side of the bullding and wrapped around the top board of the fence that the front of the wagon yard adjoining had evidently been placed there to
draw thght the electric wires ruaning Into the saloon buildifing and prevent
them from rubbing against or cutting them from rubbing against, or cutting
the edge of the foof. It has not yet been estabished whether Mr. Schmidt
or others placed the wire there. This wire had worn through the insulation
of the electric light wire and furnished a means of conducting the powerful
