SEVERE SLEET STORM PLAYS HAVOC WITH TELEGRAPH WIRES.

Chicago and Other Cities Almost Completely Shut Off From All Communication.

WIND ADDS TO TROUBLE

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 23, -- A severe sloet storm which set in last night badly demoralized telegraphic communication in all directions. Early today it was impossible to reach St. Louis from Chicago save by way of Omaha and Kansas City. Peoria and Bloomington, Illinois, are both out of the world so far as reaching them by wire is concerned. All wires to the north are working badly and to the east it is exceedingly hard to make the wires work through from Chicago to New York. The storm was accompanied by high winds, which added to the difficulty.

he seed and fertilizer for planting five acres of the crop, to be grown under its direction, the department to have an option on the purchase of the seed at a specified price.

Several years ago a small quantity of long staple cotton was raised near this city, but in the glunning the seed was mixed with taht of the common staple, and so far as is known no further attempt has been made to raise long staple in this section. It is believed by many that the long staple can be successfully grown in certain districts of Wichita county and the results of the proposed experiments to be conducted by the government will be watched with interest.
