Awards Are Presented At Meeting

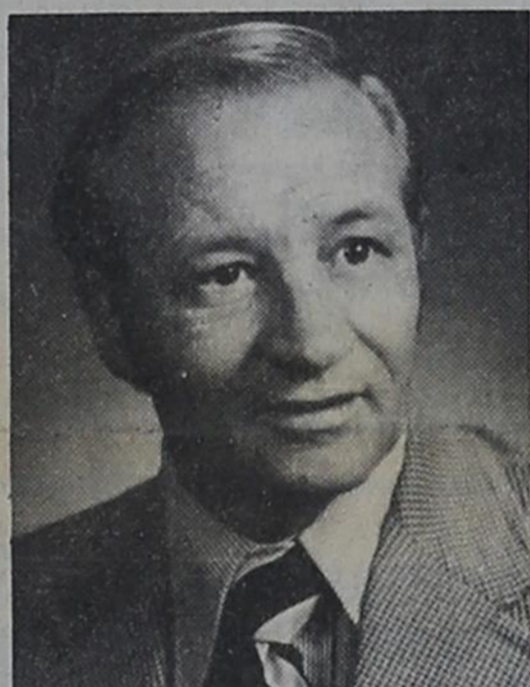
The Bovina Wheat Growers Cooperative, Inc., held their 45th annual meeting this past Friday night, July 27 at the Bovina High School cafeteria.

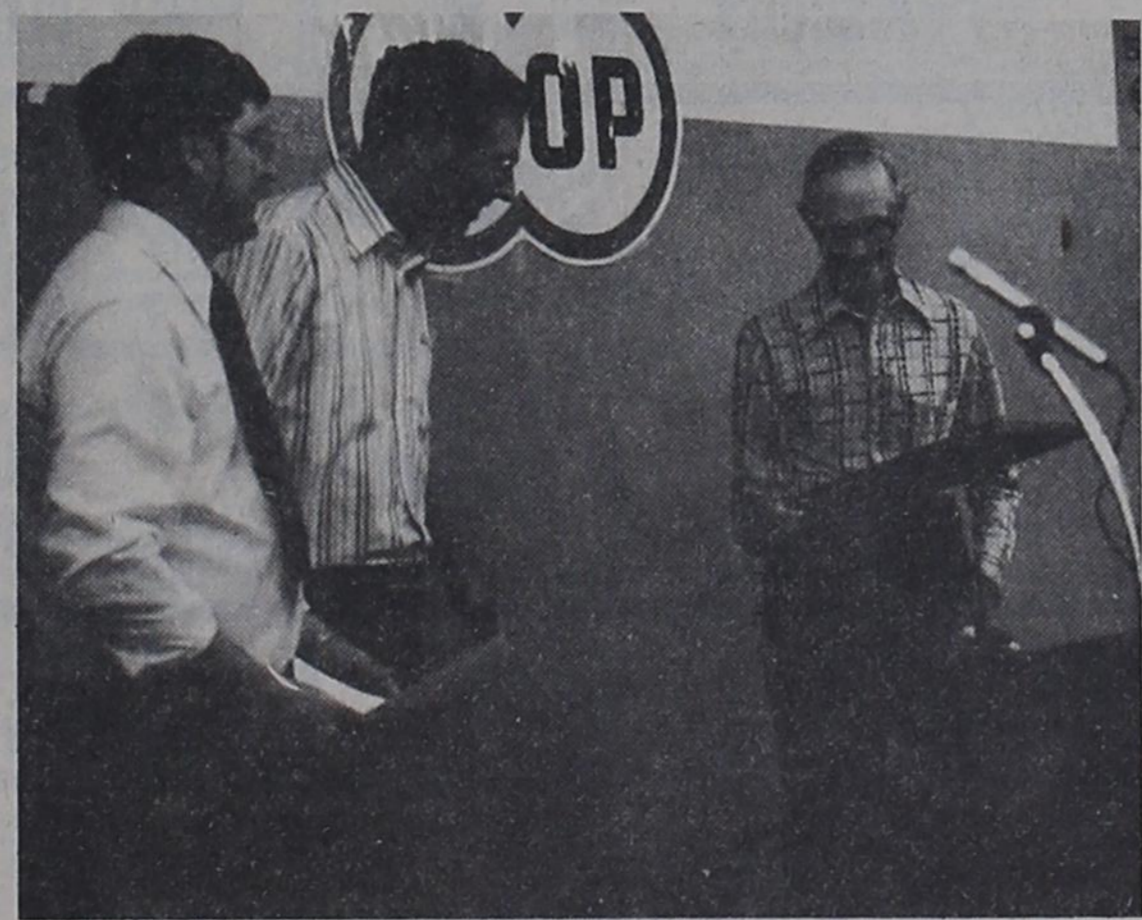
Deadline Slated For Federal Crop Plan

Wheat growers wishing to insure their investment in their 1980 crops have only until August 31 to apply for a policy, according to Carey G. Johnson, District Director of USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Johnson suggests that major improvements in the policies being written this year are making all-risk crop insurance attractive to many farmers who have not carried insurance in the past. The improvements offer eligible wheat producers increased flexibility to tailor their insurance protection to their individual financial needs.

Specifically, the policies offer a choice of three different yield guarantees and three different levels of indemnity payments. In addition, premium rates are being determined by a new formula that reduces the cost of insurance to farmers who experience few or small losses. Still another change increases the maximum indemnity payment for crop losses to \$3.50 a bushel from \$3.00 a year ago.

Thunderstorm Gives Rainfall, Some Hail

A severe thunderstorm swept across Parmer County this past Monday evening causing damage to some crops in the area. There were reports of over three inches of rain and golfball size hail in some parts of the area.

North of Bovina, around the Rhea area, there were reports of two and one-half inches of rain and some farmers reported bad crop damage. Dick and Bob Sparks, who farm about a mile south of the Ten Mile Corner, reported about an 80 per cent loss on their cotton.

William Gromowsky reported that he received quite a bit of hail on his farm south of Friona. He also said there was some wind damage.

Randy Barrett, who farms about five miles south of Bovina, received some light hail. Jay Harris reported that he received about one inch of rain at his house northwest of Bovina. Harris also reported an inch of rain last Thursday evening.

According to reports, the Friona area received most of the damaging hail and heavy rains. Up to two and one-half inches of golfball size hail and flooding occurred north of Friona. Texas Highway 214 was reported to be under a foot of water in some places, and Farm Road 2397 was also reported under water.

Crops in the Bovina area are probably better than average condition for this time of year. The corn crop for the most part is looking

good. The vegetable crops are virtually made, with harvest already underway on some of the vegetables.

Cotton has made a comeback in most instances from an exceptionally cold, wet month of May. Sunflowers, soybeans and sugar beets are looking

good, so Parmer County farmers should be looking forward to a good harvest season.

Although we have had some hot weather, it still has not been nearly as hot in the local area as it has been in some parts of the state and nation.

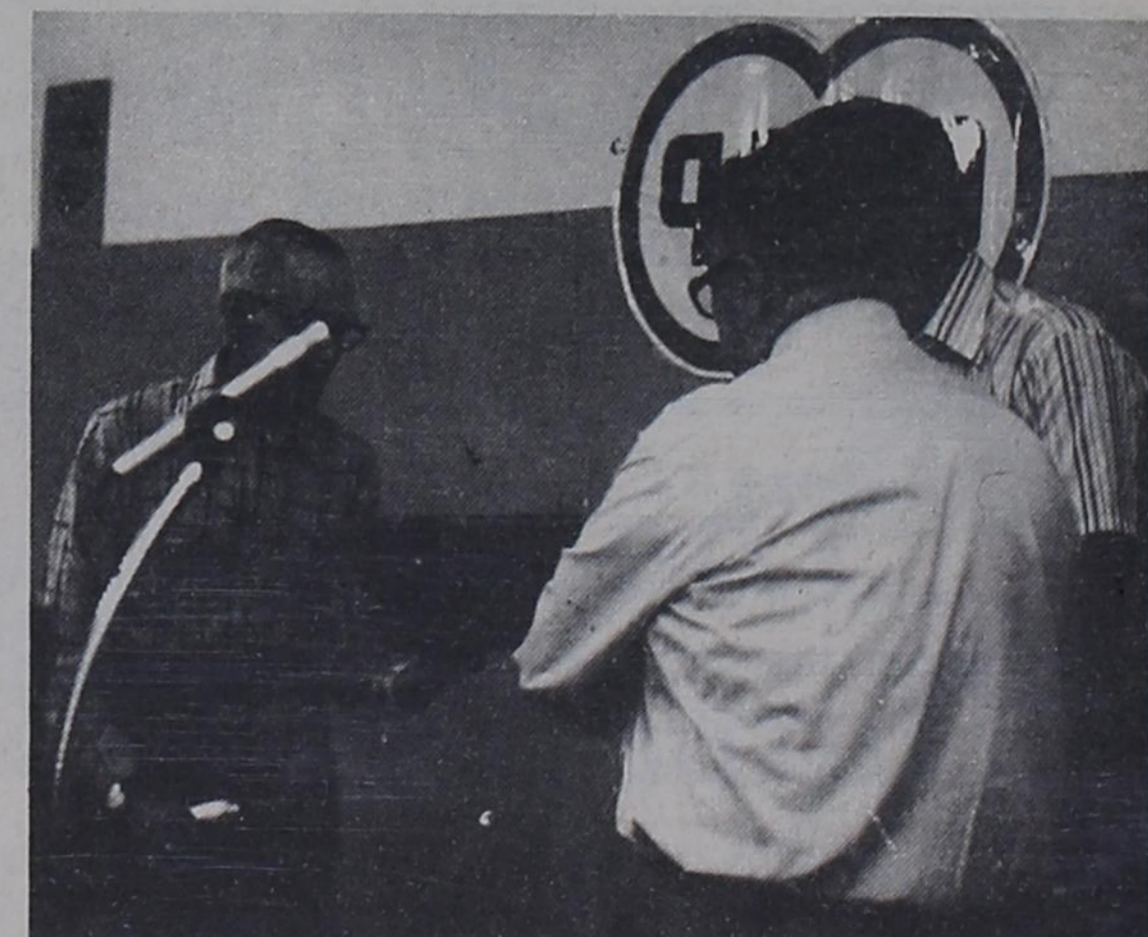

A long time Eastern New Mexico tradition will continue this year when the Curry County Fair opens at Clovis, N.M. September 4-8.

An important part of the Curry County Fair is the livestock division with Mike Spearman as over-all superintendent. Steve Fury will be superintendent of Department A-Beef Cattle, assisted by Lyle Hutchins.

Breeders from across the nation are encouraged to enter animals in this class stated Spearman.

All animals must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned by him not less than 30 days prior to the opening day of the fair, said Fury. No breeding animal can be entered or exhibited unless the same has been recorded in the recognized book of records for their respective breed and exhibitors must

produce certificate of registry at the request of the superintendent.

Fury stated, first, second and third place cash premiums will be awarded to bulls in the following classes: junior calf, winter calf, senior calf, summer yearling, spring yearling, junior yearling, senior yearling and two-year old. Heifers will be classed in the same categories.

Champion and reserve champion bulls and females will receive ribbons.

There will be a class for pen of three bulls, two bulls bred and owned by exhibitors; pair of yearlings, one bull and one female; pair of calves, one bull and one female; get of sire-four animals the progeny of one sire, all owned by the exhibitor. An entry, according to Fury may include all bulls, but only two females.

Entry fees will be \$2.00 in the open class and \$4.00 in the Jr. class. Out of state beef and dairy cattle must be tested for Bangs Disease before exhibiting.

A special Char-Swiss Breeders Association Fall Show will be held during the Fair. All animals to be eligible for this breeding class must be purebred and registered with the Char-Swiss Breeders Association according to Spearman.

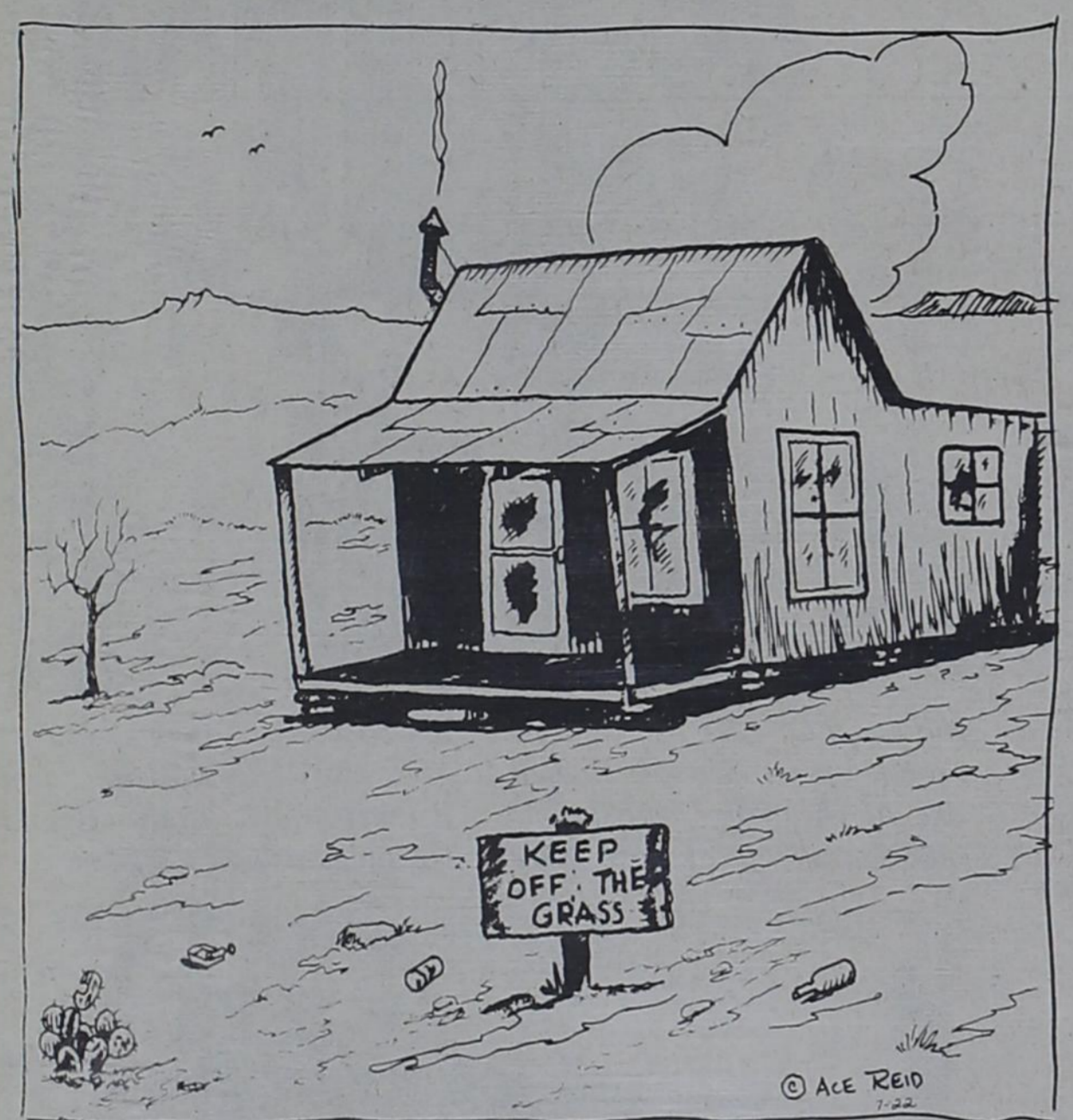

Board Slates Election

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are E.C. Witten of Edmonson; A.W. Anthony, Jr., Friona; John Gilbreath, Hart; and Don Nelson of Tulia. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are also eligible to vote.

All nominations must be filed by August 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th, Lubbock, Texas, 79401 to allow time for adding their name to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 2, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

A PERSON does not have to be behind bars to be in prison. Many people know what it is to be imprisoned by fears, environment, ignorance, prejudice. This was the kind of captivity from which Jesus came to release people.

However, it was not rare for Christians to find themselves in jail in those early days. What was unusual was that they were the object of continuing love and concern from their friends in Christ. These friends were not ashamed to be identified with those in prison.

When Paul was in prison, he wrote a letter to the Christians in Colossae. To them he sent appreciative words about several loyal people who were with him and faithful in the Lord's work. Paul paid special tribute to Epaphras, a Colossian, telling them of his constancy in prayer and hard work in their behalf.

Simple kindness, going a bit out of the way, and maintaining a genuine concern for others are among the qualities which are to distinguish Christians at all times.

PRAYER: Dear God, open my mind to see and stimulate my muscles to move into ways of helpfulness, even at unexpected times. Amen.

Scooter's Scoops

Monday morning I talked with Ben McCain, newsman for KPMT-TV in Beaumont, about the floods that were caused by rains of up to 30 inches from the tropical storm Claudette which forced the evacuation of 5,000 people and damaged 15,000 homes in ten counties along the upper Texas Gulf Coast. It is estimated the damage throughout the area could total \$750 million.

McCain said he and others worked all one night carrying cameras, lights, and film equipment and waded water waist high, talking with people and looking at their homes and apartments. In order to make it one day, he drove with two wheels of his pickup on the median all the way to work.

I also talked with Ben's wife, Christie, and she said in Beaumont it rained very hard and fast for over 12 hours and they were only out of power for a few hours but many were without power and telephones for two days or more.

I asked Ben if people were riding in boats during all this and he said definitely not because this had been tried before and it caused the flood waters to rise in homes and there had been those who threatened the boaters with guns, so this means of getting around didn't work.

The McCains said it had not rained for three days now and the waters were subsiding rapidly.
