IT IS HARD TO REALIZE that it has been ten years ago this week since the United States landed the first man on the surface of the moon, winning that portion of the "space race."

We recall the anxious moments on that Sunday afternoon, which led up to the historic moon landing.

Since it was the first time anyone had been to the surface of the moon, there had arisen some doubts about the landing. Would the spacecraft burst through an outer crust, and fall below? There was also the theory that lunar dust might be several feet thick. This led to the fear that the landing module might sink several feet in this dust.

And at the last minute, the landing module, called "Eagle" had its computer become overloaded. Some of the officials at Mission Control in Houston feared the landing might have to be aborted.

But the lander, commanded by Neil Armstrong, with Buzz Aldrin as the number two man, continued, and made history on July 20 when it settled safely on the surface of the moon. "The Eagle has landed," were Armstrong's words of celebration, to a waiting and relieved world some 250,000 miles away.

Shortly afterward, the two Americans became "moon walkers," as Armstrong took the "Giant step for mankind."

Armstrong said in a recent interview that he still recalls the feeling of pride the two men felt, at having achieved their mission, and being a part of the nation which caused it to happen.

The moon landing gave all Americans a sense of pride. This "being on the winning team" was in some respects kin to the feeling of having successfully won a war, and successfully defended the cause of freedom.

Our country had rebounded from being in second place to Russia at the advent of the first Sputnik space satellite in 1957, and had set a goal and then achieved it.

When President Kennedy had announced intentions in the early 1960s of landing a man on the moon before the end of the decade, it had seemed a far-fetched idea by some, but the dream was realized.

Perhaps the main concern in America today is that we rest too much on our laurels, and perhaps slip back into the complacency that allowed our nation to be trailing the Soviets in some respects prior to the beginning of the "moon race."

Our leaders might consider this fact before signing the Salt II agreement, which gives Russia a clear lead in the arms field.

THIS WEEK IS ALSO the tenth anniversary of another, less celebrated incident. It was on July 18, 1969, that Mary Jo Kopechne, a young friend of Senator Ted Kennedy, drowned following a campaign party in Massachusetts.

Kennedy's Oldsmobile plunged off the side of a one-lane, hump-backed bridge on Chappaquiddick Island in the late-night incident. The senator managed to get out of the car, but the body of Miss Kopechne was found in the back seat when the car was recovered the next day.

The Chappaquiddick incident, and Senator Kennedy's failure to report the accident immediately, are sure to be an issue during the impending presidential primary campaign.

Chappaquiddick set back Kennedy's career somewhat during the years immediately following the affair, but some experts say that it might be less of an issue in this campaign, mainly because a good portion of the current voting population is too young to remember the incident. Eighteen-year-old voters, for example, were merely second graders in 1969.

MBPXL Tells Of Improvements

Approximately a year after the kickoff of the fabricating plant at MBPXL, things are going relatively smoothly, and the work at the plant has been enhanced tremendously.

This was the report this week from Scotty Cronin, manager of the fabricating division of Friona's MBPXL. Cronin also announced that the company was launching a drive to improve the appearance, as well as community relations of the Friona plant.

This week, Cronin was heading the installation of nine state flags, which will be flown each day by the plant. The flags represent the plant and office locations for MBPXL. The giant corporation touches six states with its beef production facilities.

The company has a bulletin board which is checked by the employees, and clubs and organizations are urged to use the bulletin board to publicize community events, the MBPXL chief said.

The MBPXL chief pointed out that all plant employees have a personalized identification card, similar to a driver's license, which includes the employee's picture. Anytime a local merchant is asked to cash an MBPXL paycheck, he should ask to see the ID card if there is any reason to be suspicious.

"Every plant employee has an ID card, and the pictures contained on the card will have been taken within the past six or seven months," Cronin said.

Dorothy Blankenship, registered nurse and longtime employee of Parmer County Community Hospital, has been employed by MBPXL as the company's staff nurse. Dorothy has been provided with an office, medical supplies and equipment.

The staff nurse's main duties will be to give physical examinations,

which are required for every employee of the plant. "We sometimes have ten to 15 people taking examinations in a day's time, and this was just more than the local hospital could handle, with their regular load of patients," Cronin said. "We are most happy to have Dorothy in this capacity, and feel that this is a step forward for the company," he added.

MBPXL has also added a hot lunch facility as a part of the new fabricating plant. Since employees have a 30-minute lunch hour, this also has proven to be a good addition.

With the new fabricating plant in full operation, and with two shifts, MBPXL currently employs over 900 people, making the Friona plant the largest employer in the MBPXL chain.

Officers To Transfer

Glenn Fant, a Department of Public Safety trooper in Farwell since September of 1970, has been promoted to the rank of sergeant, and has been transferred to Crosbyton, effective July 15.

Fant will be in charge of DPS troopers in seven counties in his new position. He said he is not sure when or if a replacement will be sent to Farwell. New recruits will graduate from DPS school in October, and a decision will be made at that time.

Richard Gribble, a trooper in the Friona DPS office for the past 15 months, will transfer to Memphis, Texas, after July 21. Royce Keck, the other DPS trooper in Friona, said it would probably be fall before another trooper is assigned to replace Gribble.

Farmers Union To Reorganize Here

Taking action to reactivate and reorganize the Parmer County Farmers Union, the group will hold its first membership meeting Thursday, July 19, at 8 p.m. at the Friona Community Center, according to Roy Donaldson of Oklahoma Lane, planning committee chairman.

A small "grass-roots" group composed of Donaldson, Joe Bradburn of Bovina, Danny Murphree of Friona, and Ricky Bennett of Farwell have been working for well over four months in the initial endeavor to recruit members and structure the county organization under the guidance of Texas Farmers Union staff so that a beneficial and active group might be formed to represent the agricultural families of the area.

Featured speaker for the evening will be Jay I. Naman, President of

Texas Farmers Union and established leader in the National Farmers Union organization. Naman, a farmer from the Waco area, has devoted over fifteen years to guiding Farmers Union and currently serves as chairman of the National Farmers Union Executive Committee.

Intending the meeting to be a "family affair," the general public is invited to join the farming community and Parmer County Farmers Union member families as the reorganizing effort continues.

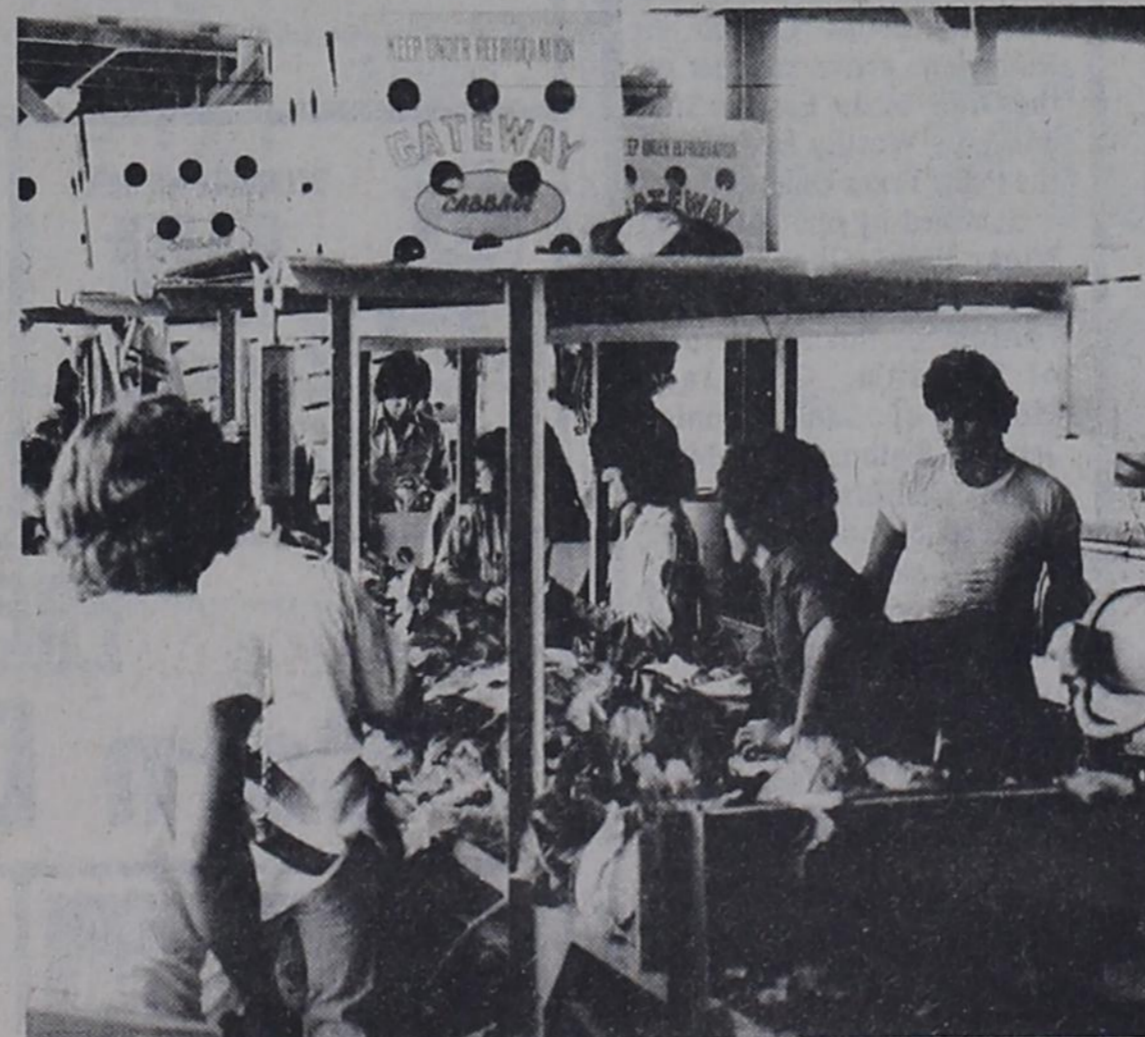
Providing entertainment in the lighter vein for the evening will be Zan Bunch, ventriloquist from Portales. A meal will be provided.

Deadline Extended For Forms

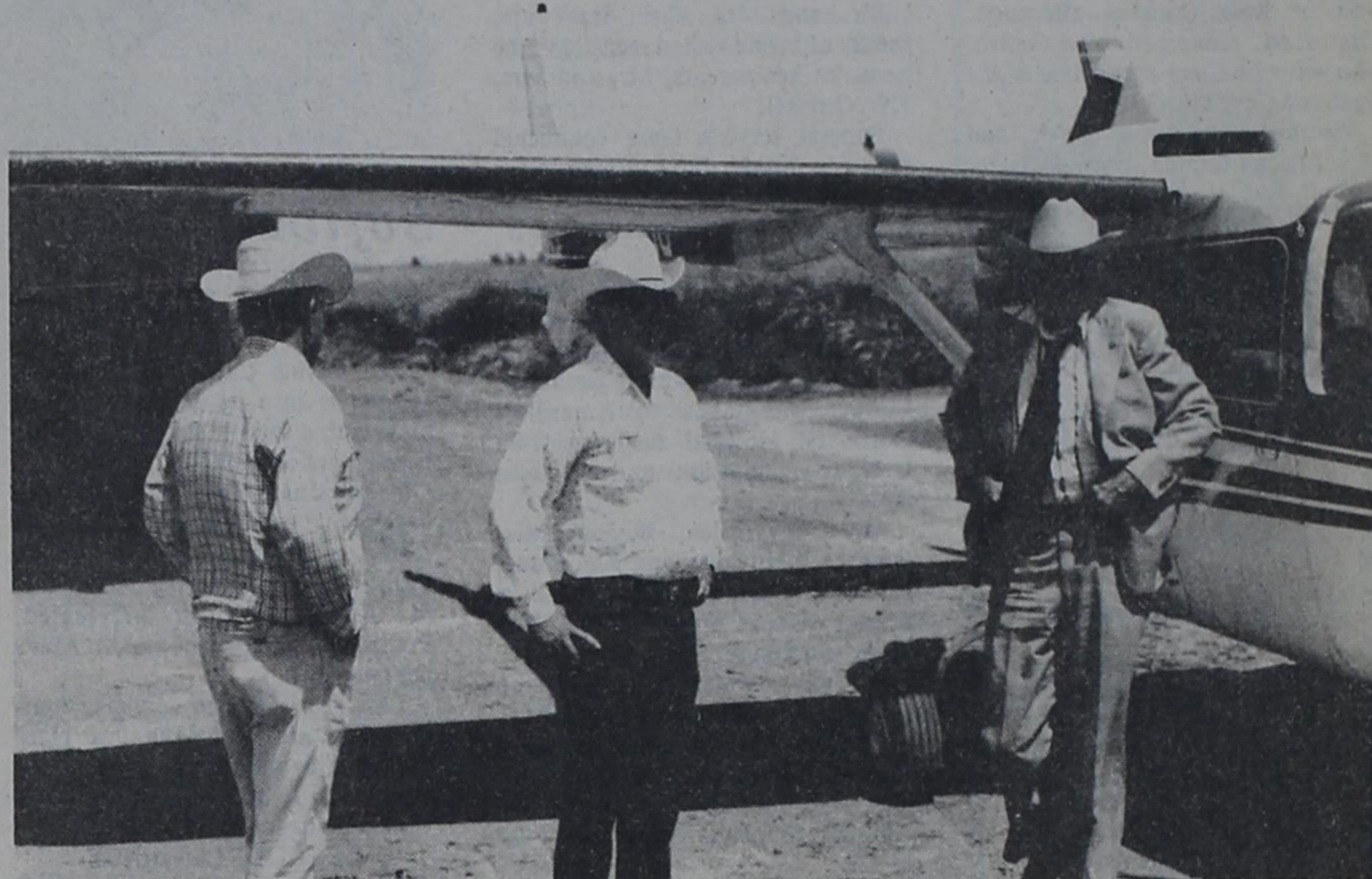
The deadline for applying to the Bovina Independent School District for tax relief on agricultural land has been extended to July 18, it was announced this week. The deadline had been previously stated as July 15.

This date (Wednesday) will also be the last day for taxpayers to apply for a \$5,000 exemption from the market value of their residence homestead, or for persons 65 years of age or older to file for an exemption of \$10,000 on their school taxes.

Application forms for these exemptions are available at the school tax office at Ridgelea School.

AAM BARBECUE

Roming, Green Are Speakers At Function

The chairman of the Texas House of Representatives' agriculture committee, Forrest Green, along with committee member Ralph Roming of Bovina, were featured speakers last Thursday at a barbecue hosted by the Bailey County American Agriculture Movement.

Green lauded the work of the recent Texas legislature, which provided a number of tax breaks and reductions for Texas residents, such as the taxing of farmland on productivity, rather than market value; the \$5,000 homestead exemption for small property owners, and the \$10,000 tax exemption for persons 65 years of age or disabled.

The speaker, who is state representative from Corsicana, also mentioned the production of gasohol, and cited some of the benefits which could be derived from the construction of fuel alcohol plants in Texas.

Green chastized Governor Bill Clements for vetoing a tax break for the use of fuel alcohol, and the availability of low interest loans for construction of gasohol.

"Fuel alcohol could be a renewal of the source of gasoline, and since the Arabs hold a gun to our head, as they keep boosting prices for

imported oil, we could, by utilizing agriculture in this state, produce fuel at a much cheaper cost," Green said.

Roming also spoke to the more than 75 people attending the barbecue at the Bailey County Exhibition and Coliseum.

Roming told the group he had heard a state representative say "The American Agriculture Movement has broken more ice this year than I have seen in my 12 years as a house member."

Roming said, "I will be the first to admit that the American Agriculture Movement has made some minor mistakes, but, at least they were trying to correct the gross injustices that exist in agriculture today. Show me that person who does not make mistakes and I will show you the person who is doing nothing."

He commented, "We have seen our elected officials become as confused as 'Chicken Little,' running around saying 'The sky is falling'. Because on one side he had the farmers saying one thing and on the other he had the farm organizations in direct opposition."

Roming added, "In some instances, we have seen our proposals become a political football for some politicians egotistical, political ambition," also, "It is a pity to realize that we as farmers who represent 3 per cent of the populace in the state, and are that source of the state's largest industry are under the control of a commissioner of agriculture who is elected by the 97 per cent of the consumer populace."

He added, "We have also seen the time when our elected Senate thought it more appropriate to spend precious time in the closing hours of the session discussing the immortal armadillo than discussing very important farm legislation."

"The American Agriculture Movement in its infancy has made some tremendous accomplishments, probably more than some of its people will ever realize, but we must at this time start to mature with age. Just as a babe has to learn to crawl before he walks, so did we," added Roming. "We are at the walking age now, and with maturity comes sophistication. With sophistication comes better directive. We will be better unified and all working for the same goal of 100 per cent parity."

Roming continued "With this maturity, we must accept our responsibility to become active in the

farm and commodity groups, to redirect these organizations into the true farm representatives that they were originally designed to be. By redirecting these farm and commodity groups, we will all speak with a unified voice. With the advantage of all speaking with one voice, our representatives cannot use the division of voice as an excuse for non-action. In many instances it is our fault that these farm and commodity groups have become misguided, lost direction and have lost the true feel of the farmers and ranchers."

He also commented, "We must become more astute of political issues and the candidates who are running. No longer can we afford to elect people from name association only as has been true in the past. On any major election in the past decade, the rural vote would have changed the outcome of the election. The rural vote is one that is not sought after by most of the major candidates. This is the reason that we must be unified in our choice of candidates."

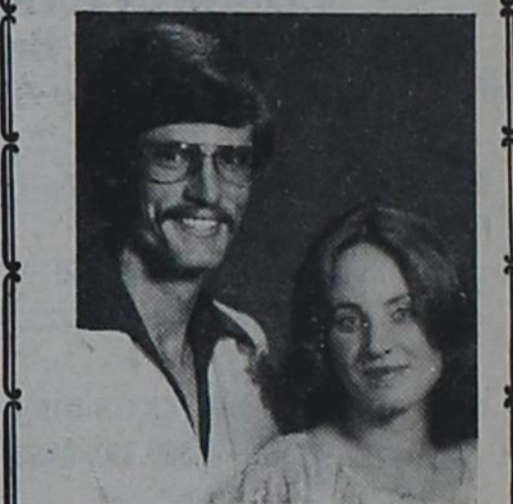

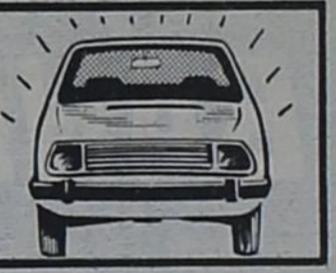
