The Review's editor was at Stanton, Ala., recently. While there a number of citizens recieved copies of a Chicago mail order catalogue. One citizen had purchased a buggy. There was a part of the buggy that had to be sent back. The firm claimed to allow certain premiums, if a certain amount of purchases were made in a given time. This customer rushed his cash to Chicago, but, before it got there, he received a notice that the club or premium scheme had been discontinued. The customer claimed the firm owed him a balance on freight paid out. He wrote several letters and received replies, but the money was shy. He said the buggy was too heavily ironed for a single horse. He said he had acted foolish, but the picture in the catalogue had attracted his attention. that he needed a buggy, and, further, he decided to get in on the premium list. He said if he had gone to a nearby dealer he could have secured a buggy suitable to his wishes, and, after making the purchase, if he had discovered anything wrong, the dealer could easily have been induced to right it. The mistake of this customer is money away from home in the search

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

LATE FASHION NOTES :

things have been imported: there are also those that are made here that are equally as handsome, if not as expensive. Fringe is used extensively on the bottom of tunics, sahes and for berthas and the edge of wrap sleeves. It is made of cord, twisted silk or chenille. Passamenterie is used in great quantities and grelots, another craze at present, are seen as large as plum, and then again they are very small. Coats are trimmed with buttons, some very large chrochet and fancy buttons or ivory and porcelain, rimmed in gold or silver. Shaded bone buttons are used on the tailored coats. Cloth and taffeta covered buttons to match the suit are fashionable.

A novelty costume was seen of chamois skin and cloth combined. The skin was in the fashionable khaki tint, as soft as suede and could hardly be distinguished from the cloth. This gown was trimmed with wide silk braid and ornamented to match. Waists made to wear with cloth suits are of a very supple taffeta and touches of this are seen in the skirt.

Suits and wraps made of chevroned cloth having the stripes arranged to appear like the bias and cross seams, are most effective in striped materials. Striped skirts of silk voile are worn with long black velvet coats, cut away very short in front. Some of the new skirts have no seams in the back or front, only on the sides, and these seams appear to lap and button to the hem of the skirt. Cut-away coats that are new and smart have tiny applied pockets just over the bust.

The long cloth coat is one of the necessary garments which helps to complete the winter wardrobe. When a person can easily afford it, there should be one for every gown it is to be worn over, and it should match in color. A cloak of a smooth finish and one of the finest quality needs very little trimming, yet some of them are elaborately braided or banded with silk or velvet. The wraps that are seen cloth, velvet or satin. The Japanese sleeve is either in one piece with the wrap or set into a wide armhole. One especially elegant wrap was made of dark currant velvet, draped capuchon fashion in classic folds almost to the bottom of the gown. It was trimmed with gold motifs and pendant tassels.

The latest autumn shirt waists are showing a slightly larger blouse in the front. With the popular jumper dress are worn underwaists of heavy white or ecru lace. They should always be trimmed with some of the dress material, thus showing that they are worn only with that costume. All blouses show a good deal of fine hand work in fancy buttons, braiding, embroidery or bands of silk. LISTENING.

Its Importance In the Art of Acting on the Stage.

The reason why listening plays a part of such paramount value on the stage is that if an actor is not deeply interested in what is going on in the mimic world in which he has been cast he cannot look for any real interest on the part of his audience, and the only way in which he can denote that inte: est is by the lateusity with which he listens to everything that has any bearing whatever on his life and actions and the skill with which he expresses the feelings bred of what he hears.

Listening is an art that is not properly taught in the schools in which modern actors are trained, for while voice culture has the place of high honor that it deserves in the curriculum of every academy on Broadway. if you ask either teacher or pupil about the still more important business of listening the chances are that you wil receive no reply save a wondering shake of the head.

So much has been said about "tem perament," "mentality." "facial expression" and "personality" that it is a very easy matter for a schoolgirl to persuade herself that she has in ber the makings of a great actress. A! she needs is what she calls a "few lessons."

One young woman, indeed, told me that she had been studying the art of expressing various emotions by means of a series of contortions of visage, al more or less hideous to behold, but that she had not been taught anything about listening. In short, although she had learned bow to make her various emotional grimaces it had never occurred to her that unless she could show cause for these curious expressions of joy or grief or rage or what ever they were called in her "Complete Handbook of Acting" her andlence would not understand what she was driving at. But if she had been taught to listen with a natural interest and attention the emotions called forth by what she heard would be certain to betray themselves convincingly on her face. SNUFFBOXES.

Once Held an Important Part In the Councils of Nations.

No longer applicable is an old diplomat's advice to "take snuff often and slowly," yet according to the Hou. John W. Foster, author of "The Practice of Diplomacy." the time was when snuffboxes held an important part in the councils of nations. The present which the Spanish government tendered to General Pinckney in 1795 and which congress withheld from him was a gold snuffbox.

The British plenipotentiary who attended the conferences at the close of the Napoleonic wars received as presents twenty-four snuffboxes of the value of £1,000 each. Richly jeweled boxes were the diplomatic fashion a century and more ago, but the fashion has changed.

As a reminder of the olden time, Sir Charles Russell, afterward lord chief justice of England, the British senior counsel in the Bering sea arbitration at Paris in 1893, a great collector of historic snuffboxes, carried a precious one and was constantly offering its contents to his colleagues.

After the treaty of 1856 was concluded with Persia the American minister to Turkey, who signed it, wrote to the secretary of state:

"I would suggest the following present: A diamond snuffbox of the value of \$4,000 for the shah; to Mirza Agbra Khan, the grand vizier, a diamond snuffbox to the value of \$3,000; to Farrukh Khan, with whom the treaty was negotiated, another of the same value: to Mirza Ahmed Khan, the Persian charge at Constantinople, a diamond snuffbox to the value of

YPSILANTI.

Nearly Four Hundred Ways of Spelling the Name.

Curious postal officers in Michigan and Washington have been keeping for years past a record of the different ways Ypsilanti has been spelled on mail matters, and by comparing the notes they have preserved a list of veritable orthographic wonders has been compfled. This list easily establishes the claim that more different ways for spelling Ypsilanti have been devised than for spelling any other geographical name in America.

In all no less than 372 distinct ways of spelling the name have been counted, and it is probable that the greater mber, perhaps all, have been used in good faith by persons who actually believed that the orthographic combinations reproduced were the correct combinations for representing Ypsilanti on the written or printed page. Every letter in the alphabet except "R" has been used as the initial letter of the name, though why so obvious a combination as Rypsilanti should be neglected when others much less obvious have been employed is difficult to explain. As a matter of fact the variations in the spelling are chlefly confined to the first syllable, "Y" being a letter lacking or having only an indifferent standing in many foreign languages.

Tipay Lanti and Zyp Silanti are met with, and among the spellings farthest away from the accepted and official standard are Whypsorlanter and Hipasalandder.-Chicago Inter Ocean.
