ONE OF THE AREAS which is currently under the knife of President Reagan's budget cutting program is the Legal Services Corporation, which funds such organizations as the Texas Rural Legal Service.

The original idea of providing legal services to the poor may have been a good one. It was established some 15 years ago by Lyndon Johnson's Great Society, to give the impoverished sector their "day in court."

But in the meantime, the legal aid program has become a fly in the ointment, and like so many government programs, national leaders have wondered why it ever was created in the first place.

One of the problems is the fact that the young attorneys and workers in the legal services office do more on "ideology" than they do on "necessity."

The legal-services lawyers, in most cases, are young idealists, perhaps out to make a name for themselves as "defenders of the helpless."

Backing up our charges that the young "lawyers" are attempting to make names for themselves, rather than helping the poor is the fact that they break the laws of legal ethics by sending news releases pertaining to their pending actions, not only to the local news media, but also to the metropolitan news media. This makes us question the true motives of the TRLA.

Their "do good" attitudes and campaigns have often done more harm than good in certain communities. A good case in point is the TRLA office in Hereford, which has been the center of controversy virtually since it opened.

Again, we emphasize that some of the work done by these offices is good, and well-intended. But much of it has mostly stirred up trouble, mainly between the Hispanics and their Anglo neighbors.

At one point, about a year ago, a resident of Hereford told this writer about the trouble being stirred up by the TRLA office, and the problems it was creating.

"People who have been friends and neighbors for years are now suspicious of each other. Just the fact that you are an Anglo and he is Hispanic has suddenly become a barrier," the spokesman said.

This type of results from the TRLA program is unfortunate, particularly in our area, which has a high percentage of Mexican-American population.

Probably the most controversial work done by the legal services is its class-action suits. Then, there are others which made opponents of the program "see red." That was when the legal service took a client who wanted a state-funded sex-change operation.

Such "services" as those discussed above have caused the Reagan administration to take a long look at legal services, and they probably will get a deserving ax when the final budget is proposed.

City Okays Reserve Police Force Locally

The City of Bovina passed an ordinance recently that created a reserve police force in the city. The purpose of the force is to be on call in case of emergencies when more than one officer is needed. This is strictly a volunteer reserve force.

Texas law provides for cities to

pass this ordinance to create the police reserve.

When on duty, the reserve officer will have the same authority as a city officer would have.

There are nine minimum requirements established by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement

Officer's Standards and Education.

Applicants must:

1. Be at least 18 years of age.
2. Be citizens of the United States.
3. Have copies of fingerprints on file at FBI and Department of Public Safety of Texas. (These will be provided by the Police Department).
4. Cannot have been convicted of DWI or driving under the influence of drugs or convicted of a felony of any kind in the last ten years.
5. Have good moral character.
6. Have their high school diploma or GED.

7. Be examined by doctor and physiologist and found capable of performing duties.

8. Interviewed by Police Department and found suitable.

9. If served in Armed Forces, must have an honorable discharge.

Also, the applicant must attend a credited police academy school which includes 70 college hours. Among these hours studied will be criminal law, traffic law, crowd control, firearms, first aid and police-community relations.

A two-week school will start April 13 and continue through April 25 in Hereford. Hours will be from 6-11 p.m. Bovina will have some potential reserve officers attending this school.

"We are not looking just for young people, we are looking for maturity also. The physical requirements are not strict," said Deputy John Detton. "This is volunteer work and a good way to serve your community," he added.

Anyone interested needs to contact Deputy Detton for more information. Applications will be taken from a member of any race, male or female, ages 18-60. Deadline for applying is Friday, April 10 at 5 p.m.

BHS Girls Qualify In Track

Bovina's Flying Fillies took fourth place in the district track meet with 79 points behind Kress with 140, S-E, 126 and Vega, 113 and ahead of Farwell with 60 and Hart, 24.

The Fillies qualified for regional in five events, the 880 relay, mile relay, 1,600 meter run, 440 dash and shot put.

The 880 foursome raced ahead of S-E in the final yardage by .2 of a second to take first place with a time of 1:52.5.

Kathy Williams broke her record in the 1600 meter run with a time of 5:40.58 for first place position. Gale Turner finished second behind Kress' Kayleen Harris in the 440 with a time of 65.7.

In the mile relay the runners came in second behind Kress with a time of 4:25.7. Rounding out the regional qualifying events was Connie Shelby as she heaved the steel ball shot put 31'6-5/8 for second place.

Others placing in the top six places were: Lynnette Bentley, triple jump, fifth; Vickie Shepherd, shot put, sixth; 440 relay, fourth; Susan Fancher, 100, third.

The Fillies will go to Tucumcari, N.M. Friday and Saturday to a Regional Qualifiers meet.

The Mustangs traveled to S-E and scored 22 points. Shepherd came in third in the 220 with a time of 24.8.

A total of 130 people voted in the city council election, with only 74 voting in the school board race, termed a very light turnout.

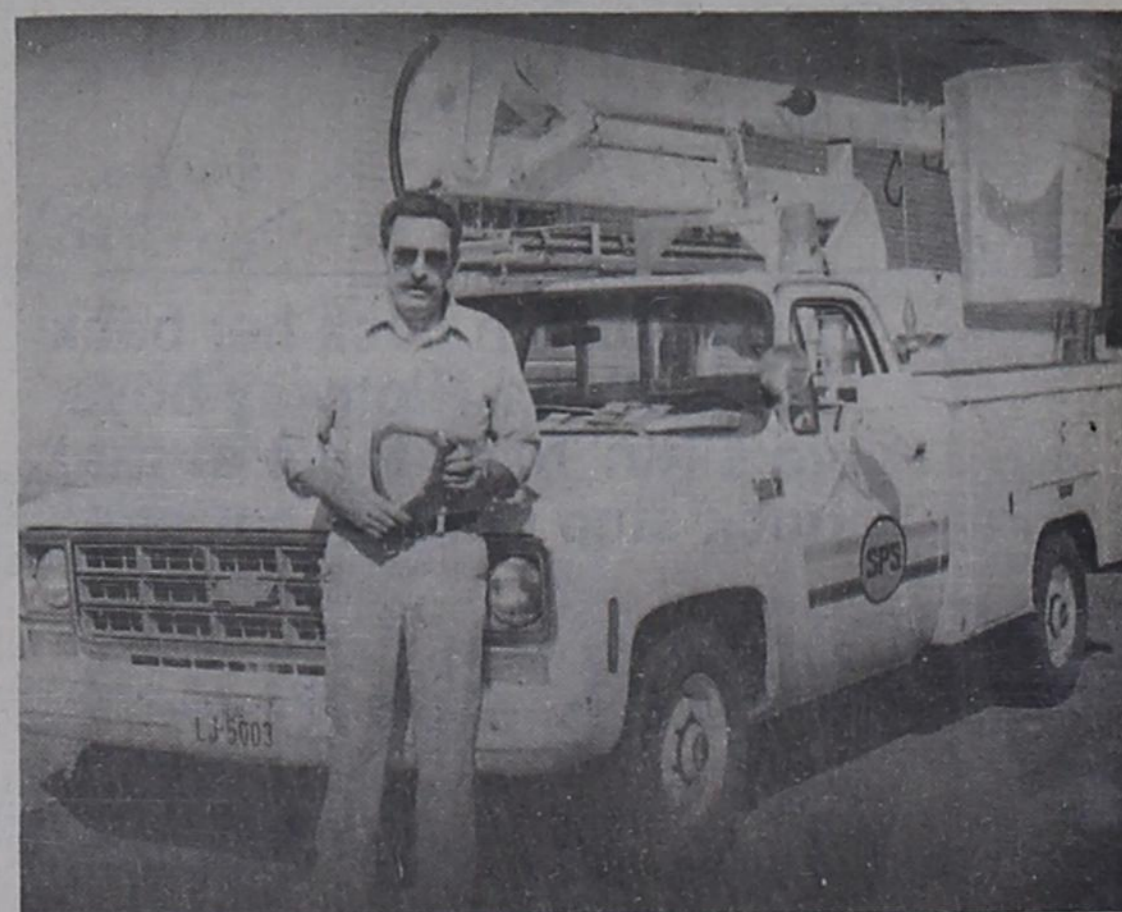

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1966

Bovina's school bond issue election, which was for \$600,000 to provide improvements and expansion to facilities over the next five years, went down to a crushing defeat Saturday. A heavy turnout of voters

killed the proposal by a margin of more than two to one. The vote count was 103 for and 226 against.

Grady Sorley and Don Murphy, who were running unopposed for positions on the Bovina Schools' board of trustees, were re-elected Saturday.

Approximately 320 voters marked ballots in the trustee election which was held in connection with the \$600,000 school bond election. Bedford Caldwell is new mayor of Bovina. He led a field of three candidates in Tuesday's city balloting.

Caldwell with 90 votes unseated a veteran city official, Boyd Gilbreath, who has been the town's mayor for the past four terms.

Named to three positions on the city council were Charles Corn, Billie Sudderth and Owen Patton. Also in the race were Dolph Moten and Sonny Spurlin. A total of 216 voters went to the polls.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1971

Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Estes were recognized as outstanding citizens in Bovina Thursday night at the annual Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet.

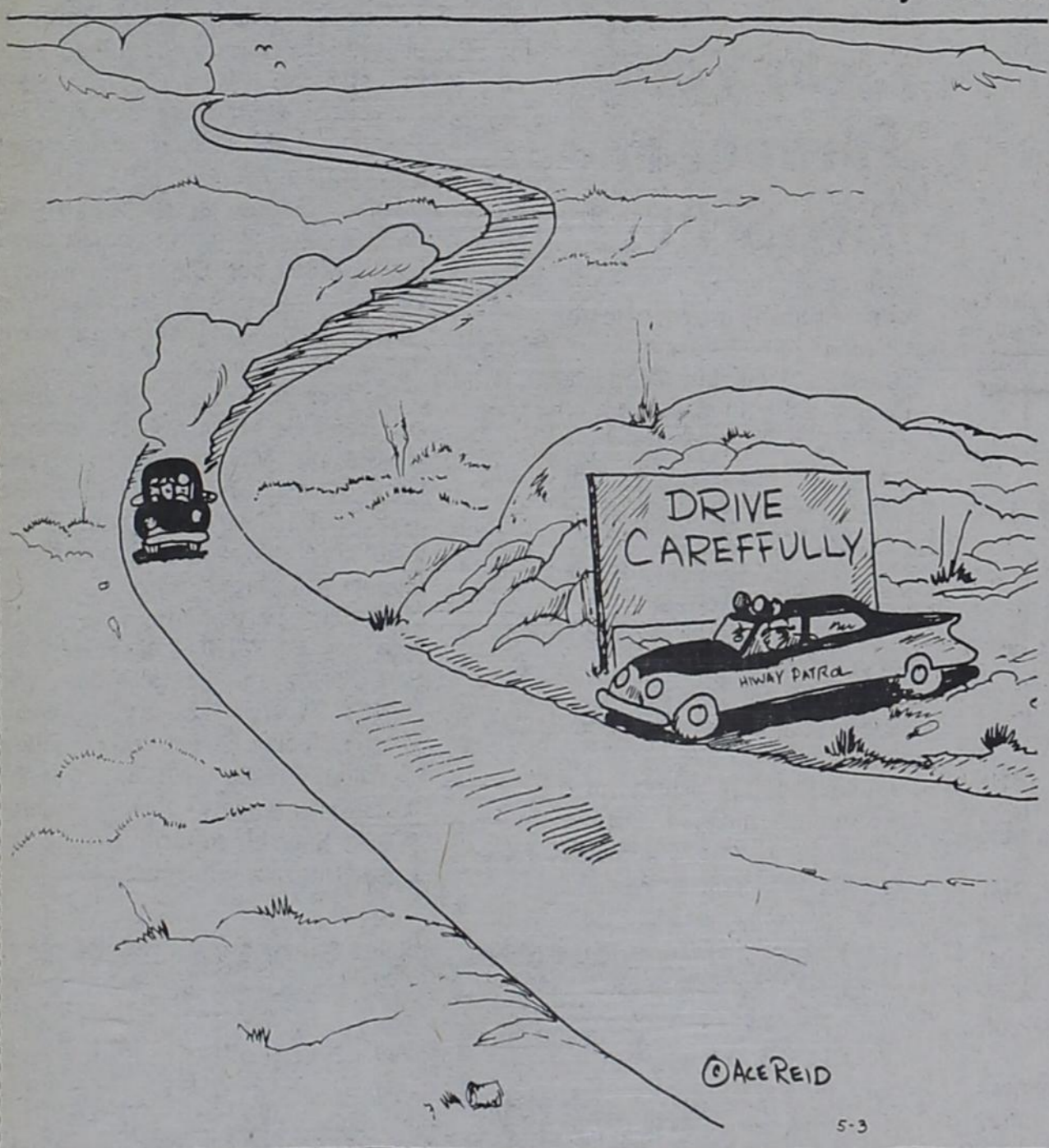

HELPFUL HINTS...
