last beheld in the distance two other figures approaching. They were comforted. "We are not quite alone," they said to themselves. There were at least two other "just men" in that city of the indifferent and the blind. The figures drew nearer. They also were Japanese.—London Saturday Review.

### The City of Roses.

Ispahan, Persia, is known as the "city of roses," but a traveler says that the streets "are only alleys between two high mud walls, without a single window or opening to be seen—merely here and there a low, narrow doorway, always impenetrably closed. The ground is thickly coated with dust, the streets are rarely straight, and never have they got any name. The sense of ruin is everywhere—here a wall is falling down, there a palace is in ruins, a little farther a deserted mosque is skirted. Such is Ispahan, which from having at one time a population of 1,000,000 is now reduced to barely 100,000 inhabitants."

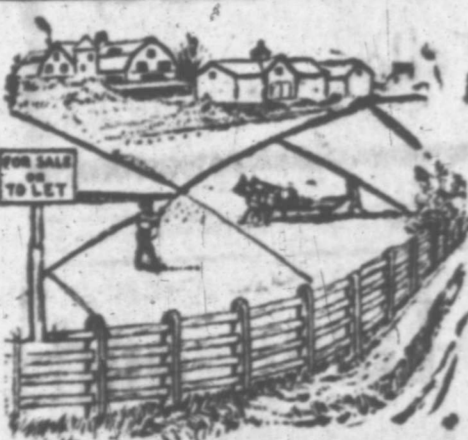

**FT. WORTH PACKERS  
ADVANCE PRICES**

Fort Worth Telegram.  
Thursday Fort Worth packing houses advanced the price of pork loins 1/2 cent and other cuts 1 1/2 cents, according to statements by local retail dealers, and they are expecting a still further advance, not only in pork, but in beef.

There has been a decline of both beef cattle and hogs on the Fort Worth market during the last ten days, hogs being off \$1 per hundred pounds and beef \$1.50 per hundred pounds, according to a statement made by John Daggett, a live stock commission man, who says he can see nothing in the market for cattle and hogs on foot to justify any advance; instead, he says there should be a reduction.

C. C. Cummings, a retail dealer, said to a Telegram reporter that the packing houses advanced the price of pork to him Thursday 1/2 cent per pound.

Omaha, Neb., packing houses announced a reduction of the prices of meat 1 cent a pound on Oct. 28, and at that time a further reduction was expected. Edward S. Cudahy of the Cudahy Company at Omaha expressed the belief that the fall of food-stuffs would begin. The Omaha Bee quotes Mr. Cudahy as follows:

"There has got to be a halt some time. General conditions seem ripe for a lowering of the cost of living, which has become abnormally high within the last year or two. With us it has been simply a question of buying our cattle cheaper and consequently we are able to sell our meat at a lower figure."

John L. Pummell, retail meat dealer, 402 South Jennings avenue: "The packing houses advanced the price of pork loins 1/2 cent Thursday and other cuts as high as 1 1/2 cents. I understand there will be an advance in the price of beef soon, though I can see no reason for any advance in view of the fact that hogs on foot are \$1 per 100 off and beef cattle on foot are off from \$1 to \$1.50 per hundredweight."

William Austin, wholesale butcher: "Hogs and cattle are off in price \$1 and \$1.50 per hundredweight. A beef steer can be bought from \$10 to \$15 cheaper today than the same could have been bought ten days ago, yet the packing houses have made no reduction in the price of beef, as the Cudahy people have at Omaha. They have advanced the price of pork 50c per hundredweight for loins, notwithstanding hogs have declined \$1 per hundredweight. The small wholesale meat dealers have reduced the price of pork 1/2 cent per pound to retail dealers this week."

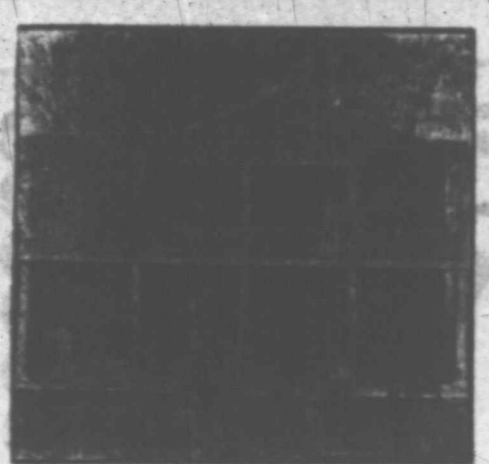

SELECTION OF CONVENTION CITY IS OF MUCH POLITICAL SIGNIFICANCE.

**NEW HOLDS ANOTHER VIEW**

Acting National Chairman of Republicans Overlooks Instances Wherein Nomination Was Influenced.

Special to the Times.  
Washington, D. C. Nov. 2.—The testimony of political history is decidedly against the correctness of a statement recently made by Chairman Harry New of the republican national committee, and from sundry sources the smart young man from Indiana is being reminded of his inaccuracy. To a Washington correspondent the other day Chairman New stated that it is a mistake to attach any political significance to the selection of a convention city. Chairman New is freely quoted as favorable to Kansas City as the convention city next year and the correspondent to whom he minimized the importance of the choice of a place for holding the convention happened to represent a Chicago newspaper. Pretty soon after Chairman New's interview appeared in print, the "old-timers" got busy along the line of reminiscence and what they have dug up is interesting as well as instructive—especially to the gentleman from Indiana.

It is pointed out that the democratic split of 1860, in all probability, would not have occurred had the convention been held in some city less aggressive in its pro-slavery views than Charleston, which was irreconcilably bent on the nomination of Douglass.

Lincoln is said to have profited immensely by reason of the fact that the republican convention was held in Chicago. When the convention assembled Seward had a long lead, but this early advantage was easily overcome because the delegates were doing business in Lincoln's own balliwick. The Seward delegates subsequently openly charged that they lost the convention through these unfavorable surroundings.

The nomination of Hayes in 1876 is said to have been due to the fact that the convention was held in Cincinnati. Hayes neither before nor since that time was considered presidential size. It will be recalled that James G. Blaine was the leading candidate when a dead lock occurred, and it became necessary to look for a compromise man. Hayes, whose reputation was strictly local, was forced to the front by the local convention boomers and his nomination assured.

The effort to nominate Chase in 1868 it is claimed would have succeeded had the convention met in Cincinnati instead of in New York, but as New York was the convention city the nomination went to Seymour.

The followers of William J. Bryan are opposed now to holding the next democratic national convention in the East, because that section has always been unfriendly to the Nebraskan. They prefer a middle West city. The Taft men are likewise urging a Western city for the republican national convention, because it is in the West that Taft sentiment, owing to the popularity of President Roosevelt, is the strongest.

New York city is not favored by the republican managers primarily because of the rising star of Governor Hughes of that State, and Chicago is looked upon rather shyly because of its proximity to Pennsylvania, Indiana and other States in which Taft sentiment is subordinated to the demand for a "favorite son."

Being from Indiana, Mr. New might be expected to be for Fairbanks, but it should be remembered that Secretary George B. Cortelyou of the treasury is still chairman of the republican national committee, and what he says must be respected by the acting chairman.

Behind Cortelyou is Roosevelt—and the latter is apparently is supreme inside of his party.

### HE RETURNED ALONE

DALTON, THE FAMOUS BANDIT, LEAVES HOSPITAL FOR THE PENITENTIARY.

### MAY YET BE PARDONED

Wound in Arm is Not Entirely Healed. Effort to Extend Freedom Proves Abortive.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 1.—Emmett Dalton, former bandit, stepped aboard a Union Pacific train this afternoon to return to the penitentiary at Lansing, alone. This was in accordance with his agreement with Governor Hoch, last July, when the governor granted him a three months' parole to have his wounded arm treated at a Topeka hospital.

The arm has not entirely healed, and it was expected that the parole would be extended. This would probably have been done had the governor been in town, but he left for Washington several days ago, and had not returned late tonight. Efforts have been made to locate the governor for the last forty-eight hours, but all telegrams have been returned with the information that he has left Washington and that his whereabouts are unknown.

Before leaving to resume his imprisonment, Dalton said: "I am going back to Lansing because that is what I agreed to do. My arm is in pretty good shape. I can bend it some, and I think it is getting along well."

#### Home There is Waiting.

"I had, of course, hoped that I would not have to go back, but this was on account of my mother, as much as myself. She has been waiting and planning for me down there at her home in Kingsfisher, and has hoped that I would be there as soon as my parole expired.

"I can say this truthfully, that when I go back to prison I can tell the boys in there that it is up to them to make good when they get out. If a man does what is right when he is out, he will get a square deal.

"The people are not inclined to give a man the worst of it. I know that is true in my own case. I have met a great many people here since getting out on parole, and they have been good to me. Many people have interested themselves in getting a pardon for me. For those who have opposed a pardon, and they are not numerous, I have nothing but the kindest feelings. They think they are doing what is right, and, though they are mistaken, I have no hard feelings toward them."

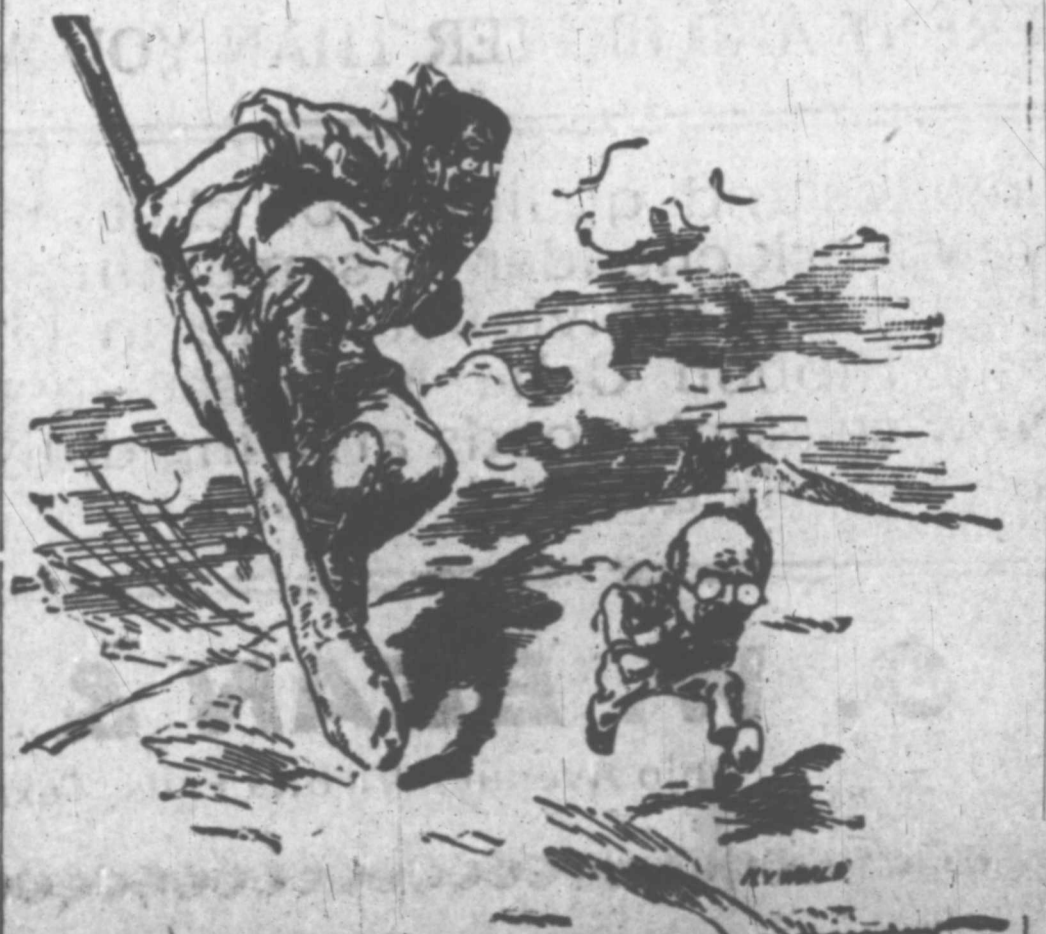
